**Modern "Jean Valjean" Pardoned.**

"M. Doumergue, President of the French Republic, has just signed the pardon of M. Jean Hateau, whose career has a close resemblance to that of Victor Hugo's Jean Valjean," says the Times Paris correspondent. "Sentenced to 20 years' penal servitude in 1904 for selling stolen bonds, Jean Hateau escaped three years later from the Guiana convict settlement. He went to Metz, where he established a small business, and became a successful merchant and an influential citizen. The bewilderment of his fellow citizens, by whom he was held in high esteem, when he was arrested last November as an escaped convict, was not less than that of the good people of Montreuil in Les Miserables when their good and much-loved mayor was denounced as the escaped forger, Jean Valjean.

## Debate on Armaments Reduction Concludes

### German Chancellor Creates a Bad Impression—Governor of Chekiang Province Deprived of Official Ranks.

#### ARBITRATION PLUS GUARANTEES FAVOURED.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. Judging by the extraordinary ovation accorded the sentiments expressed by Nicholas Politis, of Greece, after his address in the debate on the reduction of armaments in the Assembly distinctly favors a system under which compulsory arbitration will always be accompanied by effective guarantees of security.

#### UNANIMOUS FOR ARBITRATION.

GENEVA, Sept. 7. Before leaving Geneva last night for their respective capitals, Premiers MacDonald and Herriot, backed by delegations of all other countries, put into concrete form the programme which the Assembly of the League of Nations will study in an effort to elaborate a satisfactory system of compulsory arbitration destined to put an end to war, prepare the way for a conference on reduction of armaments, and set up some satisfactory pact of guarantees and mutual assistance which will serve to make compulsory arbitration practicable. The heads of all the forty-six national delegations present solemnly gave their assent to the resolution which declared its object is to

strengthen the solidarity and security of the nations throughout the world by selling by pacific means all disputes which may arise between them. When the unanimity of the vote was announced there were impressive demonstrations throughout the auditorium.

#### MANCHURIAN WAR LORD DECLARES WAR.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7. General Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian War Lord, has declared war against the Peking Government, and General Wu Pei Fu, Military Dictator of the Province of Chihli.

#### FIGHTING MORE INTENSE.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7. Fighting with redoubled intensity developed in the Huiho sector last night and continued throughout the night. It is apparent from reports of latest activity that the Kiangsu forces are concentrating their attack there.

#### DEPRIVING GOVERNOR OF OFFICIAL RANK.

PEKING, Sept. 9. After a special meeting of the Cabinet, President Tsao Ku issued today a punitive mandate, depriving of official ranks and orders Lu Yung

Hsiang, Governor of Chekiang Province, and Lu's appointee, Ho Feng Ling, Defence Commissioner of Shanghai.

#### PRINCE WILL WELCOME FLIERS.

SYOSSET, N.Y., Sept. 7. The Prince of Wales probably will accompany Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador, to Mitchell Field tomorrow afternoon to welcome the round the world fliers, it was said today at James A. Burden's home, his vacation residence. Since Sir Esme will appear in his official capacity on behalf of the British Government, and not the Prince, will be the King's representative.

#### GREENWOOD ON ENGLISH PARTIES.

QUEBEC, Sept. 7. Return to the two party system in England and the formation of a right and left party, were predicted by Right Hon. Sir Esmar Greenwood, Bart. K.C., who with Lady Greenwood, reached Quebec at the week-end on

board the Empress of France. Sir Hamar expressed the opinion that political affairs in England had reached such a pass that the country was ready to return to the two party system. The present system in which three parties were fighting for power was unsatisfactory for a number of reasons and return to a more simple system in which the issues could be more clearly defined was imminent.

#### SHORDFISHERY BELOW AVERAGE.

LOUISBURG, N.S., Sept. 7. Shordfishing this year will be much below the average of other years according to a number of local fishermen. The fleet of small boats engaged in this business is smaller than last year by forty or fifty said, many of the craft having quit on account of unfavourable weather that prevailed throughout August. Fish that have been taken so far are averaging about 300 pounds dressed and some have gone as high as 500 pounds. The price paid the fishermen is reported to average ten or eleven cents per pound.

#### GERMAN PROCLAMATION NOT ACCEPTABLE TO FRANCE.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. Prime Minister MacDonald, of Great Britain, Premier Herriot of France, and Premier Theunis, of Belgium, today received a letter from Chancellor Marx, of Germany, declaring he felt obliged to publish immediately the proclamation of Germany refusing any responsibility for having caused the world war. Chancellor Marx added that publication of the proclamation which retracts Germany's admission of war guilt was deferred to avoid hindering the negotiations at the recent International Conference in London, but that it would lead to a change in the policy of Germany regarding the agreements signed in London. As soon as he received the letter Premier Herriot made known to the German Government that the letter made a bad impression upon him and indicated the probable unfortunate consequences the publication would have in connection with the attitude of the French Government.

#### FLIERS AT BOSTON.

BOSTON, Sept. 7. The army airmen who have only to cross this continent to complete their flight round the world, by working from sun up to sun down had their planes on wheels again to-night for the short hop to New York tomorrow. "It should be plain sailing for us from now on," Flight Commander Lieut. Smith remarked, adding that although no new itinerary had been worked out it was expected to make a series of flights to Seattle inside of ten days.

#### CANADIAN SENATOR SPEAKS.

GENEVA, Sept. 7. Hon. R. Dandurand, speaking before the Assembly of the League of Nations Saturday, said Canada was delighted at the recent meeting of the Entente Cordiale. The Canadian representative told of the anxiety caused in Canada during the past three years by the unsettled state of Anglo-French relations, and asserted the Dominion was delighted by the work of Mr. MacDonald and M. Herriot in bringing about closer relations between Great Britain and France.

#### JAP SUBJECTS KILLED BY CHINESE.

TOKIO, Sept. 6. Several Formosans of Japanese nationality have been killed by Chinese soldiers at Amoy, China, according to newspaper despatches from the Chinese city. It is said that the men were killed during disorders in connection with civil war in China. The Japanese Naval Department has despatched four destroyers from Pescadore Island, near Formosa, to Amoy, to protect Japanese subjects.

#### PRESSMEN PERSECUTE THE PRINCE.

LONDON, Sept. 6. The press is in danger of becoming a public nuisance because of the scandalous way in which the Prince of Wales has been pursued by cameramen. On his own bathroom by cameramen. Occasional, a writer in the Weekly Review says. The Prince, the writer declares, is a public character, but he is entitled to his privacy and to his private friendships just as the rest of us are. This applies also to the King and Queen and Princess Mary, who can hardly move out of doors without finding themselves in the next day's picture papers. On official occasions this is well enough, but when private visits are concerned this is an outrage. Royalty is proverbially long suffering, but it just hates the man who invented a portable camera.

#### FRANCE'S MOMENTOUS DECLARATION.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. Great events which in League of Nations circles it is firmly believed are destined to affect the future of the world, occurred at today's session of the Assembly of the League. France joined Great Britain in pledging support for the principle of compulsory arbitration and though her Premier M. Herriot removed the doubts of those who feared that France would hesitate to weaken her force as a great continental military power, M. Herriot announced unequivocally that France favored an international conference on disarmament. In a calm

masterly oration like that of Premier MacDonald of Great Britain, delivered before assembly on Thursday, M. Herriot made men and women present sit stock still in rigid attention and seemingly thrilled them through and through. The Premier told the world through the Assembly that henceforth that nation which refused to submit disputes to arbitration would be stigmatized as an aggressor nation.

#### GIVES UP PROPOSED PLANE TRIP TO POLE.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6. Lieut. Antonio Locatelli today announced he had called off his proposed flight to the North Pole with Capt. Rowald Amundson, the Scandinavian explorer. His reason for making this decision he said was that he had learned from his disastrous airplane trip in Arctic waters near Greenland that there is a better chance of reaching the Pole by dirigible than by airplane.

#### 40,000 GATHER TO WELCOME U. S. AIRMEN.

BOSTON, Sept. 6. Fog and thick weather that rolled up along the Maine Coast brought about an unexpected landing by the United States world encircling Army aviators at Mace Point, near Brunswick, Maine, today, while a crowd of nearly 40,000 persons awaited them at Boston Airport. Reaching mainland of United States, after an absence of nearly five months in which they had practically completed the circumnavigation of the world, the airmen received by telephone congratulations of high Army officials who had gathered here to meet them.

#### ARTILLERY BROUGHT INTO ACTION.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 6. General Chi Shieh-Yuan, the Kiangsu leader, continued today to throw his strength against the right wing of the Chekiang army, the self-styled defenders of Shanghai, which rests on the estuary of Yangtze River at the little town of Lusho, West of Woosung, the other anchorage for Shanghai. His immediate objective is believed to be Woosung where he hopes to secure assistance from warships for his advance up Shanghai to Shanghai. He failed to make any headway there yesterday despite the use of artillery which both sides have now brought into action, and again today was being held according to the headquarters staff of the Chekiang Army.

#### GERMANY'S ADMISSION TO THE LEAGUE TO BE CONSIDERED.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. Definite development of the question of Germany's admission to the League of Nations is expected before the adjournment of the Assembly. Some of the delegations, including the British, favor an initiative by the Assembly to get Germany into the League.

#### HARD BATTLES.

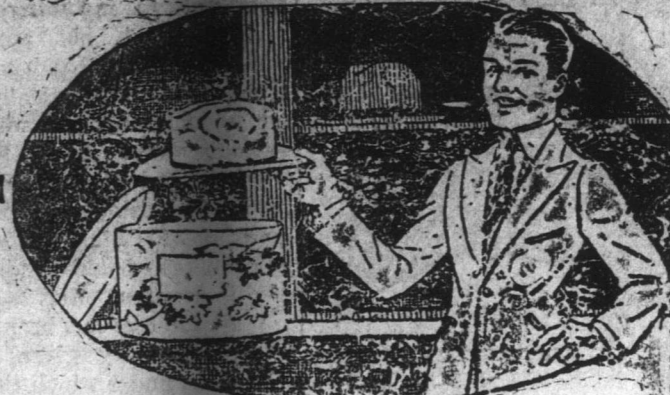
SHANGHAI, Sept. 6. A despatch from Lusho, 20 miles from here, states that the Kiangsu troops of General Chi Hsieh-yuan are attempting an encircling movement, and that there was intermittent fighting there this morning. No trenches have been dug and the soldiers are holding their positions behind natural mounds, graves, or anything that offers the slightest protection. Many of these warriors fire into the air instead of firing at the enemy. They are fed mostly on worm eaten biscuits or bread and tinned meats.

#### DISCUSSION ON DISARMAMENTS ENDS TO-NIGHT.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. The debate in the League of Nations Assembly on the reduction of armaments is expected to come to an end to-night when the whole series of questions touching on the subject will be referred to the Assembly Commission. Six speakers are scheduled for addresses at today's sessions, completing the debate begun by the British and French Premiers and furthered by ex-Premier Salandra, of Italy, Premier Theunis of Belgium and others. Its keynote is the establishment of compulsory arbitration in disputes between nations, as the most effective safeguard for the maintenance of world peace. Some students of international politics profess to see a hopelessly irreconcilable position between England and France despite their acceptance of obligatory arbitration, because of England's loathness to commit herself to engaging military penalties, and France's insistence that arbitration must be accompanied by military sanctions. The French statements in Geneva are optimistic.

#### Household Notes.

Chopped fried oysters or salmon mixed with tartar or chili sauce make a sandwich filling favored by the men. A delightful luncheon menu for a child is a cream soup, crackers, lettuce sandwiches, fruit sauce and cup cakes. Experts say that one should use eight parts of ice to one of salt when freezing a mixture. Rather coarse salt is best. If you make ice cream with an automatic freezer it will be smoother if stirred occasionally and scraped away from the sides. If you wish to mold ice cream, scald and chill and mold before packing.

## A Visit to H.M.S. Hood

Yesterday the City press representatives were enabled to pay a visit to the flagship of the Special Service Squadron, H.M.S. Hood, and had the privilege of an interview with Vice Admiral Sir Frederick Field, the officer commanding.

Embarking in the ship's launch at Topsail pier, the party were quickly conveyed on board, and were met by Admiral Field's Naval Secretary, Paymaster Commander Frank L. Horsey, O.B.E., D.S.C., who readily furnished the visitors with all kinds of information regarding the Squadron, the object of the cruise, their experiences during the world tour, and all the other hundred and one matters upon which information was sought.

First a word as to the general impression given by the great grey monster which has dropped her anchor in Conception Bay. She lies, in company with the Repulse and Adelaide, about two miles from Topsail pier, and about midway between the mouth of Manuels River, and Kelly's Island. The distance from the shore makes it impossible for one to form any conception of the Hood's size, and it was only when the launch approached that her huge dimensions could be appreciated.

Amidships she towers high above the water, but forward and aft she appears to be surprisingly low. But think of what lies beneath the surface! She draws 34 feet of water, her beam is 104 feet, and she is 860 feet in length. It seems almost inconceivable that such a huge bulk could possibly tear through the water at the rate of 35 miles an hour! More impressive, perhaps, than any other part of the ship at first glance are those wonderful 15-inch guns, silent now and resplendent in their paint and polished brass and steel, but it does not require a vivid imagination to picture them suddenly leaping into life and flinging their 14 cwt. projectiles at a target invisible to the human eye, twenty miles away.

The cost of this great war machine is approximately \$35,000,000, and her maintenance amounts to about \$2,750,000 annually. She can develop about 157,000 horsepower, and her complement of officers and men is 1,500.

Her fuel consists of 4,000 tons of oil and fifty tons of coal. She is driven through the water by four propellers, each of which is 17ft. 6in. in diameter. The main shafts are 300 feet long, and each of them weighs about 100 tons. The links of her cable are made of 3 1/2 inch bar iron and the anchor is 9 1/2 tons. Some idea of her size may be formed when it is realized that her painted surface is said to be about eleven acres. In a word she is the largest ship afloat, and is the latest in design and armament in naval construction.

**The Interview With The Admiral.**  
Ushered into the Admiral's quarters, the Press representatives were warmly welcomed by Sir Frederick Field, who described the 36,000 mile cruise which the squadron had made during its tour of the Empire, since November 27th, 1923. He expressed his gratification at the wonderful reception tendered the fleet everywhere, and referred with the greatest enthusiasm, to the interest the various Dominions were taking in the work of the Navy and their realization of the necessity for its maintenance in order to keep the Empire intact.

During the tour certain questions had invariably been asked relative to naval matters in connection with the Empire, and in order to furnish the fullest information to the public on questions in which they are particularly interested, Admiral Field has drawn up the following questions and answers for purposes of publication:

1. What is the capital cost of Great Britain's existing navy?
2. It is most difficult to give an accurate estimate of the capital cost of the Royal Navy as it stands at the present time. The navy not only comprises all the ships afloat, but it includes a large number of depot ships, training ships and shore establishments. In any estimate of the cost of the navy a very large item would consist of the dockyards at home and abroad, the fuelling stations and floating docks; (to mention only a few of the many appurtenances of a fleet in being). At a very rough estimate the original cost of the ships alone at the present time is in the neighborhood of at least £280,000,000. The dockyards and other establishments have been gradually built up in the course of years and it is quite impossible to give even an approximate estimate of what their total value is, other than that the figure would be a very large one.
3. What is the total contemplated outlay, per annum, for the next five years, and what is the present annual maintenance?

The Navy Estimates for 1924-25 amount to a total sum of £55,800,000. Included in this total are both the costs of maintenance and of new construction, and, so far as can be seen having regard to the fact that it will be necessary to replace ships as they become obsolete, it is practically certain that it will not be possible to reduce this figure for the next few years. Apart from the cost of maintenance of the fleet and shore establishments there must be classified under the heading "maintenance" all non-effective services; e.g., pensions to officers and men, gratuities and compensation allowances. The cost of new construction during 1924-25 is approximately £2,800,000 which, if deducted from the total Navy Estimates for this year, gives an expenditure on maintenance of about £248,000,000.

4. Can England continue to carry this load?
5. As is well known, the present situation in England is that there are over one million people unemployed, and the National Debt of Great Britain amounts to over six thousand millions of pounds sterling. It will be readily understood that, having regard to the necessity for meeting interest and sinking fund in respect of this debt and the urgent need for expenditure on peaceful reconstruction in other directions viz., on housing, education, roads, etc., the Government naturally only approve such expenditure on armaments as is absolutely essential to the safety of the Empire. However heavy the burden, the expenditure on naval defence, which amounts to nearly 3% per head per annum, must be borne if the security of the Empire is to be maintained. Any increased weight that the Dominions are able to shoulder will reduce the burden which has to be borne by the mother country.
6. Should Overseas Dominions directly or indirectly contribute, and why?

The interests and prosperity of the Empire as a whole entirely depends on its power to keep open its trade routes in the event of war. This is every bit as important to the Overseas Dominions as it is to the Mother country because the cutting of the trade routes, which are the arteries of the Empire, would result in the isolation of and disaster to the countries whose communications were severed. The Empire must be regarded as a whole, for, if any one of its component parts is isolated, it will affect the trade and supplies of all the others. The prosperity and existence of a Sea Empire rest on its sea communications just as the economic prosperity of the countries in a large continent, such as Europe, depend on good and uninterrupted railway communication. The Dominions who now contribute to the naval defence of the Empire do so in the following way and this is generally accepted as the most satisfactory method. The money which they vote for this purpose is expended solely on ships which are their own property and under their own control and only in the event of war would these ships be placed under the sole direction of the Admiralty; e.g., Australia pays for her own ships and also mans them, as far as possible, with Australian officers and men, bearing the whole cost of maintenance. In New Zealand the present system is that ships are lent from the Imperial Navy, but the cost of maintenance is borne by the New Zealand Government.

7. What percentage of the total cost should they contribute, and on what is this percentage based?
8. A Dominion can contribute towards the naval defence of the Empire in the following ways:—  
(i) Provision and maintenance of local defence forces.  
(ii) Maintenance of sea-going vessels lent by the Imperial Government.  
(iii) Provision of a sea-going squadron, to take over the protection of its own trade routes.

The extent to which a Dominion contributes in these ways is a matter entirely for Dominion governments to decide and must depend on their capacity to do so, having regard to such factors as national wealth, population and volume of sea-borne trade.

9. Popular opinion is that the capital ships will be replaced by submarine and aircraft. Is this impression correct?
10. I disagree entirely with this view. Take the case of the submarine. If a naval power decides to maintain submarines only, the opposing power can very easily and at small expense construct a number of high speed shallow draft anti submarine vessels, fitted with the latest detective apparatus and special offensive weapons against submarines. In this way it can practically limit the operations of the submarine to a comparatively innocuous range.
11. A power putting its trust in submarines would then be compelled, if it hopes to succeed at all, to build or acquire a type of surface vessel larger and with greater offensive powers than its opponent possessed, in order to drive off the anti-submarine craft and enable its own submarine to operate. Thus the process would continue until ultimately you would

**Small Amount of Coal**

**SUPPLIES HOUSEHOLD'S DAILY ELECTRICAL NEEDS.**

Two handfuls of coal when consumed in one of the large central stations to-day, will produce enough electrical energy to meet the needs of the modern householder for one day, according to J. F. Johnson, engineer at the South Philadelphia Works of the Westinghouse Electric Company, located at Essington, Pa., U.S.A. "Modern generating equipment has been so improved, chiefly in the matter of steam turbine generators, that only about one pound of coal need be burned to produce one kilowatt of electricity," said Mr. Johnson. "Thus, two handfuls, or about two pounds, of coal will produce two kilowatts, slightly more than the daily requirement for a seven or eight room modern home.

"This clearly demonstrates the increased efficiency of the modern steam turbine and also shows the attitude of the manufacturers of electrical generating equipment toward the ultimate consumer of electricity. "The modern engineer is chiefly concerned in producing equipment by means of which the greatest number of kilowatts of electricity may be produced from a given unit of coal. It is in cutting down the amount of coal required to produce the kilowatt of electricity that the engineer regards as his reward of valor."

The South Philadelphia Works of the Westinghouse Electric Company is devoted to the design and construction of steam turbines for all kinds of uses on land and sea.

**Diamond Field Will be Found in North**

Somewhere in Canada there is a diamond field. Nobody knows where it is, and its existence is a matter of supposition rather than actual knowledge. The supposition is based on the findings of some hundreds of more diamonds in sites on the international boundary, states Fort Arthur News Chronicle. Since these jewels have been found in widely separated areas and in the total absence of geological formation capable of yielding diamonds, the source of their origin is placed in Northern Ontario. The medium of their journey from the diamond fields to the place of their finding were some one of the glaciers that passed over the north of America thousands of years ago.

These glaciers ground mountains into flat lands, and left exposed the hills and plains valleys we now have. On the way down the glaciers carried the dust and dirt, resulting from the grinding process and, retreating, deposited it in the shape of earth and rocks. **The Manufacture of Electric Lamps**

E. S. MACKAY.

Made of possibly fifty different materials, the modern electric lamp requires more than that number of operations to manufacture and fit each component part into place to make the completed lamp. Roughly speaking, all incandescent lamps are made up of a glass stem, leading-in-wires, tungsten filament, a glass bulb, and a metal base. There are two types of incandescent lamps, the vacuum lamp and the gas filled, but with the exception of a few very important differences in make-up, the manufacture of the lamps is practically the same.

The first step is the preparation of the wires, which are the leading-in-wires, the filament and the support wires. The leading-in wires are made of a combination of metals that have the same rate of expansion as glass, so that when embedded in the glass they form an air-tight joint. The filament is made of tungsten and the perfecting of a method of drawing tungsten into a wire marked one of the most important steps forward in the manufacture of incandescent lamps. Tungsten filament, as it was first used, was made by forcing a mixture of tungsten powder and some binding material through a die, which produced a very brittle wire that could not be bent or handled cold. Tungsten filament wire is now drawn through diamond dies and is very strong, can be bent or even wound around itself cold, resists the action of most chemicals and will withstand high temperatures.

The first operation in actual lamp making is making the flare. This is made from a glass tube, the end of which is heated and spun into a flare by means of a carbon or steel penon inserted into the heated end at an angle while the tube is rapidly rotated. This flare facilitates sealing the stem tubing of the lamp to the neck of the bulb.

The stem is composed of the flare, the arbor, which is a glass rod cut to the proper length and the leading-in wires. The arbor and the wires are inserted in the flare. The end of the tube opposite the flare, and the end of the glass rod are heated in a gas flame, and when sufficiently hot are pinched together to form the steam press in which the leading-in wires are embedded.

The bulbs for the lamps are blown in iron molds at the glass works. The glass is gathered at the end of a blow pipe and placed in the mould, and as the operator blows into the pipe, he rotates it so that the finished bulb shows no seams or ridges where the parts of the mould join. When the blowing operation is completed, the bulb is cracked off from the blow pipe, leaving a long neck with a bead near the end. When received in the lamp factory, the bulbs are carefully washed in hot water and dried thoroughly, as good lamps cannot be made with bulbs which contain dust or any discolouring material.

The next step is called tabulating and is the attaching of the exhaust tubing, through which the air is exhausted after the lamp is completely assembled. In the case of Westinghouse type "C" gas filled lamps, the gas is put into the lamp through the exhaust tube after the air is exhausted. In tabulating, the bulb is put into a holder over a pointed flame which heats a spot on the bowl of the bulb, and compressed air is admitted through the open end, so that when the glass has softened to a sufficient extent the air pressure blows a hole through it. A piece of glass exhaust tubing is placed lightly against the hole and both the end of the tube and the bulb are heated so that the tube welds into the hole in the bulb. The tip on lamps is formed when the exhaust tube is melted off after the lamp is exhausted, but in the new design lamps now being made, the exhaust tube is inserted through the stem when the stem press is made and the tip is concealed under the base, so the end of the lamp is left perfectly smooth.

Having seen the bulb made and tabulated, let us go back to the stem, which is the part that holds the filament. Supporting wires are necessary on the filament, so these are inserted in the arbor in the following manner: The arbor is heated a little above the stem press until the glass is soft, when by pressing on the end of the arbor, a little round ball is formed at the soft part of the glass. This is called the button. While the button is still soft, the support wires are pushed into it, and as the glass hardens, the wires are firmly fastened in. The support wires at the end of the arbor are inserted in the same way.

The filament is wound on the support wires after it has been bent at proper intervals according to the size of lamp on which it is to be used. One end of the filament is fastened to one of the leading-in wires and the filament wound back and forth over the supports. The filament is then joined to the other leading-in wire. The filament is usually coated with a chemical preparation called a "getter," which is used to improve the maintenance of the light output.

**Our Game**  
Joseph Pennell, Supervisor of inland game and fisheries, was here recently. Mr. Pennell has been Supervisor of game gardens, in the district between Howley and Port au Basques, for the last fourteen years previous to this he had long been in close touch with the inland fish and game of the country, and perhaps no person in Newfoundland is better informed in these matters, and therefore qualified to suggest ways and means for their preservation. According to the supervisor, the West Coast rivers are holding their own as regards salmon and trout, but the once numerous and valuable asset, the caribou, will soon be exterminated unless new laws are made and rigidly enforced for their protection.  
All pioneers and Newfoundlanders to a marked degree, are improvident of natural assets, and inclined not to reckon with the future. Figuratively speaking, they appear ready and eager to kill the Goose that lays the Golden Eggs, regardless of the fact that with the killing of the goose the future supply of eggs is gone for ever.  
Take, for instance, the American buffalo. At one time, buffalo in millions, frequented the prairies of the North American Continent, and the supply seemed inexhaustible. To-day, owing to ruthless slaughter, not a single wild herd exists, and the animals now may only be found in a few parks and menageries.  
The caribou of this Island, that thirty or forty years ago roamed the barrens of the interior in countless numbers, have been shot down and slaughtered wholesale, like the American buffalo.  
The main factor reasonable for the slaughter seem, "to us" to be weak game laws: the apparent apathy of the Game Board in not providing adequate protection, under varying conditions, which evidently called for special protective measures, and last but not least, the opening of the Cross Country Railway, which gave easy access to the interior, and made the slaughter possible.  
About fifteen or twenty years ago, a small army of men from this side of the East Coast, proceeded to the Topsails each fall, in order to intercept and slay the deer. Here for weeks a deadly warfare raged and continued season after season.  
Sometimes three members of one family secured their quota, which meant nine carcasses for one house in one season. Besides, it is common knowledge that lumber camps to the eastward killed caribou by the hundreds, having regular hunters attached to camps, in order to supply them with venison. Not so long ago, foreign hunters coming to the country far exceeded the rod fishermen (and not a few of those foreign "sportsmen" sometimes with the aid of foreign guides, disregarded existing laws and slaughtered caribou without regard to limitations.) But of late, owing to the alarming decrease in game, few hunters visit us, and a big loss to individuals and the Government have already resulted.  
Wise legislation rigidly enforced, should yet succeed in restoring this valuable natural heritage to Newfoundland. We have a vast interior, the time immemorial home of this splendid game, by nature fitted to sustain caribou in thousands, and it would be worse than folly on the part of those responsible to allow their complete extermination. — Western Star.
