

In conclusion I would say that there is no doubt the market next year will be exceptionally brisk, and that when the demand comes for produce we should be prepared to meet it.

It was not a reply, however. The operator wanted to know, he explained, who or where Rome was. No one in that part of the world had ever heard of it, and consequently the original dispatch was held pending more explicit information.




