LIGHT BRAHMA BREEDING.



R. Ghas. W. Adams in the *Poultry Monthly* speaks of some light Brahma chickens which were nearly black when first hatched, he had five, four of which he raised, three pullets and a cockerel. He says of them "They are nice chicks every way, but are so dark in under color as to give them a bluish-gray appearance and the cockerel has black ticks in nearly all of the saddle feathers, some of them an inch long; he has very black wings and the leg and toe feathering is mostly black." He asks "Should I consider them as culls, or as valuable to mate with good birds that lack in color of wings, tails and hackles?"

I wish to use the above as a text upon breeding light Brahmas.

The beauty of this breed is greatly enhanced by the brilliant black in the hackles and in the tail, contrasting with the white edging of the hackles and the coverts of the tail. There is a strong tendency in the breed to lose the brilliancy of these black markings, so strong in fact that by taking advantage of it and using only the birds which have the least black in them, in a few generations pure white Brahmas can be bred, as they have been. The problem of the breeder. then, is how he shall keep up this brilliancy in the black markings and at the same time prevent the black from creeping up into the web of the feathers of the back, showing on the surface where it should be pure white and disqualifying the specimen. And this problem is solved by using one sex with dark undercolor. Just such birds as Mr. Adams describes, though apparently now too dark for exhibition purposes, mated to the opposite sex with pure white undercolor and weak in flights and hackles, will produce admirable results. Such birds are not to be regarded as culls, but as of great value to the breeder whose stock is failing in color.

A few years age I judged the fowls at Augusta, Georgia, a gentleman there showed some beautiful light Brahma pullets, so far as surface color was concerned, but they failed badly in the flights, and the hackles were short of the desired amount of black. He told me that it was impossible,

in that climate, to breed good black in hackles and wings. I thought differently, and told him I believed I could procure for him a cockerel that would correct this defect. He commissioned me to do so, and on my return home I went to the yards of Mr. Russell M. Joslin, since deceased, who had a nice stock of light Brahmas and examined the cockerels he had, I found two that would answer my purpose, one of Mr. Joslin's breeding and one bred by Mr. I. K. Felch. The Felch bird was a little the better of the two and I tried to purchase him, but he was not for sale. I then purchased the other bird and shipped him to the Georgia gentleman.

The next year I again judged at Augusta. As I came to the class of light Brahmas I found a collection of pullets that were almost perfect. The hackle stripes were brilliant black, the wings and tails were strong in color, and as the birds were otherwise admirable, they received a high score. When the cards were put up I found that these pullets belonged to the man for whom I had purchased the cockerel the preceding season, and on inquiry learned that they had been bred from him. This cockerel had a very dark undercolor, beautiful stripes in hackle, flights that were mainly solid black, very black tails, and was indeed, throughout a very dark bird. He proved to be exactly what this Georgia gentleman needed for his stock.

Another light Brahma exhibitor at this show, seeing the excellent pullets that this bird had begotten, tried to purchase him from the owner, but found that twice the price that was paid for him originally would be no inducement to the owner to part with him, and yet this bird was not a show bird, would not score very high, and for exhibition purposes was far from valuable. But as a breeding bird, his chickens proved that he was extremely valuable and his owner prized him accordingly

One thing more, such very dark chickens as Mr. Adams describes, though valueless for exhibition purposes now, may be very valuable exhibition birds another year. The tendency in light Brahmas is to grow lighter in color with each succeeding moult Many o'd fowls lose considerable in their scores because of this tendency, though beautiful as chickens they have lost as fowls the proper proportion of black, and hackles, wings and tail show too much white. These very chickens of Mr Adams, though having a superabundance of black now, may with age obtain exactly the right proportion and be able to win over the specimens which to day are properly regarded as their superiors. Were they mine I should prize them first of all as breeders, and secondly as the probable winners as fowls, among my stock.

POULTRY SAYINGS.

HICKS hatched in September will taste good in January and are not half the trouble to raise most people suppose.

Broilers cost 10 cents per pound and rarely drop below 20 cents in the best markets.

No matter how great your reputation as a fancier, drop your advertising a single year and you will lose it.

There is just as much in the poultry business as you have the patience and industry to make out of it.

The light Brahma is one of the best all year layers in spite of its great size. It is a good way removed from the Cochin.

The perfect all-purpose fowl is yet in the future but Wyandots and P. Rocks approximate the ideal.

The greatest growth in the shortest possible period of time is the result to be sought in a market fowl.

DO CAPONS PAY?

T is not likely that capon raising will ever be a great industry in this country. It has not been sufficiently shown that there is any profit in the business. must be kept so long before marketing that the extra cost of feed balances or more than balances the difference in price. Besides, the market is limited, and it is doubtful if the ordinary consumer could tell the difference between a capon and a good plump pullet on the table. The operation is in itself very cruel not to say barbarous. The idea of comparing the caponizing of a cockerel to the castration of a pig or sheep is ridiculous. The operation on the latter animals is comparatively painless, while in operating on a fowl the most important organs of the bird are uncovered, entailing great danger and suffering. We have seen articles by parties claiming great profits for the business, but investigation generally traces such articles to those having caponizing instruments to sell.

A writer in the Fanciers Journal coincides with above opin-

ions strongly and gives his experience (and experience is the charged the duties of judge at the Central Canada Exhibitrue teacher,) as follows:-

"The good results that were to crown our labors, being of the opinion that if we would take the same birds and feed them properly after separating them from the hens we would get as good results. We took a light Brahma-Plymouth Rock cross and caponized six of them. At the same time we took six of the same cross, separated them from the pullets and fed them on food that we thought would make them grow rapidly and take on flesh. After three or four days we fed the caponized fowls exactly the same as those that had not been operated upon, and as I had predicted at the start the ones that were not caponized weighed heavier than the ones that were."

Not a very good showing for the result of a painful operation. It is yet to be shown that caponizing is a success financially, and until demonstrated it is not an experiment for beginners to go into.

WORLD'S FAIR SHOW.

T was a big one no doubt, but not as large as we expected and but for the Canadian entry would have in many classes been very slim indeed. The transportation arrangements for the Canadian exhibit were bad, could not be much worse. The Toronto birds left on Wednesday morning and did not arrive in Chicago till Sunday morning, the attendants having a terribly rough time of it, no passenger car having been attached. The exhibit was sent forward in seven cars and one man was detailed to look after and feed the inmates of each car. Several deaths occurred owing to the long confinement and knocking about and more are sure to follow. The superintendent, Mr. A. Bogue is not to blame for this, as he states that until the last moment he was kept entirely in the dark as to the arrangements made.

The birds were penned by the well-known firm Spratts Patent of New York, under the superintendence of that prince of hustlers, T. Farrer Rackham, ably assisted by his lieutenant, Murphy. The buildings were very poor, the large cattle barns dark and open to "the breeze that blows," not always mildly in Chicago.

Mr. George Seeger, Jr, made an admirable superintend. ent and was affable and kind to all with whom he came in

for a man to be more obliging and any defects in buildings or details were certainly not due to him: On Monday October 24th he was presented with a gold medal, subscrib. ed for by the exhibitors and judges, and suitably engraved. Mr. J. H Drevenstedt read the following address:-

"At the request of the Exhibitors and Judges at this great Columbian Exhibition of Poultry and Pigeons, I am instructed to present you with a gold medal, suitably inseribed with words that fully and heartily represent the feelings of every one of us. We are aware that your path has not been strewn with roses, but the few briars that have been hurled at you, glanced off like the proverbial water on a duck's back.

"This is, I assure you, a great surprise, and coming as it has, gives me one of the greatest pleasures of my life. It was my intention to call as many of the fraternity together as possible, and extend to them my kindest regards, but Mr. Drevenstedt has beat me—he must have got on to my arrangements.

Gentlemen, my motto has always been "fair treatment to all," and, as Mr. Drevenstedt said, my path has not been strewn with roses, but I have made the best of anything that came before me, and, with just one exception, have not lost my temper. You all well know the circumstances pertaining to it. I have tried hard to please all, and believe I have succeeded. HINTS FOR BEGINNERS ON THE KEEPING OF FOREIGN BIRDS.

(Continued from last month.)

EW birds—If you are wise, you will keep your birds in pairs. As a rule, obtain your birds direct from the dealers and as soon after their arrival in this country as possible. Be suspicious of puffy and overtame See that they are sound in feet, wings and beak, and that they have not been pinioned, i.e., have not had the end of the wing cut off at the joint most remote from the body. Some dealers always pinion many kinds of birds, as it makes them tame, i.e., takes the heart and life out of them. Such a practice is defensible in the case of some ground birds and water-fowl which are given a home for life at such a place as the Zoological Gardens.; but, as a general practice, it is barbarous and abominable. I once came across a pinioned Goldfinch, and I have in my possession at this moment a specimen of the rare and beautiful Trichoglossus ornatus, with both wings mutilated, and consequently hopelessly ruined. There is

no fixed price for Foreign Birds. The prices differ according to the time of the year, the number in the market, and the fancy of the dealer, who frequently does what he can to drive away custom by charging beginners exorbitant prices. There are advantages in keeping common birds. You can obtain good specimens, and in pairs; and if you lose one you can replace it without much difficulty, and at little cost. Some of the rarer kinds are very difficult to obtain, especially in pairs, a lost bird can hardly be replaced at any price, and you have to pay fancy prices often for very bad birds. Many interesting varieties, common in their own country, are rare here because there is a little demand for them. Dealers have to study the fashions, - Fur and Feather
