SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS

WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person wno is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old. may homestead a quarter section (160 across more or less) of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intending homesteader. DUTIES—SIx month's residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely own-afarm of a least 80 acres solely own-afar of six years from the date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead pat-ent) and cultivate fifty acres.

on. Thomas Taylor is Looking Ove a Trunk Road in Which Alberta is Interested

Nelson, May .- Hon. Thomas Tayor, ministerof public works, arrived Monday evening from the coast, meeting here J. H. Schofield, M.L.A. for Ymir, and spent yesterday in visiting various parts of the constituency. He left this morning on the Crow boat.

"My visit," said Mr. Taylor, "is in nnection with the trunk road through the southern portion of the province, When completed it will extend from Vanceuver to the Crow's Nest on the Alberta boundary, a distance of 750 niles. The most difficult section that over Hope Mountain, and for the ascent to the summit we have decided to make use of the old Sappers' and Miners' road, a very fine highway When the crescent on this side is made, we will connect with the existing road, which goes clear through to Rossland.

"At Trail it will be necessary to con struct a bridge across the Columbia. At or near Creston, on the Crow, the Kootenay River, will also have to be bridged, in addition to giving access east and west, I hope to see this trunk road give the province access to the states to the south by connecting a he border with their trunk roads. Although I have not yet taken up the matter, I feel sure the governments of matter, I feel sure the governments of states to the south, Washington and Idaho, will be willing to co-operate in a system of international trunk roads, "One result would be the bringing up of a great tourist automobile travel from those states into British Colum bia and the reverse. The government of Alberta is already co-operating by a trunk road in the south to connect with our trunk road, at the boundar,

As to the early commencement o railway construction, Mr. Taylor said that William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern Railway Company, was expected in Victoria in a few days, and would then make an

The minister left Victoria about ten days ago, on the present trip, and it was his design to follow the route of the trunk road as clearly as possible. He went down to Nicola, intending to this country by the Rossland road. The high water in the Nicola River, however, caused the abandon ment of that plan and he returned north to the main line, coming on here by the C. P. R. From here goes to Cranbrook, thence to Creston, thence to Fernie, and further along the Pass, and in each constituency he will be accompanied by the local member. About next Tuesday he will maké Nelson again and will go on to the boundary, visiting Grand Forks,
