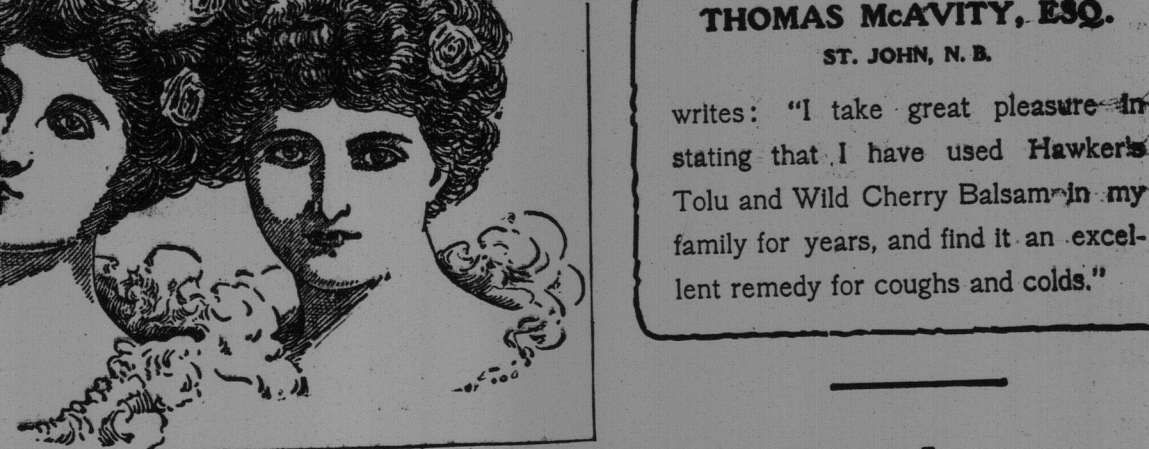

LOSSES ON WHEAT DEAL WERE EXAGGERATED

The Traders' Eyes Are Now Fixed on the July Option—Same Element Said to Be Short—Bull Movement in Latter Out of the Question.

CHICAGO, April 27.—Having viewed the rapidly deteriorating form of the wheat market, the speculators have been thoroughly convinced that no possible chance for the attending physicians to check the ravages, and the speculators in the Chicago grain pit have cast their eyes on the July option and are trying to penetrate the haze which this future became enveloped during the frenzied trading yesterday.

It has been well known in the trade for a long time that while Mr. Gates and his associates in the May deal, who include Messrs. L. E. Rice, C. E. Rice, and Schwab and a host of other lesser lights in the speculative trade, were long in the market from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 bushels of the wheat option, they were also operating extensively in the July on the short side. The amount of the short interest in the July was sold last February was the same as the amount of the long interest in the May deal.

Another Statement
CHICAGO, April 27.—Stories of millions of bushels of wheat in the hands of the speculators who were long in the May deal and short in the July, have been circulating for some time.

Why Gates Corner Collapsed
To this splendid crop prospect is ascribed the collapse of the Gates corner. The effect of forcing the July price to a discount of 20 cents over the May price, locally wiped out all demand from millers and other buyers of wheat.

THEY WANT MORE MONEY

Ship Laborers Have Increased Their Rate 40 Cents Per Hour Commencing May 1st. Steamship Men Protest.

The ship laborers of St. John have decided to increase their rate of wages forty cents an hour. The steamship men protest against the increase, but none would say Thursday night whether or not they would pay the new rate.

The Longshoremen's Association decided on the increased rate at a meeting in Berryman's hall Thursday night, attended by fully 800 members of the association, and a good deal of enthusiasm characterized the proceedings.

The steamship men gained knowledge of the proposed increase to forty cents, and they prepared a written protest, which was sent to the secretary to be submitted to the meeting. In this, a steamship man told a reporter, they protested against the talk of increase to forty cents an hour, and claimed in support of their protest that the freight was so low that they could not stand an increase, and that the business did not warrant it.

One steamship man, replying to a question whether the companies would pay the increased rate, said he did not know, but if they agreed not to it might mean that what was done in Montreal might be done here—laborers from England brought over. It is understood that, while the rate will go in effect next Monday, the steamers in port now will be through work by that day and will not be affected.

CAPE BRETON CONSERVATIVES

Nominate Two Candidates for the Provincial Contest—Both Are Lawyers.

At a convention of the liberal conservatives of Cape Breton county held in the city yesterday, R. H. Butte, barrister, of North Sydney and J. W. Madden, barrister, of Sydney Mines, were nominated to contest the county at the ensuing local election, which is anticipated within a year. The convention placed on record its hearty appreciation of the ability and energy displayed by R. L. Borden in the discharge of his duties as leader of the conservative party in Canada, and its high appreciation of the work done in the local legislature by Messrs. Tansie and McLeod. This is the first convention held by either party in the province in contemplation of the forthcoming election.

NEW RULES FOR FERRY

Regulations for Employees Considered by Ferry Committee Yesterday.

At a meeting of the ferry committee yesterday the chairman for a sub-committee submitted a number of regulations for the employees. The recorder was heard on the question of the Mace wharf. A number of bills were passed and several other matters dealt with. Ald. Frank occupied the chair, and Ald. Gaulton, Helder, Bullock, Brennan and Christie were present, with the common clerk and Superintendent Glasgow.

The chairman drew attention to the condition of the Mace wharf during the recent high tide. He said the wharf had dangerously protruded over the ferry property and the superintendent had secured the wharf as well as he could by moving it with a line to the Mackay property.

The recorder was then heard on the legal points of the case and the committee discussed the matter in private.

The chairman submitted for consideration the following regulations which had been drawn up by the sub-committee and himself acting as a sub-committee:

1. The chief executive officer of the ferry shall be the superintendent and he shall have general charge and supervision of the service to connection.

2. The master in charge of the ferry steamer shall have general charge and supervision of the weather or water causing interruption of the service.

3. Every employee of the ferry shall be held responsible for the good behavior of the vessel.

On motion of Ald. Bullock the regulations were adopted and ordered printed. They will be brought before the council on Monday for confirmation.

Ald. Carleton referred to the occasion as being his final appearance before the committee and urged that the committee consider the question of the pay of the ferry deck hands with a view to an increase.

HARD ON THE LIQUOR MEN

P. E. Island Legislature Makes Stringent Regulations for That Province.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., April 28.—The prohibition act, which was already very strict, has been made more stringent than ever. Yesterday the provincial legislature passed unanimously a series of sweeping amendments as follows: It shall be the duty of a magistrate to examine on each all drunks as to where they obtained the liquor which was partially or wholly the cause of drunkenness, and refused to give such information to the satisfaction of the magistrate shall be deemed contemptuous conduct.

Druggists selling for medicinal purposes shall be obliged to keep a register for all sales. The inspector shall be empowered to visit druggists and examine certificates, prescriptions and register of all sales.

Any physician giving a prescription for other than strictly medicinal purposes shall be liable to a penalty of \$50.

Any magistrate, if satisfied on oath of a policeman or prosecutor, of a reasonable ground for belief that liquor is sold unlawfully, may issue a search warrant to seize the liquor and arrest any one found in charge.

MORE SHIPS FOR THE C. P. R.

Arthur Piers Says St. John Will Continue to Be the Winter Port.

WILL ISSUE MORE BONDS

Treasury Board Appoints Committee to Consider Floating \$500,000 Bonds to Pay for Loch Lomond Water Extension.

The treasury board met yesterday afternoon and appointed a committee to make inquiries from the banks as to the proposed loan.

Ald. Macrae did not see why a loan of \$500,000 should glut the local market, and asked the chamberlain what amount of the city's bonds were still on hand.

The chamberlain said the amount was \$15,000, and the bonds were now deposited with the Bank of New Brunswick as security for a loan.
