


ANOTHER DUTCH STEAMER TORof England, by French airmen on Metz and other German towns, the PEDOED. sinking of a French torpedo boat de-LONDON, To-day. The steamer Ptembang has been sinking of a French torpedo boat de-stroyer by a submarine in the Adriatic, the reported torpedoing of an Aus-trian hospital ship by a Entente under-water boat are recorded in official and unofficial communications. Berlin reports the recapture of some ground from the British northeast of Vermellies, in the region of La Basse, and the driving of the French from the position northeast of Badonville in the Vosges. London admits the capture by the Germans of three mine craters at Hohenzollern redoubt, French guns have been busy bombarding German trefiches in Champagne and German depots northeast of St. Mihiel. Five French aircraft dropped bombs on gate fell squarely in a motor car, kill-ing the driver and setting fire to the gasoline tank. 




