

Fortunately the scene at the Court on Monday was one never before witnessed in this town. But what is to prevent its becoming of frequent recurrence, unless drastic measures are taken by the authorities to put down at once the illegal and promiscuous sale of preparations containing alcohol. And again, if any man, is involved in connection with the case in question, he should be found and punishment commensurate with his crime meted out to him: punishment of such a nature that will deter others from repeating the offence. Under the law it is penal to sell cigarettes to a minor. Is there no law making it a similar offence to sell infants of the female sex, intexicants? Which, in Heaven's name, i the greatest crime, the destruction of youthful virtue by doping girls with Florida Water and like preparations or selling cigarettes to a boy under legal age? There is no comparison. and if there is no law making the former a punishable act, steps should be taken to have one framed as speedily as possible. But we think that there would be no criticism of any judicial officer who imposed legal punishment on the persons who sold these little little girls the stuff which brought about their downfall, if these persons were found and brought before him. Rather would that magistrate he commended for his action. It is high time for something to be done. The pathos of Monday morning's scene in the Police Court was most appealing to sympathetic humanity, and more marked was it when one of the juyonile offenders broke down utterly and leaning on the bar rail sobbed as if her heart would break. 

# Sunday Gasolene Sales Stopped.

Ottawa, October 8.-Fuel Controllor Magrath announces that regulations have now been approved by the Governor-General in Council to control the wholesale and retail sale of gasoline in Canada, and certain fees are prescribed, based on the volume of gasoline sold during the previous

In cases where dealers fail to obey the provisions of the law the Fuel Controller has absolute power to cancel or suspend licenses without notice. All persons who continue to deal in gasoline without making application for a permit to do so will be subject to a penalty of \$50 for each day such business is conducted i intravention of the regulations. Provision is also made for the keep-

ing of certain sales records, and all retailers of gasoline are called upon to post in their places of business the wholesale as well as the retail cost of gasoline handled by them. One portant provision of the regula tion is that for the duration of the war the sale of gasoline on Sundays is

Retail maximum prices are pre for establishments selling coline in quantities over a tho allons a month. Profits are based a 10 per cent. advance over the whole mark the first step toward bringin the control of the sale of gasoline under the same sort of supervision as is .

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

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
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
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
