When Russia was getting China more and more within its tightening grip the Czar appointed Pokotiloff in 1893 to be director in the Russo-Chinese bank in Pekin, and also to be advisor to the management of the Eastern China railway. It will thus be seen that M. Pokotiloff has had a good training in affairs connected with China and the Far East, and, according to all reports, he has profited greatly from his experience.

AWAITING PEACE TERMS.

Russian Press Réfrain From Further Conjectures.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 2.—With M. Witte in the United States and the discourse of the Japanese terms only a few days away, the papers generally refrain from conjecture as to the outcome of the megotiations. The Novoe Vremya and Prince Ouktomsky's organs, the Viedomosti and the Dawn, being the only exceptions.

The bellicose Novoe Vremya, which heretofore has scouted the chances of peace, somewhat changes front in commenting on a New York despatch to the effect that the American press was also pessimistic. It advises foreign journals of Russia's preparedness to continue the struggle.

R. M. Palmer Tells of Notable **Exhibit at the Winnipeg** Exposition,

Objects and Aims of Government Policy Is Also Outlined.

Manitoba Market to Be One of the Principal Points for Shipment.

THE Winnipeg Free Press in its issue of Thursday last had the following: Mr. R. M. Palmer, the fruit commissioner for British Columbia, was induced to give a little talk yesterday on the aims and objects of the British Columbia government in making exhibits of fruits. objects of the British Columbia government in making exhibits of fruit at the various fairs. Mr. Palmer said:

"The most important object is to promote the sale of British Columbia fruit in Manitoba and the Territories. The orchard areas of British Columbia have been widely extended during the last three years. The area in fruit now exceeds 14,000 acres, and by the spring of 1906 at least 20,000 acres will be planted in orchards. At the present time the fruit market which is reached from Calgary and Edmonton is largely controlled by British Columbia fruit, and Regina and Saskatoon are the next objective points as being nearer to our large producing centres. ## Figuring on Sockeye Run

Sound Canners Think Large Run Will Commence With Next High Tides.

Many Fish Brought to Port From Traps Yesterday - Sunday Closing.

Blaine Cannerymen's Views on Observance of the Sunday Closing Law.

HE tug Burrard arrived in port yesterday afternoon with a scow well laden with sockeyes taken from the traps of Finlay, Durham & Brodie. It is estimated there were 20,000 fish on the scow in tow of the tug, which left port last night to take the fish to the Fraser. The run yesterday was not as heavy as in previous days, the catch reported from the traps of Messrs. Todd and Munsie being 15,000 fish, which were taken to the cannery at Esquimalt. Catches ranging from 10,000 to 14,000 were reported from other traps. The run is slackening, and it is reported from some traps that humpbacks are appearing.

A Blaine despatch says a canneryman of that city, when asked regarding the observance of the closing law on Sunday, said: HE tug Burrard arrived in por

"There are no fish going past the traps today, so there is no fishing being done, to the traps would doubtless be open.

"There is no use getting into trouble by violating the law unless we can get enough fish to pay us for such violation, and that we could not do today, so we are not fishing."

The fact that the closed day on the Canadian side is the same as that on the American side, some cannerymen say, works a hardship on the American fishermen without benefiting the salmon industry, as the fish that pass the American traps today will reach the Fraser viver and fall into the hands of the Canadian gill-netters and purse-seiners tomorrow.






