CANADIAN BARRICADES REVOLUTIONARIES MOWED DOWN MOSCOW A BATTLE FIELD

Casualties on Saturday over 500—Revolutionist Plot to Seize Railway Station Headed Off by Military.

Moscow, Dec. 24.—(5 p.m.)—Artillery, gas and revolver firing continued throughout the day, but the noise of the battle has now somewhat abated. The guns have been bombarding one barricade after another, the cannonades being followed by charges by the dragoons, who set fire to the debris. The area of the fighting to-day was more extended, and included Tranolos Square, Sadovya, Karetnaya and many other streets.

The revolutionaries apparently have not in the least lost heart, notwithstanding Saturday's heavy casualties. It is now known that 600 is a moderate estimate of the losses, and many more persons fell to-day.

HOW IT BEGAN.

London, Dec. 24.—The Daily Telegraph correspondent at St. Petersburg says about Moscow fighting: "The first shot was fired by the revolutionaries on the troops outside Ploshchad, which was surrounded. The revolutionaries were given one hour in which to surrender. Fifty minutes had passed and the commander of the troops was about to give the order to fire when a volley came from the house. Soldiers were immediately wounded. The troops immediately retreated.

WAR IN MOSCOW.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 23.—(11.35 p.m.)—The situation at Moscow to-night is described by the Daily Telegraph as being in a regular battle, with the revolutionaries on the one side and the troops on the other. The fighting is in progress in the city, and a state of terror reigns.

CONTINUED FIGHTING.

Since then there has been almost constant fighting somewhere in the city. The workers threw up barricades at the Triumphal arch, to places in the Dostoyevsky-street, and at other places. But all were assaulted and carried by the troops.

THE PLAN WHICH FAILED.

The plan of the armed rising of the proletariat was to seize the St. Petersburg station at dawn Saturday, take possession of the Duma building, capture the State Bank and proclaim a provisional government. To the workingmen the task of taking the station, the object of which was to prevent communication and the despatch of troops from St. Petersburg. The student revolutionary organizations were to have captured the Duma building and the bank.

MANY AWFUL SCENES.

There are many revolting details of the day. At Fidler's school, after the students had raised the white flag, and come out, they were charged, and down and subdued by the dragoons. The revolutionaries retained wherever they caught an officer alone, and on the slightest resistance he was beaten into submission.

Rally at Sign of Cross In Anti-Liquor Crusade

Mr. Bruchesi Issues Strong Pastoral Letter Calling for Foundation of Temperance Societies in Every Locality.

Montreal, Dec. 24.—(Special.)—Bishop Bruchesi's long expected pastoral message inaugurating a determined crusade against intemperance, was read to-day in all the Roman Catholic churches, and it is radical in its scope.

His grace says that without establishing a connection between the Province of Quebec and the other provinces of Canada, between the Dominion and the other States of America and Europe, it is an undeniable fact that we are suffering from the evil of intemperance.

Compensation to hotelkeepers if their license is taken away was fully favored by Rev. James Murray in his sermon at Erskine Church on Sunday morning.

Mr. Murray's remarks created considerable comment. He said of the liquor question: "In trying to remove the evils we must do the just and the righteous thing. I would say that if it is shown before a competent court or board appointed for the purpose that the government has encouraged these men to put their money in the liquor business and the liquor has been drunk by our authority it would be an injustice for us to take away their license, but we must be just."

DR. J. H. McFAUL IS DEAD
SEIZED BY HEART FAILURE

Well-Known City Educationist Expired Suddenly at His Home on Saturday Night.

One of the best known of local educationists was suddenly removed by death on Saturday night in the person of Dr. John H. McFaul, 197 Carlton-street.

Dr. McFaul, while he had suffered from intermittent attacks of heart trouble for the last two years, had been apparently enjoying good health of late.

He was present at the nominations in the city hall on Friday morning, and it had been expected by his friends that he would offer himself as a candidate.

He had been a member of the high school board having made his name a familiar one in educational matters.

About 8 o'clock on Saturday night he felt unwell and retired to his room.

He was discovered in a dying condition and passed away shortly afterwards. The cause of death was angina pectoris.

Born in 1846 in Wallington, Prince Edward County of U. E. Loyalist stock, it was in 1884 that he came to Toronto as an instructor in drawing at the Normal School.

He had been a school inspector at Peterborough and later at St. Catharines. He took up medicine as a study and began practice about fifteen years ago.

He continued to take a deep interest in the schools and in the high school board by the city council, retaining the position to the time of the amalgamation of the public and high school boards.

Dr. McFaul made a specialty of drawing and penmanship. In 1892 he brought out a manual of drawing adopted by the government as a public school text book and retained as a standard for a number of years.

He was also the originator of a number of copy books, being the author of a clear, copper-plate style of writing, that was used for illustrated purposes.

He had been since coming to Toronto a member of Sherbourne-street Methodist Church. He leaves a widow and two daughters.

Disgracefully Turbulent Scenes Attended Visit of Unemployed to Historic Cathedral—Papers Ashamed to Tell What Happened.

London, Dec. 23.—St. Paul's Cathedral, Britain's most historic place of worship, was the scene of such a shocking exhibition last Sunday that the London papers, evidently out of sheer shame, while telling the truth, did not tell the whole truth.

Leaders of the unemployed had given notice that a large body of men would parade at the cathedral for the afternoon service, and the ecclesiastical authorities prepared for their reception.

So did the police. At 3.15, when the ordinary service began, the visitors had not arrived, but a few minutes later, while prayer was in progress, a state of confusion occurred.

The tramp of hundreds of feet over the stone pavement, the hoarse voices of men shouting snatches of the "Marseilles," and the shouting of the voices of the clergymen and choir.

The religious service, the impressiveness of which is unsurpassed in any English church, was transformed in a moment into a pandemonium.

While the demonstrators were thus exhibiting themselves, a group of some hundred or so, who had remained inside the cathedral, were listening to a sermon from the pulpit.

On the broad steps at the west entrance they packed themselves into a seething mass of discontent, and shouted themselves hoarse in asserting they would keep red flags up and in trying to sing the Marseilles.

Red flags were waved, while a sort of compromise between the two groups was being attempted, and various leaders of the men harangued the fellows.

By this time an immense crowd of spectators crowded the precincts of the cathedral, and horse-traffic was at a standstill.

The police looked at the good humoredly and acted with considerable patience. It is an open secret that the tolerant spirit shown by the police officials toward the workless on more than one occasion has averted direct conflict.

BURIED UNDER TONS OF ORE.

Eight Men Killed by Slide at Ironwood Mine.

Ironwood, Mich., Dec. 23.—Eight men were killed to-day by a fall of 1000 tons of iron ore from a slip on the 1300 foot level of the Newport mine in Ironwood.

On account of the great danger from drifting of ore and broken timbers, several days will probably pass before all the bodies are recovered.

The accident is the most extensive that has ever occurred in the Michigan range.

CHRISTMAS DAY.
 Christmas day is surrounded with so many personal associations that it is difficult, perhaps impossible, to escape from their all-pervasive influence. It comes to the Christian people fraught with messages of love, peace and good-will—its spirit is that of forgiveness, of friendship, of charity. These are good for this work-a-day world in that they take men out of themselves and their immediate surroundings into a larger place, and kindle a deeper and more expansive sympathy. This was the aspect of Christmas which will ever be linked the name of Charles Dickens, whose genius never worked more happily, whose pathos never more true searching nor whose humor more true and spontaneous than when he portrayed the short and simple annals of the poor on this day of days.
 Tennyson, too, in the greatest of his poems, divided the stages of his grief, his struggle with sorrow and his final emergence from the shadow of doubt by three Christmas Eves. More than half a century has passed since "In Memoriam" was given to the English-speaking nations, but the pain of the 10th of the swallow flights of soul which together form his elegy on his dead friend remains an ever fresh inspiration. The nations need still to "Ring out old shapes of foul disease, Ring out the narrowing lust of gold, Ring out the thousand wars of old, Ring in the thousand years of peace."
 The lust of gold and the pursuit of gain has become colossal proportions, undreamed of two generations ago. No sense of individual responsibility has been lost; the establishment of soulless and commercial corporations that moral distinctions appear to have become obliterated. Many men have become intoxicated with the money fever and still more with the wealth fever, and having no other field of cupular activity, continue in the pursuit of gain long after the need for it is gone. What this continent needs today is the opportunity of developing the aesthetic and intellectual qualities, and to acquire other habits than that of money getting.
 The first Christmas Day is the dividing point between the old and the new world. It brought with it the means for the redemption of isolated individuals alone, but of society and all the social relations and activities of mankind. The advent of the divine truth from Jesus, the deeper and more human form infused deeper and consecrated all honest and genuine labor. The citizens of this new nation, so rich in material potentiality, must not dwarf themselves by making the amusement of wealth, the be-all and end-all of life. Converse with the great old, intelligent appreciation of the main currents of the time in art, in literature, in science, in politics, in religion are all necessary if we are to do our part; and to bring out all that is best in us. The Christmas bells come to call us back from our little routine found to the vaster field beyond where alone can be found the inspiration which can make even drudgery divine.

EXPERIMENT WITH SEALS
 We read in the press despatches of Saturday of the high prices brought in London this year for the British Columbia catch of seal. On account of the small catch prices have advanced forty per cent, and they will probably continue to advance as the demand for this high-class fur increases and the supply diminishes. The average price for skins in 1894 was \$40, on a catch of 45,000. This year the average price was \$125 for 13,000 skins.
 The suggestion has been made several times that the Canadian government should try to colonize the Alaska seal in the Hudson Bay and the other Arctic waters on the eastern and northern side of Canada, with a view to the establishment of seal fisheries there. There may be reason why this attempt would not succeed, but there is only one thing to do, and that is to try it.
 If it succeeded it would give Canada a practical monopoly of one of the finest products in the world. One objection that has been urged against the colonization of the Alaska seal in Hudson Bay is that it might destroy the fisheries of the waters of the bay, but even if this were so the seal could be exterminated in very short order if it proved a nuisance, or a detriment to a more profitable industry.
 It would be easy enough to transplant the seals from Behring Sea to Hudson Bay, as they are easily caught and quick transportation could be arranged across the continent and into the Hudson Bay water.
 Seal skins sold in London this season were only sufficient to make 12,000 jackets. In a few years, if Canada keeps on growing as she is, there will be 100,000 Canadian women to buy seal skin accoutrements, and if they put their case to him Sir Wilfrid

FASTEST STEAMERS ONLY.
 The government is considering the renewal of the Atlantic mail contract which expires next August. The Atlantic is said to be working strenuously for a new ten-year agreement. George III used to say that a man was good enough for any post he could get. Steamship companies are insisting on any contract that they can get. But governments are bound to make the best contracts they can in the public interest of to-day, to-morrow and the next day as well. Ten years is a whole generation in the growth of Canada. Any contract which does not make liberal provision for the expanding needs of the Dominion will be seriously against the national interest.
 Publishers of the most accommodating sort seem to think that a Postmaster-General can master the details of the one money-making business which this country runs in time spared from exhausting private affairs. The Postmaster-General has got to see that mail communications are speeded up in every possible direction. Canadian coasts are nearer Europe than those of any other American country, and the fastest steamers, which money and brains can construct should be in service of the Dominion. The quickest boats plying between England and Canada next year will be the "Empress" of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The policy of the British Postoffice has resulted in mail being sent by slow steamers simply because a certain line has obtained a mail contract. The fastest steamer sailing should be the mail steamer, no matter to what line it belongs. The ever-growing advantages enjoyed by ocean traffic to and from the port of New York make this matter of quick transportation for mail as well as passengers one of the most nervous and urgent problems which national administrators can handle.

WHAT IS HE COMING FOR?
 Lord Strathcona is on the way from London to Canada. What is he coming for? The high commissioner is eighty-five years of age. He is not in robust health. His doctor forbade him to begin the journey last week. He is probably the hardest octogenarian in the world, as becomes the man who, thanks partly to his long exile in the middle of the last century, in Labrador, has walked more miles than any other of the King's subjects. But it must be something urgent which makes him brave the rigorous loneliness of a Christmas on the Atlantic. He refused to say what he is coming for. The Bank of Montreal is pursuing the even tenor of its prosperous way. The Hudson Bay Company is on the top of a great wave well-founded favor.
 There have for some time been rumors of an attempt to induce Lord Strathcona to enjoy the great dignity of a great estate of life without any governmental responsibility. But so long as Lord Strathcona lives and moves, and has his being, he will be high commissioner for Canada. He clings to work as ordinary men cherish their ability to breathe.
 We suspect the event will prove that Lord Strathcona's visit is in connection with departmental business, involving a readjustment of official functions in London. Circumstantial stories are going around. Some of them may reach the floor of parliament.

THE BRIGHTON ROAD.
 Perhaps the most famous road in the world is that from London to Brighton. Coaching records, cycling records, walking records, automobile records and all sorts of records have been made upon it. It is fitting, therefore, that the first proposal to Parliament for an automobile road should be made in connection with the route from the metropolis to "London-by-the-Sea."
 A bill has been lodged for presentation in the coming session authorizing the construction of a road between London and Brighton for the exclusive use of motor vehicles. Details of the scheme are of course not yet available, but it is said to be a very interesting one. The public will be asked to bear a large share of the cost, on the ground that the road has become a necessity, in the interests alike of motorists and of the general public. The bill, however, will be drawn and however strongly it may be backed, is scarcely likely to be passed at the first attempt.
 Great innovations involving legislative favor are always shied at by two of the most conservative of the Mother of Parliaments. The scheme will be watched with interest on this side because of its interest for all motorists, and because we feel some day be up against propositions for specially improved roads for motor vehicles.

STATE AND UNIVERSITY.
 Editor World: In the editorial article on the university alumni in to-day's issue of The World, there is a brief discussion of the claims of the graduates to elect a certain number of the board of trustees of the university. OUR TRADE WITH GERMANY
 CONDITIONS ARE EXPLORED

Outcome of Canada's Preference to Britain—Wants of Trade on Both Sides Wait it Changed.

Deploping the condition of trade relations between Germany and Canada, the letter which appears below is of interest, both in the opinion of large Toronto exporters the writer is largely familiar with his subject.
 J. W. Woods of Gordon, MacKay & Co., chairman with The World about on Saturday afternoon. He said the trade with Germany had greatly declined in the past three or four years, because the surplus puts one-third on the duty. The effect has been to displace a considerable amount of the trade to Austria and other countries. A great deal more of it goes to Great Britain than formerly. It has been a great inconvenience to the importers here, who had their arrangements made comfortably for their supplies from Germany.
 The situation is the outcome of the preferential trade with Great Britain. Notwithstanding the fact that Germany is an importer of manufactures from the United States tariff on imports from Germany is higher than ours the result gets far better treatment than we do.
 It is a fact that the boards of trade in the leading centres in both countries want the situation relieved for mutual benefit, but the German parliament won't do anything. There is no hope of any immediate relief.
 Mr. Laedekings's Letter.
 The letter referred to is from L. K. Loedekings of Hamburg, Germany, who also has an office in Montreal. He is an importer and manufacturer's agent, and writes from Hamburg as follows:
 How long is the tariff war between Canada and Germany to last? Is there any sign of a settlement of this insular in the context of the two nations for their commercial progress. It is true that both countries have been the sufferers from the beginning of their commercial war, but the latter, as statistics of imports and exports during the last three years prove that the loss in trade has not been one-sided, and while it was intended to hurt Germany, the result has been that directly and indirectly it has hit Canada more than Germany.
 But who has had the benefit of the contest? It is not so much England with her preferential tariff, but the United States, which seriously threatens Canadian industry. What Canada has lost of her exports to Germany, the States has been gaining. It seems incomprehensible that no efforts are made in Canada to get a share of such trade in Germany, which is handled entirely by the United States.
 Under the very eyes of Canada the export products such as Canada herself produces, to the extent of nearly \$20,000,000 year after year to Germany. If Canadian export trade to Germany had further increased proportionately during the last three years, as most naturally it would have, without the tariff war, the Canadian people would have better understood the great chances for their country to develop the trade with Germany more rapidly to reach similar proportions to those of the States.
 From a point of patriotism it is very natural for Canada to foster commercial exchange with other colonies and Great Britain, that has to import food supplies on a large scale and to the extent of more than a third of what Great Britain, that has to deny the great prospects and the sure impetus to Canadian trade with Germany, a speedy termination of the tariff war was attained?
 Whatever may have caused the surprise of a hostile attitude toward Germany nearly three years ago, after

**CHURCH UNION AND STATES
 MOVEMENT IS IN THE AIR**
 A New York Opinion on the Decision
 of the Three Canadian
 Denominations.

New York, Dec. 24.—Rev. Dr. E. B. Sanford, secretary of the National Federation of Churches and Church Workers and a pioneer in the federation field, was much pleased at hearing of the agreement on a union code of doctrine by the Canadian churches. "The situation in Canada," said Dr. Sanford, "is the outcome of a meeting somewhat informal and not official, held in Toronto in the spring of 1904 between representative leaders of the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist churches. These men had been meeting together for years. The interdenominational work of their churches had frequently brought them in contact—their Sunday-school work, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Epworth League, and so on. It was seen how well cooperation paid them, the desire for a firmer and more general alliance became more and more pronounced."

"The principal obstacle appears to have been the adjustment of the foundations, endowments and the like of schools and colleges. The men in charge became convinced that there were no insuperable obstacles, and now we shall see a great church moving forward as the United Church of Canada. Its advantages are obvious. It will give power to the united church to resist forces and prevent waste of material and money. It will enable, for instance, three weak churches, perhaps, in a community to unite as one strong church. It will enable new fields to be opened. It will set free energy, and will be a builders that have been made and the competitive plan. It will strengthen theological and Sunday schools, and will be a mighty weapon in the future."

"While more than thirty denominations are represented in the union, the Protestant Church membership in the United States, have expressed their intention to join. The federal council plans are already under way to bring about the organic union of several denominations."

"At the last General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church organic union with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church was unanimously voted for, and this union has been approved by the Cumberland Synod."

Getting Together.
 "Another union, less than in its nature, will soon be proposed about the action of the highest councils of the Congregational, Methodist, Presbyterian and United Brethren churches. They have appointed delegates who will meet in Dayton, Ohio, in February to consider the plan by which they may be united as the General Council of the United Church."

"The interdenominational conference in New York City on November 19 and 20 was notable. It was attended by men who represented eighteen million communicants, met in harmony, and thirty denominations were invited to approve or disapprove of the plan by 1906."

"The Methodist Episcopal Church in its two great sections, North and South, was very happily represented, and the conference no doubt has increased the growing fellowship between them. Already they are co-operating in the foreign field, and they have united in a formal, the Baptist churches, North and South, have come together in a way that will allow them to express their growing friendship."

"All over the country it was similar signs of a reunion of what might be called the main branches of the main denomination. It will all be for the greater good of humanity."

Inter-Church Conference
 Except in denominations which were at one time together, the union of churches in the United States has not contemplated an actual merger, as in England and the United States, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, North and South, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, North and South, were regarded, however, as a notable step toward an ultimate union. The representatives of thirty Protestant denominations present at this conference decided to submit the question whether there should be a federation of all Protestant churches to their governing bodies for decision. The vote must be reported upon in 1906.

"The federation does not contemplate organic union, but a working agreement under which money heretofore spent in competition may be devoted to church extension."

Proposals for Merging City With National Association to Fight the Workers.
