

**Opposition to G.T.R. Bill** Grows in House and Senate

### Special to The Toronto World.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—The opposition to the Grand Trunk bill is stiffening in the house and a still more bitter fight is expected in the senate. The government supporters are standing together in the house, the only de-fection so far being the opposition of Gen. H. H. McLean, M.P. for Royal. N.B. In the senate, however, a number of Conservatives may join hands with the Liberals in opposing the bill.

No less than six government supporters in the upper house are said to be likely to vote against the Grand Trunk bill. They are Senator Smea-ton White of The Montreal Gazette; Senator J. S. McClellan, of Nova Scotia; Senator G. G. Foster, of Montreal, and Senators Gordon, Nicholls and Lynch-Staunton, of Ontario.

### To Fill Senate Vacancies.

Their defection would reduce the government's majority to a narrow margin, and it is therefore understood that the four vacancies in the senate will be filled almost immediately. The vacant seat in British Col-umbia will be filled by the appointment of Hon. Martin Burrell, secretary of state. A number of gentlemen are mentioned for the three vacancies in Ontario, and it is reasonably certain that Gerald White, ex-M.P. for North Renfrew, and Hon. T. W. Crothers will be chosen. This should ensure the speedy passage of the bill, but if anything like

deadlock occurs in the senate, the governor-in-council may make eight additional appointments, two from the Maritime Provinces. two from Que-bec, two from Ontario, and two from the west. This power to "flood" the senate has never been exercised, but the government will not hestate to use the power should it be necessary to pass the Grand Trunk bill at this session of parliament.

The canvassers, who were retarded by the rain of the day before, got down to business in earnest, and the results of their labors will be made known at a luncheon in the King Edward at 12.45 today. R. A. Stapells announced at headquarters last night that no com-plete figures were available, but aplete figures were available, but ap-proximately \$40,000 had been secured proximately \$40,000 had been secured. The formal opening ceremony in front of the city hall at noon was a decidedly picturesque affair and was witnessed by thousands of citzens, who cheered lustily when Nelson's sig-nal was holsted on the flag pole, which was rigged with yards to represent a mast of Nelson's time. On the reproduction of a ship's bridge of the Nelson period stood the Bishop of Toronto, Mayor Church, Miss Church, A. M. Hobberlin, R. A. Stapells, Aemilius Jarvis and Col. Cecil G. Wil-liams. Beneath them on the lawn act-

Beneath them on the lawn act-ing as a guard of honor were a couple of hundred sailor boys of the naval brigade with their 12-pounder gun and their boat representing a landing party. Overhead airplanes performed remark-able feats , and as Miss Church gave the order to hoist Nelson's signal, Col. Barker, V.C., flying a captured German eirplane dronned a basket of remark airplane, dropped a basket of roses, which was presented to her after it had got into difficulties with the wires.

Williams ex-tolled the worthy objects of the drive and appealed for support of every citizen. Victory Loan 1919, he graciously consented to the use of his Coat of Arms on a flag, which is to be the prize of honour for districts achieving their quota in the loan.

In dedicating "The Prince's Flag" at Ottawa on Labor Day, His Royal Highness said in part:-

"It is a great joy to me to be associated with the loan, which is the bridge between war and peace, and which is finishing off the job."

"I hope every city and district will win my flag."

Striking, and beautiful in design, this flag will form not only an unique memento of Victory Year, but a lasting and outstanding souvenir of the visit of His Royal Highness-a visit which will remain as one of the most memorable events in Canada's history.

### + + + + +

The reproduction above shows the design of the flag. The body is white, the edge red; in the upper left hand corner is the Union Jack, and in the lower right hand corner the Prince of Wales' Coat of Arms.

The flag is made in two sizes, 4 feet 6 inches by 9 feet for small cities, towns and villages, and 7 feet by 13 feet 6 inches for cities of over 10,000 population.

Canada has been divided into canvassing districts by the Victory Loan Organization. Each city forms one district. Other districts have been determined according to population.

Each of these canvassing districts has been allotted a certain amount in Victory Bonds to sell. To win the Prince's Flag, therefore, a district has to sell its allotment. That is the one and simple condition.

Anticipating that many districts will buy far beyond their allotment, the organization decided that for each

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twenty-five per cent. excess of the quota one Prince of Wales' Crest be awarded. Thus the workers in a district doubling its quota will be the proud winners of four small crests for their Honour Flag. These crests will be sewn to the flag. The Prince's Crest-the three ostrich plumes-is shown at the top of the coat of arms.
