The agent who had forwarded them had got possession of all their money, and being destitute of funds, they were compelled to take shelter in the woods, near Section 7 of the new canal. Grasshoppers in Minnesota

Grasshoppers in Minnesota.

Governor Davis, of Minnesota, in response to circulars forwarded to different points of the State, has received answers to the effect that large numbers of young grasshoppers are being hatched in the following counties in the south-eastern part of the State: Lyons, Martin, Jackson, Nobles, Watonwan and Cottonwood, all of which have heretofore been among the finest wheat-growing counties on the line of the St. Paul and St. Croix Railway. The reports received are substantially agreed, and it appears from them that the hoppers came last year full grown from the south-west. In some places there were a few eggs natched last fall, but otherwise the eggs remained in the ground all winter, hatching out early this spring on the light soil with warm exposure, and continuing since to hatch out daily until the ground is covered by them. It is noticed that on ground which was ploughed over they have not yet hatched out, and it is possible the eggs were covered so deep by ploughing that they may not hatch out. On their first appearance the young grasshoppers make for the tenderest shoots of grass and the tops of young vegetables, eating everything above ground. Generally the growing grain is not seriously injured by them; though many fields have been stripped bare, but with favorable rains, these will be likely to grow again. The insect which has been noticed as destroying the eggs of the grasshoppers, is not larger than a grain of wheat, and under the microscope sight, appears to be a spider with legs and teeth to match. Its instinct leads it to bore into the ground where the cocoon is deposited, and entering to destroy the ten or twelve eggs contained in each cocoon. The grasshopper country is also supplied at this season with immense flocks of pigeons, blackbirds, &c., which are feeding almost entirely on the grasshoppers.

Then and Now.

On Thursday last Mr. Mackenzie visited lingston with a view to its suitability for a military school, and the following, anent his vieit, is well worthy of a perusal.

From the Kingston Whig.

The visit of the Premier to Kingston yesterday awakens curious recollections and reflections. Yesterday he came as Premier and ruler of Canada to inspect the military works of this city with a view to considering the suitability for the purpose of a military academy. A score and a half years ago he wrought at some of these same works as a mason. Then he was a very humble member of society; now he holds the highest position among Canadians. What a sermon these two facts preach out! We should be truly thankful that we have worked but the theory of popular Government and ordered society among us so successfully that no rung of the ladder is inaccessible to honest worth, and that no one's prospects need be blighted by caste or his progress arrested by want of wealth. Mr. Mackenzie, has,doubtless, his faults—his opponents say many—but all will admit that he has achieved his present proud position by honest hard work and inflexible integrity. He did not climb to place over corruption, for he is poor; he did not mount up as a demagogue, for he is free from demagogueism, and is above pandering to the vile. He resisted the temptation of office until it was his by political succession; and now rules the country with an unparalleled majority. Nor has power turned his head, for there is not a harder worker or more modes of unpretending man in Canada than its Premier, who according to his light, zoalously strives to do well by his country. Making all allowances for his shorteomings, hits history is a profitable one to study, one which cannot be reflected upon without great good to the country for it teaches by example the lofty success that may attend upon humble merit if it be alled with industry and perseverance.

The Prince of Wales, following the bad example of his predecessor, George IV., and his royal brothers, has been running into debt to the amount of \$300,000, notwithstanding his large income from the Duchy of Cornwall, and the princely allowance made by Parliament to himself and his wife, and the interest on the handsome amount left by his father. The aggregate income of the Prince is not less than \$450,000 a year, every ponny of which, it seems, he spends, and now he comes to Parliament "short," and asks that body to help him out. His reason is that the debts have been incurred in the performance of state duties which have been imposed upon him by the Queen. The Prince is a very shrewd fellow in his money-matters, and has always borrowed the funds expended on these occasions, refusing to use his own, and saying that in the end either Parliament or his mother must pay for that sort of thing. This is his side of the
