### VARIATION OF THE COMPASS.

*From the Records of Her Majesty's Magnetic Observatory.*

The mean variation at Toronto, for the year 1817, was 1° 36' West (nearly); it increases about 3' every year. The variation undergoes a daily change, being least from 7 to 8, A.M., and greatest from 1 to 2 P.M. The variation is least liable to fluctuations in the afternoon; it is near its mean value at 10 A.M., and 6 to 7 P.M.

The Magnetical and Meteorological Observatory was founded by Her Majesty's Government in 1840, in concert with similar establishments in other Colonies and in India. Similar establishments have been maintained at Washington, Philadelphia, and Boston, in the United States, and in most European countries.

## BY AUTHORITY.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE PRESERVATION AND MANAGEMENT OF THE  
PUBLIC WHARF IN CHURCH HILL PUBLIC COVE,

Made and established the 25th day of June A.D. 1850. by the Governor and Council, in pursuance of the Act 13th Victoria, cap. 11:

No. 1.—The Keeper of the Market House for the time being shall be the Wharfinger, who shall have the charge and superintendence of the said Wharf; and to whom all Rates and Dues of Dockage and Wharfage shall be payable.

No 6—Masters of Vessels to be accountable for all damage arising from the want of proper and sufficient fenders, or any other neglect or improper conduct whereby the Wharf may be injured.

No 7—All articles put upon the Wharf to be at the risk of the owner of the same, and if not removed in forty eight hours, to be subject to the same Wharfage as in the first instance; and so on for every forty eight hours until removed.

## DESCRIPTION OF THE LIGHTS.

*Fort Amherst*—This is a Stationary Light, on the Southern head of the entrance of St John's Harbour.

*Cape Spear*—This is a powerful Revolving Light burning at an elevation of 275 feet above the level of the sea, and showing a brilliant flash at intervals of one minute. In clear weather it may be seen from sea, in any direction, at the distance of thirty miles.

*Harbour Grace*—This is a powerful Fixed Light situate on Harbour Grace Island, in Conception Bay, extending Eastwardly or seaward in a direction by Compass from North East to South West.

*Bonavista*—This Light revolves every two minutes, showing a red and white flash alternately; and is elevated 150 feet above the level of the sea.

*St. Peter's*—A Light House has been erected by the French Government on Gallantry Head, near Cape Noir. The Light is a fixed one. It burns at an elevation of about 210 feet above the level of the sea. It may be seen (in passing by the S) from W N W to N N E, at the distance of 18 or 20 miles in clear weather. In passing by the N, it is shut in by high land from N N E to W N W.

*Cape Pine*—The Light recently erected on Cape Pine, on the South Coast of this island, will be exhibited on and after the 1st day of January, 1850, from Sunset to Sunrise, for the benefit of Navigation.

The character of this Light is that of a BRILLIANT REVOLVING LIGHT, of which the greatest intensity will be apparent in every direction seaward three times in a minute. It will burn at an elevation of 302 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather at a distance of 30 miles.

The erection is a round Tower 50 feet high, painted with Bands of Red and White alternately.
