This is greatly due to its dramatic concentration and to the richness of coloring in the orchestral accompaniments which distract very largely the attention of the andience from the movement of the story. The choruses mainly, however, are marvels of close choral writing, with rich melodic and harmonic effects, while the orchestration is masterly in the extreme. The established canons of musical composition are often set aside, and the most startling chords and discords show themselves as figures in a phrase, which at its completion justifies the composer's boldness. The purely orchestral movements are characterized by a strength, dignity and gorgeousness of phrase and color that is met with only in the works of Liszt and Wagner among the composers of the present day, and which will undoubtedly herald a new era in the treatment of religious subjects. The Philharmonic society scored a splendid success in its performance last night. A chorus of over 400 voices, assisted by an orchestra of seventy pieces, was presented to the audience which filled the large pavilion, and which represented the taste and culture of the city. The choruses were sung with fire, boldness and energy, and at the same time, with more attention to light and shade, and the correctness of phrasing and expression than has ever been achieved by the society. The orchestra naturally might expect severe criticism after the recent visit of Dr. Damrosch's fine band ten days ago, but it suffered no loss by the comparison. Without taking into consideration the fact that most of its members are amateurs, and most of its professional assistants are from a distance and therefore unable to attend but one rehearal, the orchestra needs no apology. Never in the history of the Philharmonic society has its orchestra played with so much crispness, clearness and breadth of tone, and never has it played so delightfully, easily and smoothly. The plaintiff Hendrie protested against this agreement, and desired at a meeting of the board of directors sideration of the question postponed, but a majority of the directors refused, resisted the delay and insisted on the terms of the agreement being carried out. The proposal of the Grand Trunk was that they should have the line on the following terms: A rental of 27½ per cent of the gross earnings up to \$500,000; 25 per cent of all the gross earnings from \$400,000 to \$500 000, and 12½ per cent for all over \$500,000, and to guarantee that the minimum rental should not be less than \$100,000. Certain works were also to be performed by the Grand Trunk. The plaintiff alleges that these terms were most unfavorable. The North ern railway company then made an offer of 35 per cent on the gross earnings up to \$350,000, 25 per cent for the next \$500,000. 20 per cent for the next \$100,000 and 12½ per cent for all over \$500,000 The proposal was rejected, however, and an agreement was entered into on the 13th of May. At a meeting of bondholders held on the 28th June 1881, to raiffy the agreement, it is contended that the plaintiff was not permitted to vote on account of the bonds he held. He also charges that the agreement was hastily and improvidently entered into at the instigation of the defendant and without independent legal advice or due consideration, and it was unfair and unjust to the plaintiffs in its terms and that it should not be enforced against the plaintiffs, and that the said agreement is of such a nature the delay and insisted on the terms of the the plaintiffs in its terms and thujust to the plaintiffs in its terms and that it should not be enforced sgainst the plaintiffs, and that the said agreement is of such a nature that specific performance shall not be decreed. 

This amount is urgently required to meet the cost of renewing certain mains laid down many years ago during the Furniss management, which, owing to increased consumption, are now too small and insecure for the service demanded from them; and also for mains much needed in the newly opened districts of the city, which are at present without any supply for domestic purposes and fire protection.

It must not be forgotten that ever since the works have been in the hands of the city, the property in the unsupplied sections has been taxed for its share of the expense of maintaining the Waterworks and Fire Departments, without receiving any benefit therefrom, and now that this outlying property is being rapidly built up and settled, it is but justice that it should be supplied with water in common with the rest of the city.

Should the By-law fail to meet with the support of the Property Owners, a difficulty will arise, of which there seems but one solution, viz, the placing the amount in the estimates of next year, thus making an addition of at least a mill and a half to the rate of taxation.

It is confidently presumed that the fairer course will be sus-tained of spreading the pay-ment of the amount over forty years by the issue of debentures. On these views, therefore, your support of the By-law is requested.
