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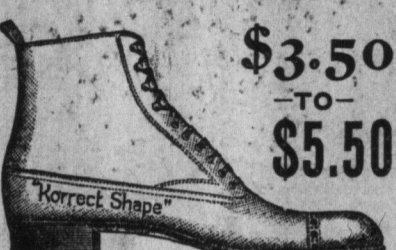

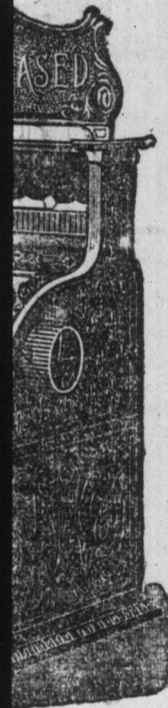

Woman's World... Devoted Specially to the Interests of our Women Readers. Conducted by Katherine Leslie.

How women's taste in embroidery and all sorts of needlework—or "fancy work," as it is commonly called—and in home decoration has developed and improved within the last few years! Not far back then a decade or so women were working all sorts of horrors—"mottos," I think, they called them—on perforated cardboard, in crudely shaded Berlin wool or silk "goodness Our Home," a truly admirable aspiration, when not uttered in cardboard embroidery; "Home, Sweet Home," "Mimph," together with many condensed sentimentalities, were framed and hung in every house. The young woman who did not work "mottos" for herself or friends was a rara avis. Besides "mottos," they worked pestiferous little "lilies" for chair backs, which, unless planned to the chair, had a habit of attaching themselves to the back of the caller, and, clinging there like a plaster of his very colors, as he unconsciously wended his way down street, proclaimed to all the world where he had been. Another form of fancy work to which young ladies devote their attention was the painting or working of "panels." The background of these "panels" was usually gorgeously colored satin or silk, cardinal being a favorite tint upon which needle or brush ran riot. Sunflowers, hollyhocks, roses in bunches (which a graduate would have repudiated with indignation) and sometimes storks and birds unrecognizable by an ornithologist, were under his fingers. They were then lined—the panels, I mean—the ends being with fringes of little brass bells or cross-ribbed, the top rim with beads upon a brass rod, and, lo! then the artistic decorations for the drawing room door or wall. Then, between the working of "lilies,"

embroidery on white or neutral backgrounds for decorative purposes, and the dainty collars and cuffs, and what a girl is fixed. Women, too, are turning their attention more and more to artistic needlework in other lines, such as lace, and I am told that no really excellent work in handmade lace goes begging for a purchaser.

Neither is there now any making-over of hideous furniture. When women want something artistic in the way of a little table for the drawing room, they take the plain hardwood and carve it into charming designs. What is still not the case, they have sense enough to look out for satisfactory models in the art magazines and have them reproduced at the millinery's. I have been astonished at the number of brides here in Toronto who lately have designed the furniture for their homes or who have selected designs from reliable art journals and had them made to order. I am told that the cost is not so very much greater, and certainly their homes have an individuality and an indescribably artistic character that will never pervade the house furnished with the regulation machine-made furniture.

Women now pay more attention to color schemes, are careful not to overcrowd their rooms, and, with the exception of good oils or etchings, or watercolors, for their walls, are content with beautiful little carbon photographs of the most important pieces, simply framed in dark hardwood. They hang long plain, soft-tinted walls, and the more they are polished, the more is decidedly growing. Instead of the gaudy popular, colorful, and gaudy, with its glaring lights, softly-shaded lamps and candles are employed, and the beautiful fireplace is not the least important feature in the home nowadays.

Great changes, and all within the last few years. And so many of them due to a growing feeling for art in women. What may they not do, when they have all these lines within the next ten or twenty years, and how much may not the future art productions of the country be due to their stimulating effects!

THE FILIPINO CONGRESS.

Agustino Singsong's His Government and Has Not Declared Himself Dictator. Manila, Sept. 8.—A Filipino who has arrived here from Tarlac says an extraordinary session of the revolutionary congress took place at Tarlac, August 24. Agustino presided and chose Mabini as President of the Supreme Court, and Gonzaga as Attorney-General. The congress represented the most conservative and temperate elements of the revolution. The foreign secretaryship, is the ablest man connected with the revolution. Gonzaga was president of the congress. The proceedings of the congress developed the report that Agustino had declared himself dictator. A decree was issued by the Filipinos compelling the registration of all professions in the territory. The Chinese, who are a large fraction of the population, are considered foreigners, including those born in the Philippine Islands. Application must be made on a stamped paper, which is given by all the business of the insurrectionary government. This seems to be largely a scheme to tax Chinese.

Detroit, Sept. 8.—Word was received today that the passenger steamer State of Michigan is ashore at Colchester. The wrecking tug Saginaw has gone to her relief. The State of Michigan runs from Lake Erie ports and Detroit to Mackinac. She was bound down.

DREYFUS DECISION EXPECTED TO-DAY.

Continued from Page 1. War, the General the Marquis de Gallifert, Colonel Piquart also left Rennes, although he looks no mark in the army.

No Verdict Till Monday. The fact that Maitre Labori has to speak and that, probably, the Government commissary, Major Carrier, will reply, makes it practically certain that the verdict will not be given before Monday.

Have the Lawyers Disagreed? It was generally noticed to-day that when M. Labori entered the court this morning he spoke to M. Demange in a deprecating tone, and a sharp discussion ensued, almost bordering on a dispute.

Great interest has been aroused by the arrival at Rennes of Max Régis, the mayor of Algiers, and a notorious journalist. He was attended by a couple of Algerians in native costume, who followed him. He stopped to take some refreshment at the hotel, and here, and the place was immediately invaded by a gaping crowd. M. 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To clearly define the prisoner's position, saying: "When the case of the revelation began, Dreyfus was a convict and serious punishment of his innocence were necessary before the case could be taken up by the court of Cassation. To-day, it is for the public prosecutor to prove his guilt."

A Protest. M. Demange then protested against the suggestion that it had been attempted to put testimony on trial, explaining that all the evidence introduced was that of Dreyfus should appear, dazling and proclaiming it. But, if the former had seen Esternazy's handwriting, they would have pronounced a verdict.

A Pleading Lecture. M. Demange dilated upon the prisoner's increasing protestations of innocence and the touching letters to his family, exclaiming: "In them you see his soul speaking. Alone in his tomb he continues to speak. He cherishes the hope of seeing his innocence acknowledged."

Other letters of the prisoner were read, all breathing the same desire to live to see the broken dawn in health and spirit. One letter, written in 1897, appeals to General de Pellissier to lend his generous aid in securing for the writer restoration of his liberty, which he had been robbed.

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The Confessions. Dealing next with the confessions, counsel for the defence, Maitre Labori, said: "The republican guard, who had the prison, and maintained the exact words of Dreyfus, which were now known, only referred to the words of the prisoner, while admitting that he was not a good omen for the prosecution."

Surprised at Gonne. M. Demange said he was surprised at the attitude of General Gonne towards the alleged confession and marveled at the fact that Capt. Lahure, who was sent to the Blysee Palace expressly to repeat the confessions, did not mention them.

The Sixth Document. The sixth document was a letter written by Count von Münster-Ledeburg, Imperial Ambassador to France, from Germany to M. Demange, dated at Paris, containing the following statement: "I have the honor to inform you that the Imperial Government has been informed of the facts and circumstances of the case of Dreyfus."

The Panizardi Letters. In regard to the letters of Nov. 2 and Nov. 11 sent by Major Panizardi to his chief, it had been alleged that they were written by the prisoner. M. Demange pointed out that the handwriting of these letters was not that of Dreyfus, and that the Imperial Government had been informed of the facts and circumstances of the case of Dreyfus.

The Dossier Finished. Concluding his examinations of the secret dossier, M. Demange remarked that he was compelled to refer to the documents emanating from foreigners, as Gen. Mercier relied upon them to support his theory. The statements of the military attaché at Paris, which were now known, only referred to the words of the prisoner, while admitting that he was not a good omen for the prosecution.

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Other stories show up. M. Demange successfully showed the hollow nature of the stories of Mathieu Dreyfus' attempt to corrupt Col. Sandherr, the late Lieut. Col. Henry's theatrical denunciation of Dreyfus as a traitor at the court-martial of 1894 and the reports of the detectives. He pointed out how the prosecution had advanced as proof, the alleged statements of individuals who were not in the pay of the War Office, but whom they carefully abstain from producing for examination. Especially dwelling upon Henry's statement in 1894, which has been since admitted to be false, that a certain War Office employee informed him that Dreyfus was the culprit, M. Demange then showed the emptiness of the gambling and libertine charges against the prisoner, and said the simplest actions of Dreyfus were misconstrued, even his legitimate desire to obtain knowledge being imputed as a crime. Could a spy have maintained the haughty demeanor which Dreyfus always showed toward his comrades?

Narrowed Down to the Boredeau. After demolishing the inanity and fallacy of the evidence of de Boredeau, witnesses, Muller, Dubreuil, Yillon and Ceruzzi, counsel said that it was not impossible to shed on it by the production of the notes commented in the Boredeau. This had been said by Gen. de Pellissier, but counsel asked the court to remember, with reference to these notes, that all Gen. De Loye could say was that it was not possible that Dreyfus might have possessed them. This was the last word of the Boredeau, and it is upon the strength of this evidence that the court is asked to pronounce judgment. At the request of M. Demange the court at this juncture adjourned until to-morrow.
