
Buenos Ayres, Nov. 30 .- Despatches received from Montevideo insist that there is good reason to believe that the German squadron, which has been operating in the Pacilc Ocean, is at present in the South Atlantic. 



For some days the fighting in Poland has been screened from the public. Last week Petrograd, London and Paris told us officially that fighting on a big scale was going on between the rivers Warthe and Vistula, and particularly along the banks of the Bruza, a tributary of the Vistula. Sensational accounts were also sent out from Petrograd and Warsaw of German corps captured, surrounded, routed, breaking the Russian ring, which have not been confirmed from any official source. Both from Russian and German sources we heard of German re-inforcements being rushed up, and from the Germans that they had again taken the offen-sive, and this appeared to be borne out by fighting taking place towards Lowicz, a railway junction on the way to Warsaw, and lying on the Warsaw side of a line drawn from Plotsk to Lodz. Last night a press despatch from Petrograd to the Central News claimed a decisive victory for the Russians in the Lodz battles. Lobster Fishery.

Board of Trade Recommends a Cl Season for Next Year.

The members of the Board of Trade held a special meeting at their rooms yesterday afternoon to discuss the Lobster Fisheries in all its aspects, and the unanimous decision reached was that the catching of lobster should be prohibited for twelve

Mr. J. S. Munn, President of the Board, occupied the chair and there was a large attendance.

Those present who gave their views on the subject including President Munn, were: Hon. J. Harvey, Hon. W. C. Job, Hon. J. Anderson, Minister of Fisheries Piccott and Messrs. Gosling, Morine, Barr, Templeton and Mc Dougall, as well as Fisheries Inspector Dee who was called on to give information as to how the lobster fishery coast. Nearly all the speakers referred to the material decline in the fishery during recent years and it was considered to be due mainly to the catching and poaching of lobsters of a small size. This, it was stated, was notably the case in Fortune Bay Many other reasons were advanced why prompt action should be taken for the protecton of the lobster fishery. In illustrating the need of a close season illustrations were given of the small size of lobsters packed In one case 64 claws had been found packed in a single can. Another factor in the situation was that owing to the market for our lobsters being closed in Germany on acount of the cases of lobsters were left on the



Concrete Bases for Artillery Discovered at Mouth of Thames.

received, but not published here, it appears that another startling find of concrete bases for artillery has been made at the mouth of the Thames.
