Admiral Beresford, R. N., Predicts Japanese Victory Because of Better Gunnery-Numerical Strength Don't Count -See Fighting as Hard Now as in " Brave Old Days."

New York, May 10 .- (Special.) -"The Russian and Japanese fleets will meet in a few days. Japan will win. The slaughter of men in that battle will be so great as to startle the civilized world. The only redeeming feature of the fight will be the fact that there will be no more wars for years. The horrors will be too great."

Vice-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford of the British navy made this statement to-day just before his departure for Liverpool on the steamer Oceanic. The admiral has spent several days on the attleship Missouri, off Pensacola, with Rear Admiral Evans, and, incidentally, he said he did not think the Missouri

he said he did not think the Migrouri had an equal in the world.

"The reason I think Japan will win in the coming fight," continued the admiral, "is that she is the greater gunner of the two. There is nothing in numerical strength. The secret of success in a naval battle lies in placing one's ships to advantage and letting the gunners do the rest. Japan will win the fight by getting the superior position and firing the greater number of telling shots, even the Russia has the greater number of ships.

Paris, May 10.-The Marquis de Barhelemy, who with Count de Pourtales perates the French concession at Kamranh Bay, Annam, in the course of an interview to-day denies that he furnished coal or provisions to the Russian Pacific squadron. He said: The maximum of our coaling facilities is 700 tons. A small coaling depot exists on the Mekong River, not far from Saigon. At the outset of the war the Russians bought a large tract of land there, erected sheds and accumulated supplies, particularly coal, which was bought originally from Japan. It is to this depot that Admiral Rojestvensky sent his colliers, but no warships approached the depot. This was Russian coal, placed upon Russian land and loaded upon Russian transports. This was not a violation of neutrality. France could not prevent the Russians from taking their own coal on their own land. If the natives were at fault in selling the land to the Russians the Japanese would not have waited 15 months before protesting."
