Such of the summer catch as was made brought ready sale at Halifax, Nova Scotia, where prices were always slightly in advance of St. John's, beside which there were the extra facilities offered by the direct connection of the Farquhar Line of steamers. Thus the prosperity and growing importance of Channel and Port aux Basques as factors in the chief industry. was something of which the people were proud. By their indefatigable industry they had built for themselves a reputation as makers of good fish, the quality of which was ever its own recommendation.

The unparalleled change which has within the past few months taken place in Channel and Port aux Basques, and from them communicated to the neighboring settlements is directly traceable to the imposiion of the Fishery Regulations. When free trade, not only with the European and American markets, but with the markets of the neighboring Canadian provinces, was denied, there was no alternative for the fishermen but to abandon their calling, and if possible get away to some other parts where employment could be had. Those who could afford to leave home did so. Those, who through tireumstances could not get away, were obliged to hold on and chance the future, gloomy and all as it looked. All the months of August and September there was nothing doing. No one was catching fish: no ne was buying fish. Such as had not been previously disposd of out of salt bulk was being held by the owners, and but few

transactions were taking place and these for barter only. 
A Bear Story From Rock Harbor.

The first English epigram quoted by Mr. Stewart is the famous fourteenth-century couplet:-

Mad as he was called "it was in the preaching of John Ball (says Green) that English first listendeclaration of the rights of man. . . .

spirit fatal to the whole system of the Middle Ages breathed in the popular rhyme which condensed the levelling doctrine of John Ball: When Adam delved and Eve span, who was then the gentleman?" It is certain that these words obtained a permanent lodgment in English ears, and today many people know them who have hardly heard of Magna Charta. The Epigram, then, can be a social gospel.

Epigrams of Revolt.

Indeed, it is often a gospel. Not very different in tone is the couplet written by Sir John Harington—"that saucy poet, my godson," as Queen Elizabeth called him:-

a truth which has lost none of its application in recent years. It was Harington, by the way, who wrote one of the first, if not the first, English epigram on the enclosure of commons:-
