Electrical Engineering College for Nfld.

Electricians in this city have long felt the need for some college wherein they would be enabled to study the theoretical as well as the practical side of electricity. Heretofore there has been no opportunity of studying ! this in Newfoundland except by means of a correspondence course. Mr. Southgate, the Canadian Wireless Expert who was on the staff of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, in their experimental and research department previous to the war, has realized the need for such college in this city, and proposes to start one in conjunction with the British Radio Institute on Feb. 1st. Their night classes should prove of great value not only to the numerous young men employed by the electrical firm in this city, but also to the firms themselves, by making their employees more efficient, and capable of handling positions of greater responsibility requiring extra technical training. This college has already done a great amount of pioneer work in the development of Wireless Telegraphy and Telephony in this Island, and we hope that their new venture will prove just as successful


