> Water Curtain for Fire. A water curtain is intended to pre-vent the building on which it is invent the building on which it is installed from taking fire from outside sources. In the ordinary brick or stone building the only way in which fire can enter is thru the window and door openings and the roof. Water curtains are designed to prevent the possibility of this, and consist of a system of piping running along the tops of the window. ing running along the tops or the win dows and cornices, with one or more outlets over each window. These outlets are fitted with specially designed sprinklers, which throw the water, under pressure, over the glass and frames of the windows, forming a curtain of water thru which it is impossible for the fire to pass. The water supply for these curtains is taken from the city water mains, and is controlled by a water mains, and is controlled by a valve located in a convenient place in the building. In case of fire in an adjacent building or across the street, this valve is opened and allows the full pressure in the city mains to play on the windows and cornices of the building. A secondary supply is also provided that a Siamese connection, to which the fire department may connect their steam engines, and thereby increase the pressure of water .-Industrial Canada.





> A new arrangement will go into force this autumn in reference to mails to Hong Kong and China. Hereofore the Liverpool to Hong Kong mail service was given the C.P.R. under an annual subsidy of \$350,000, of which Great Britain contributed \$300,000 and Canada \$50,000. The British Government was willing to contribute this grant, and as a consequence a rearrangement has taken place. The C.P. R. will continue to give the service. R. will continue to give the service, but the total subsidy will be reduced from \$350,000 to \$225,000. Of this Canada will contribute \$125,000 and Great Britain \$100,000. The service given by the Canadian Railway and Steamship Company has been very satisfactory and efficient, and in view of the rapid opening up of the Asiatic countries the commerce of the west the conti uance of the service is highly important. Canada should gain much in the next few years thru a close con-nection with China.—Industrial Can-ada.



GAPT. BALDWIN'S AIRSHIP HAS MANY NEW IDEAS

If He Fulfils Requirements of U.S. Government, He Will Be Given \$6650.

WASHINGTON, July 27.-It Captain homas S. Baldwin succeeds in fulfilling all of the requirements of the government in the trial flights of his military dirigible at Fort Meyer, he will receive \$6750, while Count Zeppelin will receive \$5750, while Count Zeppelli will receive \$500,000 from the German Government if all the requirements are fulfilled by his airship. The latter machine is 25 times are large as Captain Baldwin's dirigible.

Yet Capt. Baldwin contends that in the machine which he has built for the army, he has incorporated new ideas, which will be eventually adopted by other nations in the construction of

ideas, which will be eventually adopted by other nations in the construction of dirigibles. These new features are embodied in the gas envelope of Capt. Baldwin's machine, which differs widely from Zeppelin's, the Republique, the French dirigible, and the Nulli Secundus, the British military dirigible. But his own process of vulcanizing rubber, Capt. Baldwin claims to have secured a material that will stand a strain of 95 pounds to the inch, and which is not affected by either heat or cold. In addition there is practically no elasticity to a gas bag made of this material, thus making a rigid balloon without the use of the frame.

Therefore, even if loudness is determined by bowing speed alone, a greater bowing speed would always be accompanied by greater pressure, and this would seen to be the cause of the loud tone. This tends to mask the real issue, which is whether loudness increases with pressure at a constant bowing speed; but even when it is allowed for experience seems to be against the Helmholtzian


