



ntial for the protection of Hong Kong The lease comprises the Island of Lantao, to the westward of Hong Kong, and the mainland behind Kan Lung, south and east of a line drawn from Mirs Bay to Deep Bay. While the Chinese retain the northern shores of these bays, the lease covers their waters, subject to the right of the Chinese to use them for their own ships. When questioned in the House of Commons vesterday evening as to whether Russia contemplated sending troops to the Yang-Tse-Kiang valley, the Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, Mr. Curzon, made an important statement to the effect that such a proceeding, without the consent of China, would be an act of war and the Government would take the requisite steps to protect British interests. Obviously this is intended as a warning to

Russia not to interfere in the Yang-Tse-Klang valley. Hot Shot for Chamberlain.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the Libnoon as to the foreign policy of the Gov-

eriment, proceeded to criticize at length the recent speech of Mr. Chamberlain, Soc-retary of State for the Colonies, at Bir-mingham. He referred ironically to the 'pitiful spectacle of the Secretary of State for the Colonies standing, cap in hand, be-remarking: remarking:

"The Chinese question must be settled in friendship and concert with Russia." He asked whether it would not have been better for Mr. Chamberlain to "postpone his insults to Russia" until the talked-of al.iance had been secured.

Mr. Chamberlain Replics.

Mr. Chamberlain, who, on rising to reply was received with Government cheers and Irish Nationalist hisses, denied that there

was received with Government cheers are Irish Nationalist hisses, denied that there was any discrepancy between himself and other members of the Cabinet. "I believe," he said, "that our interests are much more closely allied to the inter-ests of Germany than to those of Russia. The Cabinet is not responsible for every single word attered by its members, but it is responsible for every declaration of fact. If there had been a difference of opinion between Lord Salisbury and my-self, it would have been my duty to resign. That is my answer to all these charges. I have not resigned and I have not been re-jected by the Prime Minister. Therefore,

there is a solidarity.'

Mr. Chamberlain declared that the .bjec of his Birmingham speech was "not to lay down a policy, but to state facts to the country as to what I conceive to be the conditions and great problems we are called to face.
