THE G. T. ROOMS LOCOMOTIVE DEPARTMENT.



HESE rooms were opened on June 5th, 12 M., in the presence of Messrs. Wankling, Assistant Mechanical Superin-

Mayer tendent. and Smith, Locomotive foremen and J. J. Gartshore, Esq., manager of the Toronto Car Wheel Manufacturing Company. The rooms consist of a large well furnished reading room about 40 x 35 feet, also capacious eating, sleeping, bath and wash rooms. About 80 men came in and examined and used the room. The first hour we counted 50 at one time. All appeared delighted, and thankful to the heads of their department for the generous, appropriate and much needed gift.

Mr. John Earls, Asst. General Freight Agent of G. T. R. conducted the first religious service on Tuesday the 12th, at 12:30 noon, and Rev. H. M. Parsons addressed the men. It is proposed to continue this service each week. On the 19th. Messrs Gartshore and Cole (the travelling Secy. of the Dominion Y. M. C. A.) spoke at the meeting. It is our purpose to aid in holding a profitable religious meeting every Lord's day also. management of these services is deputed to Messrs. Earls, Gartshore and the Railway Secretary, and we require one man from the shops or engines to co-operate with us. Who shall it be?

Great credit is due to the company for what they have done and also to the men for the steps taken to sustain and preserve the rooms. It is our intention with the co-operation of the men to arrange an educational meeting on Thursday at noon, to discuss all important matters pertaining the mind and body. Medical. Sanitary, Literary, Musical, Mechanical and other talks by specialists in the various departments of Physical and Social Science, leaving each alternate week for free discussion on the subject.

The verdict of all is that nowhere has a more propitious start been secured, and it is earnestly hoped that all will appreciate the use of the rooms.

IN MEMORIAM.

H. ROADHOUSE.



N the 4th day of June, Conductor Roadhouse of the G. T. R. was called to his rest. deceased was of a genial nature

and was greatly beloved by his fellow-employees, and respected by the travelling community, he was a sober and faithful railway-employee, but like many others was careless about the "one thing needful," viz.: the salvation of his immortal soul, but it was evident to those who attended to his spiritual welfare that the Spirit of God was striving mightily with him, and in the first conversation which a friend had with him about preparing for death his words were, "I was just saying a few days ago, I had put this off too long." But his mind appeared to have been fully made up to "redeem the time," and he appeared to drink in the blessed gospel of Salvation, and on Wednesday, May 23rd, the blessed Saviour revealed himself to his heart as "The bread of life" which "If a man eat thereof he shall not die."

From that hour until the moment of death he rested in the Lord Jesus Christ, and lived in continual prayer. His testimony before his fellow-employees who visited him made a deep impression on them, and some of the most careless said if they had not seen it with their own eyes they could not have believed the transformation which had taken place. Rev. Mr. Cayley of St. George's Church, was unremitting in his attendance on deceased, and at the funeral spoke feelingly of the spiritual hope of the departed and implored his fellow-employees to prepare for the great change that awaits all, and may come at any moment to them from the hazardous nature of their employment.

Henry Roadhouse is dead, but yet speaketh. May the impression made upon his fellow-employees be a lasting one, and may it induce many of them to make preparation for the great change now, while they are in health and strength.

Stockwell he would have been the last of our number we should have selected as likely to die soon, and humanly speaking any one could have been better spared. He was to have been present with Mr. E. D. Ingersoll at the reception of our Bro. Munro at Troy June 7, but that day he felt indisposed, and in 8 days was a corpse. Truly our life is but "a vapour," let us see that our work is done as was Moses' when he came to the verge of Canaan, and as was Joshua's when the Land was divided among the Jews.
