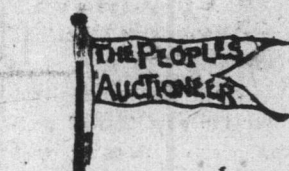

WHEREAS, on the sixth of March last, Ireland lost her foremost statesman and patriot, and the Irish race its most eminent representative, by the untimely death of Mr. John Edward Redmond, M.P.

AND WHEREAS the Benevolent Irish Society feels deeply the loss which is suffered by the Irish race when the Chief who has led us so long through the wilderness dies at length within sight of the Promised Land;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Benevolent Irish Society of St. John's, Newfoundland, in general meeting assembled, in the 113th year of its existence, place on record its deep and abiding sorrow, which it shares with all Irishmen, at the sudden passing of the leader who guided and counselled us so long, and who achieved for us so much; that it pay heartfelt tribute to his distinguished patriotism, and to his lifetime of strenuous and selfless labour—now at last promising to bear fruit; and that it express its regret that after a life spent freely in Ireland's service there was not granted to him the crowning triumph of speaking on the floor of that independent Irish Parliament that he strove so tirelessly to establish.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Society place on record its sincere and earnest sympathy with the widow and relatives of the dead leader in their bereavement. RESOLVED FURTHER that these Resolutions be sent to Mrs. Redmond, to the local press and to the Dublin press.

Following the resolution Mr. M. J. O'Mara, Chairman of the Portrait Committee, presented the society with two oil paintings, donated by the Hon. J. D. Ryan, President of the Society. The paintings are of the Rt. Rev. James Louis O'Donel, D.D., first Bishop of Newfoundland, and the other of Rt. Rev. Michael Anthony Fleming, D.D., who was Vice-Patron of the Society and also an active member.

On St. Patrick's Day the Society will attend Last Mass at the Cathedral in a body. T. A. & B. Society. The regular meeting of the T. A. & B. Society was held on Sunday, with Vice-President Murphy in the chair. The following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, by the recent disaster to the Florizal, Newfoundland sustained a loss of life almost unexampled in its records; AND WHEREAS, amongst those who perished in the tragedy were representative citizens of every class and bread winners, through whose taking of many families have suffered grievously;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Society fully realizing the magnitude of the disaster and the crushing blow it represents to those who suffered by it, and sincerely sympathize with them in this sad occasion and hereby place on record its sense of deep regret at the loss which these families and the community in general has sustained by the marine tragedy of Cappa Hayden, two weeks ago to-day; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Society tenders its congratulations to Mr. John Davis, the one member of the institution who was on board the ill-fated ship on his fortunate escape, and rejoices that there were on hand promptly to undertake the work of rescue, fellow Newfoundlanders with the courage and self-sacrificing characteristics of our people, and to those whose efforts under God the forty-four survivors owe their lives.

Fog, which had covered the city Monday morning, settled down again in the evening. It was thick enough to cause the general belief that there was little chance that the Germans would attempt any air raid.

To-Day's Messages.

GETTING AT IT. LONDON, To-day. Thirteen German planes and three balloons were put out of action by the British last Friday, it is officially announced. The statement follows: Three observation balloons were destroyed by our airplanes on Friday. Five German machines were downed in aerial fighting, seven were driven down out of control and one was brought down by infantry fire.

YORKSHIRE COAST AGAIN. LONDON, To-day. Hostile airships attacked Yorkshire Coast last night, according to an official statement; the raid is still in progress.

HEAVY GUN FIGHTING. PARIS, To-day. In a successful raid north of Dixmude we took a number of prisoners, says to-day's official report. Belgian reports that a well placed barrage enabled us to check two enemy attacks against our advanced posts, one north of Dixmude the other in the direction of St. George's and these failures prompted the enemy to open a heavy artillery fire of gas shells, but our artillery held his batteries in check.

RAID ON NAPLES. ROME, To-day. No damage of a military nature was caused by the attack on Naples early to-day by enemy aviators, it is officially announced. The raid was made at one o'clock this a.m. About twenty bombs were dropped, almost all of them striking private houses. In addition to seven victims in hospital of little sisters, several other civilians were killed or wounded.

ACT OF WAR. LONDON, To-day. The Chinese Commander at Harbin, Manchuria, has warned the leader of Bolsheviki forces in Siberia that invasion of Chinese territory will be considered an act of war, according to Harbin advices under Saturday's date forwarded by Reuter's Pekin correspondent.

VINDICATED. WASHINGTON, To-day. The Navy Department's conduct of the war was vindicated in a report made public to-day by the House Committee that has been investigating the subject.

LUXBURG UNDER GUARD. BUENOS AIRES, To-day. Reports were current here to-day that Count Von Luxburg former German Minister to Argentine had fled. It was said he had been missing for several days from his house in a suburb of Lomas di Zamora, where he was supposed to have been under strict surveillance, and that last night he and a former German Naval Attaché and a large group of other Germans passed through Puento Del Inca in the Andes, on an international train for Chile. After an investigation of these reports, the Foreign Office said they were untrue as it had been assured by the police that Count Luxburg was still under guard.

A NEW MOVE. LONDON, To-day. According to the Morning Post Berne correspondent, preparations are being made through German newspapers and German press agents for a new political move. The correspondent says it is contemplated on the basis of a status quo prior to the war and recognition of the present status in the East.

KEEP AT IT. LONDON, To-day. British aviators have dropped a ton of bombs on the town of Coblenz, capital of the Rhine Province of Prussia, according to an official report issued to-night.

SAMMIES SURPRISE HUNS. PARIS, To-day. The American detachment in the Woevre region has successfully carried out a surprise attack on the German trenches south of Fichcourt, says a French official statement issued to-day.

AIR RAID ON PARIS. PARIS, To-day. A raiding Gotha, brought down in

cow to some points further east if the German armies continue to advance into Russia. A message to the State Department to-day, from the American Consul at Moscow, dated March 8th, said the Russian Government was expected there next day and that arrangements would be made to go to some other city if it became necessary.

DILLON SUCCEEDS REDMOND. LONDON, To-day. John Dillon, member of Parliament for East Mayo, was to-day unanimously elected Chairman of the Nationalists, succeeding the late John Redmond. The motion to elect Dillon was made by Joseph Devlin.

MORE WOMEN AND CHILDREN. PARIS, To-day. Thirty-four persons were killed and 79 were injured in Paris and its suburbs as a result of last night's raid. In addition to bomb victims, 66 persons were suffocated through crowding in a panic, to a Metropolitan Railway entrance, to take refuge from raiders. They were for the most part women and children.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. ZURICH, To-day. Serious bread riots occurred in Graz, the capital of Austria-Hungary Province of Lower Styria, last Wednesday. After sending a deputation to the authorities to complain of the scarcity and poor quality of the bread supplied, a mob collected in the streets and smashed windows and plundered shops. The police were powerless to prevent the disorder. The property damage is reported to have been serious.

GOOD MEDICINE. AMSTERDAM, To-day. A telegram from Frankfurt-on-Main asserts that as the result of a British daylight raid on Mainz last Saturday, three soldiers, four women and ten children were killed. Many others were injured but no military damage was done, it is declared.

MOSCOW AT PRESENT. WASHINGTON, To-day. The Russian revolutionary Government is prepared to move from Moscow.

BRITISH ADVANCE IN PALESTINE. LONDON, To-day. The British in Palestine are continuing their northward progress, and an additional advance on both sides of the Jerusalem-Nebulus road is reported in an official report given out last night, which reads: On Sunday night and Monday, further advance was made astride the Jerusalem-Nebulus road and considerable casualties were inflicted upon the enemy and several machine guns captured. Unfavorable weather prevented air co-operation.

NORWAY TAKING PRECAUTIONS. STOCKHOLM, To-day. The Norwegian Government is sending the cruiser Trichjof to Tromsoe with a landing party, according to a Christiania despatch to the Dagens Nyheter. Its action, the messages say, is taken in view of the spread of the Bolsheviki revolutionary agitation among the fishermen in the extreme north of Norway who desire closer connection with Northern Russia. A large meeting for the discussion of this subject is said to have been arranged.

HAD A GOOD EFFECT. LONDON, To-day. It was officially announced to-night that the German Government has released from special imprisonment, British Lieut. Scheltz and Wooseky, two airmen who sometime ago were given a prison sentence for distributing propaganda in Germany by dropping printed matter from airplanes over German territory. Release was due to a threat by the British Government to take reprisals, unless arrest ceased to be subjected to unusually harsh treatment.

Rinse very carefully with warm water, being sure to remove every particle of soap, then use plenty of cold water until the face feels cool.

Your Boys and Girls.

The temperature of floors is usually considerably lower than that at the usual level of grown up heads. Hence, if children are allowed to play on the floor in cold, stormy weather, some care must be taken to avoid drafts and chills, even in an upstairs room.

Spread a quilt on the floor in such a case or, for the baby, use the crib where the toys can be spread out without fear of tumbles or drafts of cold air.

Nice low carts on wheels, with screened sides, come for use upon such occasions. The boughten affairs are complete, mattress and all but there is no reason why such a contrivance cannot be made at home.

They should be built roomy, a little shorter than a crib, and after being mounted on wheels or castors, they can be moved from room to room without inconvenience.

From England.

Mr. Richard Dormody of Bishop's Falls, has received the following letter from his nephew Michael, which he has forwarded for publication. This Newfoundland soldier is in the Canadian Army and belongs to A Co. 21st Reserve Battalion, B.E.F., now stationed at Bramshot Camp, England where the letter was written. Bramshot, England, Jan. 13th, 1918.

Dear Uncle Richard,—Just a few lines in answer to your ever welcome letter I received to-day, and needless to say how glad I was to hear from you and also to hear you are enjoying good health, which leaves me at present, thank God. You asked me how I liked to be in the army; I like it fine. I don't feel sorry at the least for joining. It is the proper place for all young fellows. The reserve I am in came from Alberta, Canada, and it's certainly good. We have all kinds of comfort and plenty to eat, and that's the main thing. There are not many fellows from Newfoundland in this reserve just now. Myself and Mike Kelly were together for quite a while, but we are parted now; we are in the same camp but he is in the 23rd Reserve, but there is a fellow here from Newfoundland that worked with you in Bishop's Falls, when you were over the cement shed. His name is Hodder, he is from B. Bay; him and I are pals; he speaks of you quite often. You told me Bishop's Falls was down pretty low, but everywhere is the same. This war has taken an effect on every place, but it will all come up again when this great war is over. I will send you the watch you were speaking of before I go to France. 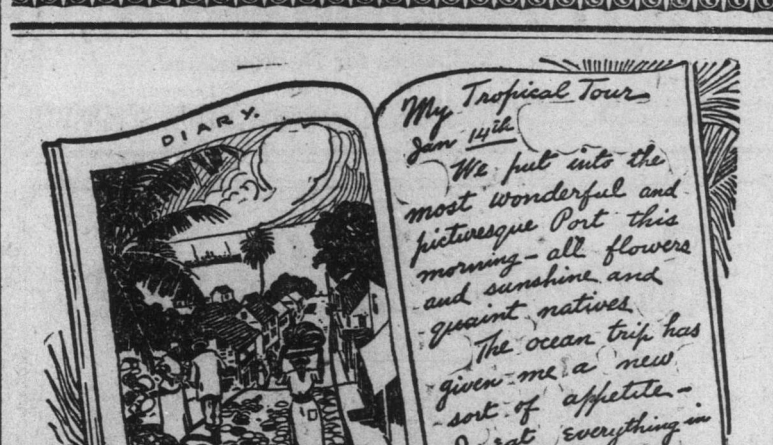
