Guild's door closed. turned on three prominent labor leaders and fired three shots at them, probably fatally wounding Edward Cohen of Lynn, president of the state branch of the American Federation of Labor; seriously wounding Dennis D. Driscoll of Boston, secretary of the same board, and painfully injuring with the muzzle of his revolver, Arthur M. Huddel Boston, former pre-sident of the Cal Labor Union of this city. Steele was overpowered by Secretary Charles S. Groves, and Gen-J. H. Whitney, chief of the state bu-

réau. Stéele was released on parole last month from the Danvers Insane Asylum. He is 37 years old.

Governor in His Office.

Gov. Guild was in his office only a few feet away when the shooting occurred, and, rushing out, assisted in subduing Steele, and subsequently di-rected the removal of the wounded men to the Massachusetts General

Cohen was shot twice thru the head and is in a critical condition. The third bullet struck Driscoll a glancing blow on the side of the forehead and rendered him unconscious. He recovered consciousness half an hour later. Huddell's wound was not serious. The three labor leaders came to the state house to meet the governor in regard to a pardon. They found that the governor was busy at the time of the executive. 

TORONTO'S OPPORTUNITY. Among the speakers at the recent dinner of the Canada Club of London En gland, was Mr. R. W. Perks, M.P., is actively associated with the projected Georgian Bay and Ottawa Canal. He is reported to have enlarged on the advantages the Do minion possesses in its great waterways, and to have compared Buenos Ayres with Montreal and Toronto. Twenty years ago the capital of the Argentine Republic had a population of only a quarter of a million, today it has turned the million. To accomplish this four-fold increase Buenos Ayres expended \$10,000,000. which, however, returns six per cent. interest and Mr. Perks believes the Caradian cities have the same opporthinty if they will expend the money.

The Argentine itself he describes as

the greatest rival Canada had. Buenos Ayres and Montreal, being sea ports, have a marked initial adventage over Toronto, and the Argentine capital has the better of Montreal since it is open all the year round Over 1200 British ships alone enter and leave it during the year, and trade with the United Kingdom is a growing quantity. But if the great lanes were opened to deep sea traffic as they ought to be Toronto's opportunity would be very favorably influenced. In almost every large city of the United States there is seen to-day a struggle between the citizens and the private holders and operators of their franchises. New York for example has had its street railways so entangled and overcapitalized that it is impossible for them to yield a return or way corporations; Chicago is attempting to get under way with a schem that will allow tracks and rolling stock, described as only fit for the street, was arrested last night by Descrap heap, to be replaced, and many other cities are involved in similar

Toronto has had bitter experiences of its own with regard to private company management of its services and utilities. Not that alone, but it has also learned that regulation and control even when expressly stipulated for and apparently completely safeguarded, is impossible and inoperative. Reclamation of its franchises and their operation in the public interest exclusively is at last being recognized as the only effectual method of securing the chean and efficant services that mean so much for the prosperity of a modern city. At the present moment Toronto can place itself in an impregnable position as regards the future supply of Niagara electricity by remaining steadfast in support of the power policy of the provincial government. If this opportunity be lost Toronto will to that extenhandicap itself in the civic race.
