The schooner Julia F., Capt. Will Dunphy, beat her way in the teeth of a howling southerly breeze to the harbour bringing the sad news that John J. Cook had been drowned when his dory was swamped by a mountainous sea at

The two months between November 15 and January 15 find a fleet of thirty sailing vessels at South Ingonish prosecuting what is known locally as the fall fishery. These boats sell fresh to the National, Leonard and Maritime fish companies a catch averaging one hundred thousand pounds a day. Rough weather, unless it is extremely rough, does not prevent the vessels from going out every day to the fishing grounds five or six miles off. This morning the sea was quite heavy, but all the boats took a chance that late in the day more moderate weather would prevail. Instead, it

Editor Relates Booth Interview

INCIDENT OF 80 YEARS AGO. OTTAWA, Dec. 10-(C.P.)-P. D. Journal and a close friend of the late J. R. Booth, relates a conversation Mr. Booth had with him 30 years ago as an instance of his courage and far-

"In a newspaper experience of 45 years, in which there have been many picturesque episodes, I think the most remarkable occasion I have ever known centred on Mr. Booth. .

"It was 30 years ago or so. Mr. Booth had just completed the Parry Sound Railway, from Ottawa to Depot Harbor, on the Georgian Bay. As he already controlled a route from Offawa to Boston by the Canada Atlantic and its connections, the completion of the Parry Sound road gave him a through route from the Great Lakes to the ocean

"The Ottawa Board of Trade wanted to give Mr. Booth a banquet to celebrate the completion of the Parry Sound road. I was appointed chairman of the banquet committee. Mr. Booth heard what was in the wind, and came into my office to speak

"It was a raw day in November, if remember rightly. Mr. Booth had driven around in the little buggy he used to favor. He came into my office in his usual winter garb, a heavy frieze short coat, cloth cap with ear flaps, and wearing heavy woollen mitts. My office was a pretty shabby one, in the old building on Elgin street, and there wasn't much furniture in it except a stand-up desk and a couple of high stools. Mr. Booth climbed upon one of the stools, and started to talk in his usual matterof-fact way. He said he had heard that a dinner to him was mooted, and while he looked on the idea as a welcome honor from his fellow-citizens, plete, as regarded the Parry Sound road, and he would rather the testimonial was deferred until things were better settled.

"I ventured to ask what he had in

"I have built the Parry Sound road partly for my lumber busniess.' said Mr. Booth, 'but that won't do alone. I've got to have a good grain business from Depot Harbor to Boston to help. And there may be some difficulty getting grain cargoes from

"'What do you think of doing about it?' I asked.

"'Why if the shippers will not come my way, I will have to put some big boats on the lakes.'

"Mr. Booth was not a big man. I looked at the modest figure perched upon the stool with the rough coat and boots, the cloth cap and woollen mittens lying in his lap, controlling a thousand miles of railway and talking about a fleet of steamships, and I said 'The grain trade is pretty fixed in its present channels. Suppose you put boats on the Great Lakes, but can't get grain for Depot Harbor from those who control the present routes? "Mr. Booth said in his usual quiet voice, and without a trace of suggestion that he was making a remark anything out of the ordinary, 'Yes, that is possible. In that case, I guess I would have to build a railway on into the northwest

"I gasped. He was ready, if need be, to carry his plans into an enterprise of tens of millions more that would revolutionize the grain business of North America, and he was facing it as if it were a game of marbles.

"In my lifetime, I have never known any illustration on the force and confidence of business genius approaching what was offered there by the little figure perched on the stool."

Candy and Air to Runners

Have a chocolate, college athlete. Experiments made recently by Dr. Burgess Gordon and other Boston physicians contradict hard-hearted trainers who forbid candy.

Marathon runners were placed on high carbohydrate diets before the races, besides being supplied with candy and over-sweetened tea. Blood tests taken after the races showed far less exhaustion than was true of the same men in previous marathons. There was striking improvement in their general physical condition, the physicians declared, and the athletes made better running time than those who had not eaten chocolate.

New Engines for Motor Railways

While the efficiency and economy of the motor-ship at sea long has suggested the advantage of moter-locomotives, the chief drawback to practical use of the internal-combustion engine on our railways has been its lack of flexibility. In other words, because it is essentially a one-speed engine, it is found incapable of widely varying output of power to meet changing demands. Though remarkably economical on ordinary stretches of road, the motor-locomotive cannot start a heavy train unassisted for climb a steep incline.

Three of the most recent attempts o remedy this difficulty by auxiliary steam or electrical transmission were shown recently in Popular Science. The locomotve has just been completed for the Russian Government at the Hohenzollern Works in Germany. It employs electrical transmission, with five driving motors, placed one in front of each pair of wheels.

A 1200-horsepower Diesel sub ine engine forms the main power plant The radiators are adequate only cold weather. In warm weather a cooling tender must be added. Whi electrical transmission is found to involve a loss of 30 per cent. in efficienc this machine is said to be remarkably easy to control.

Young Lifer Gets Release From a Penitentiary

THE SON OF WEALTHY PARENTS, WHO WAS FOUND GUILTY OF A HOLD-UP MURDER.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9-Ire Perry, Jr. son of wealthy parents, given a life sentence in prison in April, 1922, for murder in a hold-up, has been releas-ed from the Joliet Penitentiary on

Police officials and prosecutors, who said Perry had confessed to two murders and about sixty holdups, which netted some \$200,000, stated they had received no notice of the parole which was made effective October 31. The victims in both instances were jewelers.

At the trial Perry pleaded guilty and a plea of leniency brought a life term instead of death. The Pardon Board first commuted the judge's sen-

The World's Largest Plants.

Be Your Own Weather Prophet

Be your own weather prophet, the Weather Bureau cannot always make forecasts for definite hours or for particular places. But any intelligent person ought to be able to do that. It is not really difficult, but just a matter that requires a bit of study and observation. If one will study the weather signs that are written plainly in the skies he can predict with reasonable accuracy the weather for his own particular locality from

Such local predictions are based upon atmospheric conditions, as revealed by the color of the sky and the appearance of the sun, moon and stars. This is no new discovery. When the Pharisees and Sadduceer asked Jesus to show them a sign from heaven, he said: "When it is evening, ye say. It will be fair weather; for the sky is red. And in the morning, it will be foul weather to-day, for the sky is red and lowering." These sayings from the New Testament represent correct observations. A red morning implies a moist atmosphere; hence the rain may be expected later in the day. A red evening sky means that the air contains so little moisture that rain within the coming 24 hours is improbable. To explain this paradox, which has to do with condensation of moisture into droplets and also with certain principles of optics, would take too long, but it is entirely accurate.

If at evening the sky along the western horizon is yellowish or greenish, it means that there is little moisture in the air, and that the next day will be fair. But if at evening the sky is overcast with a uniform gray, the atmosphere aloft is satur ated with moisture and the next day is likely to be rainy.

The air is always heavily laden with dust, upon which moisture condenses. If there is enough moisture in the atmosphere, droplets are formed and fall as rain. Rain dries the air by taking water out of it and at the same time cleans it of dust. It is on this fact that the old saying "Rain before seven, clear before eleven" is based; for early morning rain often clears the atmosphere of

water, causing the weather to clear. Much dust, or smoke, in the atmosphere makes the sun look red, and the color is deepened by the presence of moisture. When the air is heavily charged with dust particles that have become laden with moisture, you the sun as a fiery red ball. Thus a very red sun obviously suggests a very red sun obviously suggests a promising rain. There is truth in the old saying, "A

red sun has water in his eye." Notwithstanding a very common impression to the contrary, the moon has no influence worth mentioning upon weather, but its appearance depends upon conditions of the atmosphere, and hence affords useful indications:

"The pale moon doth rain, The red moon doth blow.

The white moon doth neither rain nor snow."

Much wisdom is wrapped up in these lines. For a pale moon implies thin clouds, such as run ahead of a general rainstorm. A red moon suggest a damp atmosphere, warning of a storia, and a white moon indicates dry air and absence of clouds.

A clear, or white moon is commonly understood to give warning of frost. Nor is that without good reason, inasmuch as the earth's surface heat radiates rapidly into a cloudless sky. Clouds interfere with this rapid loss of heat acting as a blanket, and so, by conserving it, tend to prevent

"The higher the clouds the finer the weather," is another old saying in which there is truth. It is not to be accepted, however, without modification. Small, high "woolpack". clouds do not contain enough moisture to produce any considerable rain or snow. But a large woolpack often develops a thunderstorm. If formed during the morning, it is likely to increase in size in the afternoon and yield a downnour.

The cirrus clouds, highest of all, composed of ice needles and floating nine or 10 miles above the earth, are forerunners of storms, being carried far ahead of the rains. Hence the saying "Mackerel scales and mares' tails make lofty ships carry low sails."

Often the base of a rain cloud envelops mountain peaks and ridges. When you see clouds resting on a mountain top, it may be accepted as an obvious warning of coming rain -usually not more than a few hours away. The breaking up of mist on a mountain top may be accepted as a

Russia is Opposed to the League

COMMUNIST LEADER SAYS THE UNITED STATES IS REALLY THE

MOSCOW, Dec. 8 .- Addressing the Moscow District Communist conference last night, A. I. Rykoff, President of the Council of Commissars, declared that Russia was prepared to abolish the Red Army and scrap all ammunition factories and war industries, provided the Bourgeois countries did likewise.

M. Rykoff characterized the League of Nations as an instrument of war and subjugation, and not of liberation. The European Powers in seeking to get Russia into the League wished her to make political capitulations in the East and economic sacrifices in the West. The Locarno agreements were as useless as the League to secure peace for the world. It was contended by M. Rykoff that the United States dominates Europe.

"Although the United States does not interfere in European affairs, and is not a member of the League of Nations," he said, "she is really the boss of post-Versailles Europe. No nation can enter into a treaty with another without the acquiescence of the United States. She has twothirds of the world's gold reserves and has captured most of the international markets from Europe. She is the only country in the world able to grant loans, and is the greatest stronghold of imperialism. She enslaves the greater part of the world economically, and Europe is becom ing more and more an American col-

Hand Vise and Pliers

SKILFULLY COMBINED.

A novel tool that combines pliers and a hand vise is the recent invention of W. A. Bernard, of New Haven Conn., who has made a life study of pliers. The tool is fitted with a thumb screw, which, when backed out as far as it will go provides a pair of parallel jaws for ordinary use around the workbench or the automobile.

Often, the user of pliers finds it necessary to hold them in clamped position for several minutesat a time; as, for instance, in filing a key blank to the outlines of another key. A thumb screw lock on this tool makes it possible to retain one or more objects firmly in position after the hand pressure is released. Thus it is esnecially useful where several operations are to be done without the necessity for releasing the work.

Filing operations on round stock are said to be greatly facilitated. The tool comes in handy also, it is said, for soldering small parts of a machine, ngine, or radio set.


