

THE LATE SESSION.

Statesmanship, as represented by the Dominion Ministry, is of a poor quality, and there is very little of it. In constitutional countries we can scarcely look for a display of those grand and magnificent conceptions which sometimes, under a Heaven-stirring inspiration, are formed in the minds of autocrats, and produce reforms so sudden, so sweeping, and withal so beneficial, as to astonish the world. We do not expect our statesmen to be Vasas, or Fredericks, or yet equal to Russian Peter; we do not even expect them to be Pitts or Peels, or Greys, for they are essentially of sections, sectional; and with our past experience as premises, our logic would be execrable did we draw the conclusion that they would ever be anything else. Nevertheless, we have a right to look for something better at their hands than anything we have yet received. While, as we have said, we do not look for an exhibition of broad, comprehensive and masterly statesmanship such as we read of in the histories of other countries, it is yet not unnatural that we should expect the possession of a mediocrity of talent to be proven by the introduction of measures whose undoubted merits were, that they were just and beneficial to all. While we ask much less than personal governments often give, we are at all times justified in looking for many things which they deny. It is our privilege not to entreat, but to demand that the men sworn to do justice to the country as a whole, should fulfil their vows, and not oppress one class or section for the special behoof of another. Yet the legislation of the last session was as exclusive as was consistent with safety, and the old game of making Ontario pay the piper while others enjoyed the amusement of dancing, has been again played successfully. We discover, to our sorrow, that Confederation has in no manner modified the bigotry of a Tory Administration, nor given them clearer and more correct views of duty.

The session just closed has been prolific of bills, but a remarkably small number of them were of general interest; and it is by no means improbable that some of these may call for revision at a future time. Matters concerning the North-West Territory have been arranged, and the fact is pointed out to us with no small degree of pride as a sample of what lofty statesmanship and accomplished diplomacy can do, when fairly put to the test. Well let the Government get credit for this feat—what next? They have patched up the Insolvent Act, done something in the matter of patents, given Nova Scotia a bribe of two millions, transacted some other matters of minor importance, got thoroughly frightened about Mr. Rose's banking resolutions, and then congratulated themselves (although the words were put into the mouth of His Excellency, the Governor General) on having done so much, and done it so well—in short on their possession of such splendid administrative abilities. Now this is carrying the joke a little too far, and to Upper Canadians it looks simply like adding insult to injury, and that is exactly what it is. Why should we have to pay a million and a quarter of dollars, no value whatever received, to men who would spit in our faces if they dared, to men who boast of their annexation principles, and of their intention to join the States as soon as possible after robbing us. The attempt to purchase the adherence of such characters is one of those incomprehensible acts of fatuity—or something more criminal—which the Macdonald-Cartier Government has been long in the habit of committing. Ontario, under both her old name and her new one, has borne a good deal, but the end will come.—O, Lord, how long! It was not enough that Cartier and his phalanx aided John A. into acceding to the most immoderate demands of Lower Canada, but that same squadron, with a few needy, greedy, sneering Bluesos as auxiliaries, must still carry on the work of spoliation on a grander and more extensive scale. To every thoughtful mind those things must appear very serious, more particularly since persistence in such reckless extravagance will inevitably fore-run disaster and ruin. The cloud that overshadows us is portentous, and gloomy, still we are not left entirely hopeless. Sir John's followers are growing restive, and there are grounds for indulging the belief that should they be called upon next session to endorse such iniquitous measures as this Nova Scotia subsidy, the manhood and noble feelings of many of them would prevail, and their leaders' occupation of dispensing special favors would be gone.

Success has the tendency of making some people insolent. Such appears to be its effect on the men at the head of the Dominion Government. They have so long had affairs their own way that they seem to consider it an insult for any person to ask them by what right they do these things. Yet such questions will be asked, and more emphatically than ever before. Even a moderate statesmanship could foresee this, and would, for its own safety, if from no higher motive, regulate its conduct a little more in accordance with the popular will. The patience of the purchase Parliamentary support, do give out sometimes, and generally power is bought cheaper and is longer retained by the evidencing of a desire to distribute justice impartially than by the conferring of largesses; and, besides, it is much less troublesome. Let us hope that the records of the next session will give cause rather than for praise and less for censure than those of the last, or that another and more efficient crew may man the vessel.

Royal Canadian Bank.

A meeting of the delegates appointed at the rural agencies, and of the Toronto shareholders of the Royal Canadian Bank, was held in Toronto on Friday, the 25th inst. The following report of the financial position of the Bank up to the 19th June, 1890.—Capital authorized by Act, \$2,000,000; do, paid up, \$1,172,813; promissory notes in circulation bearing interest, \$505,480; balances due other Banks, \$33,248.94; cash deposits not bearing interest, \$302,102.40; do, bearing interest, \$422,869.97; total liabilities, \$1,193,711.31. Assets—Coin, &c., \$173,220.91; real estate, &c., \$135,454.65; Government securities, \$128,911.10; notes on other Banks, \$47,453.99; balances due from other Banks, \$51,939.49; notes and bills discounted, \$1,853,308.82.

Mr. Harrison said that it must be remembered that the assets recouped comprehended \$900,000 had debts written off, though it was probable that some portion of that amount might be recovered. At the Fergus agency only \$250 are put down as loss, and in Galt none. The heaviest losses are—at Cobourg, \$89,084, Toronto \$70,000, Seaford \$58,624, Kingston \$32,331. Total bills discounted \$41,960,598, total loss \$300,992, total profit \$704,078, total stock paid up \$1,170,488, expenses \$236,244, net profit \$407,534.

Quite a long and angry discussion took place among some of the shareholders regarding the management of the Bank. The following gentlemen were recommended for election at the meeting to be held on the 5th of July: Peleg Howland, President; J. H. Dumble, J. Crombie, K. Chisholm, J. Taylor, Joseph Gould, J. McGee, Directors.

RESIGNED.—Hon. A. Borie has resigned his position as Secretary of the Navy, and Hon. Geo. H. Robertson, of New Jersey, formerly Attorney-General of that State, has been appointed to succeed him. Mr. Borie felt compelled to resign by the multiplicity of his family affairs.

An ignorant, but well meaning man, having been placed on the commission of the peace in a rural district, declared, on taking his seat as a magistrate, that it would be "his most anxious endeavour to do justice without fear, favor or affection; in short," said he, emphatically, "I will take care that on this bench I will never be partial or impartial."
