A CITY UNDER WATER

Ruin Wrought by Floods in the Far West.

BURNED BENEATH AN AVALANCHE.

Disastrous Week of Elements in Oregon and Idaho—Rain and Melting Snows Combine to Form a Deluge—The Streets of Portland and Boise are Flooded—An Idaho Town Overwhelmed by an Ice Slide—Several Lives Lost—Great Damage to Property.

SEE WANTS SQUAD.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 5.—The town is flooded. Owing to the fact that business houses took time to clean up yesterday nearly all the front-street houses had to clear their front doors. At 11 o'clock this morning Superintendent Campbell gave orders to the bridge officers to close the bridge. Half an hour later the order was made applicable to pedestrians. At 3 p.m. yesterday a drift of 500 cords of cottonwood broke loose and floated down against the dry house and a few minutes later a building from Oregon City came along and struck in the same place. The dry-house was carried away, containing about \$600 worth of oak and ash lumber. Three other buildings on the factory side are liable to be carried away, placing \$10,000 worth of property in danger of total loss.

No trains have arrived or departed since last Saturday. Between Troutdale and Conville there is hardly a stretch of 100 yards of track that is not covered with mud. In some cases the mud covers the tracks to a depth of several feet. The Southern Pacific is dead, and as its southern wires are down there is no means of learning the date of the road. No trains are moving at all. At 3 o'clock this afternoon no pedestrians except those dressed in long boots could find their way from Washington to Ash, the water being two feet deep across the street. At Stark-street the east side of First-street was beginning to flood. The street was covered with mud. The steamers Danube seems to be extremely popular. She is moving at a slow pace. The east side approach of the railway bridge with her bow pointed down the street. A great mass of logs and driftwood is lodged against her stern and the mass is increasing. She is right where the terrific current spends its full force on her, and there is no way by which she can be relieved from her situation. Her bow is only a few feet from the railroad bridge and it would seem almost possible to move her and prevent her from being swept against the steel bridge just below. All afternoon great trees pounded against the mass of logs and driftwood. She is held to the wharf by about 40 lines.

AN UNPRECEDED FLOOD.

Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars Will Not Cover the Loss.

JACKSONVILLE, Ore., Feb. 5.—A phenomenon never before known in the history of Oregon since last Friday, which in connection with the melting snows in the mountains has caused the greatest flood ever known since that time.
