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MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

LONDON CONFERENCE,

Held in Wesley Church, Hamilton, commencing on Wednesday, June 2nd, 1880 (Seventh Session), at 9 o'clock a.m., Rev. W. S. Griffin, President of the Conference, in the chair.

The 483rd Hymn was sung; and Rev. Geo. H. Cornish, Secretary of the Conference, read the 4th Chapter of Paul's 2nd Epistle to the Corinthians; after which the Rev. Dr. Sanderson led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the roll, and two hundred brethren answered to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election, by ballot, of President, resulting in the choice of the Rev. John Wakefield. Rev. W. S. Griffin, the retiring President, gave his successor a pleasant and cordial introduction; whereupon the President briefly addressed the Conference, and directed it to proceed to the election of a Secretary.

The ballot for Secretary resulted in the election of Rev. W. R. PARKER, M.A., to that office. The SECRETARY then briefly addressed the Conference.

The Secretary nominated the Rev. W. C. Henderson, M.A., as Assistant Secretary; the Rev. Thomas Lottridge Wilkinson as Journal Secretary; and the Rev. R. W. Woodsworth, the Rev. John Kay, the Rev. W. C. Watson, M.A., the Rev. John S. Fisher, and the Rev. G. W. Calvert, as Assistants on Statistics.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

Revs. Walter Rigsby and John Scott, B.A., were duly appointed as Reporters for the *Christian Guardian*, and the Rev. James Harris for the *Wesleyan*.

Revs. Dr. Evans and Charles Lavell, M.A., were appointed Official Letter Writers.

The Conference Prayer-Meeting, a "season of grace and secret delight," was held from twelve to one o'clock.

QUESTION-Who have Died?

Answer:

1. MATTHIAS HOLTBY

Was born in the village of Ganton, Yorkshire, England, on the 31st of January, 1799. Through parental influence he gave his heart to God at the age of seventeen. Having tasted that the Lord was gracious, he almost immediately began to invite sinners to Christ. He soon became a very successful local preacher. In 1830, with his family, he emigrated to Canada, and at once connected himself with the Methodist Church, and laboured as a local preacher with great acceptance in and about Toronto—then "Little York." He entered the itinerant ranks and travelled about seven years, when, in 1847, failing health led him to ask a supernumerary relation. Through thirty-three years of his retirement from the active work of the ministry he continued to be a faithful worker for his Master.

The estimate formed by the community of his character and integrity may be seen in the fact that he filled the highest offices of trust and honour in the county in which he lived so long.

Father Holtby possessed a mind much above the average. It was impossible to be long in his company without feeling that you were in the presence of a man of more than ordinary intelligence and candour. He was shrewd and practical, yet simple as a child. The Saviour's remark to Nathanial seemed appropriate to him, "Behold an Israelite indeed, in whom there is no guile." His sermons generally were a clear, simple, forcible, and methodical exposition of the text. The plan, style, and manner were peculiarly his own. His thoughts were presented in a familiar, home-like, conversational style, such as a tender and loving father would be likely to employ in persuading his own children to a life of piety. The warmth and sympathy of his nature rendered him a welcome visitor at the sick bed, and his sound and well-balanced mind made him a wise counsellor in trouble. He has left to his family and to the Church a precious legacy-a character without a blot.

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Towards the close of life, feeling that his end was near, he "rejoiced in hope of the glory of God." In songs of triumph, and shouts of victory, the aged veteran praised God for that conquering grace which had been so abundantly bestowed on him. While he could speak, he testified that God was with him. On Tuesday, the 6th of January, 1880, "He was not, for God took him."

2. Dr. Selley.

In the case of Rev. Dr. Selley, who died in Exeter, Ontario, in the month of May, the Secretary of Conference was instructed to inform the Secretary of Montreal Conference that, inasmuch as Dr. Selley, transferred to this Conference from the Montreal Conference, died before the date at which his transfer would have taken effect, this Conference does not deem it within its province to prepare and present an obituary notice of our late esteemed Dr. Selley; but would respectfully remit this labour of love to the Montreal Conference at its ensuing session in the Town of Stanstead.

CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Rev. Dr. Ryckman read the Report of the Church Property Committee, which was adopted, and is as follows:—

The Committee recommend for adoption by the Conference, the following resolutions relating to the sale of property:

HAMILTON DISTRICT.

GERMAN METHODIST CHURCH, HAMILTON.—That the Trustees of the German Methodist Church, in the city of Hamilton, be permitted to sell the property, and divide the proceeds equally between the Zion Tabernacle and the Simcoe Street Church, to be applied towards the reduction of the debt on those churches.

NIAGARA DISTRICT.

- 1. NIAGARA STREET CHURCH, St. CATHARINES.—That the Trustees of the Niagara Street Church be permitted to sell the vacant lot adjoining the church, and apply the proceeds towards the liquidation of the debt upon the church.
- 2. Beamsville Circuit.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Bridgeport Church to sell the church, and apply the proceeds upon the new church in the immediate neighbourhood.
- 3. CROWLAND CIRCUIT.—Whereas there is now but one Trustee holding the church property at Chippewa Village, the Conference grant permission to that Trustee to sell said property, and apply the proceeds on the debt of the Welland Avenue Church, in the city of St. Catharines.

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BRANTFORD DISTRICT.

PRINCETON CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the old church be permitted to sell the same, and apply the proceeds on the new church.

ST. THOMAS DISTRICT.

- 1. BISMARCK MISSION.—That the Trustees of the church at Duart be permitted to remove the church to Muirkirk, on the Canada Southern Railroad, and to sell the site, and apply the proceeds on expense of removing and repairing the church.
- 2. Whereas the church debt at Rodney Appointment is about \$1,000, and our membership in that place not able to pay this pressing claim; and whereas the Quarterly Meeting applies through the District Meeting to Conference for the Superintendent to canvass the Connexion for aid, and to raise the sum of \$800 to liquidate the debt: Resolved, that permission be granted.
- 3. Tyrconnell Circuit.—That the Trustees of Wallacetown Church property have permission to sell one-fifth acre from the church lot, and apply the proceeds upon the debt of the church.

CHATHAM DISTRICT.

- 1. Romney Circuit.—That the Trustees of the parsonage property receive permission to sell part of the lot—the proceeds to be applied towards purchasing another portion of ground, with a view to making the premises more convenient.
- 2. HARROW CIRCUIT.—That the Conference permit the Trustees of Trinity Church to sell the property, and apply the proceeds towards the liquidation of the parsonage debt.

3. Colchester Mission.—Whereas the congregation composing the Colchester (colored) Mission are desirous of going off the Mission Fund, and taking charge of their own religious services, on condition that the Methodist Church of Canada will relinquish its claim to the church and parsonage, or other buildings or lands which may constitute the property of the Mission; therefore,

Resolved, according to the recommendation of the District Meeting, that the Trustees of the said property have permission to dispose of the property and of the proceeds as they may see fit.

SARNIA DISTRICT.

CORUNNA CIRCUIT.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the church property in Corunna to sell lots 6 and 7, East Lynedoch Street, and apply the proceeds on the purchase of a new site, or on the building of a new church on the old site.

GUELPH DISTRICT.

- 1. Elmira Circuit.—That the Trustees of the church at Elmira have permission to sell part of the church lot, and invest the proceeds in the purchase of land for a roadway on the south side of said church.
- 2. Galt Circuit.—That the Trustees of the late New Connexion Church Property in Galt have permission to sell the same, and apply the proceeds on the new church in Galt.
- 3. Preston Circuit.—That the Trustees of the church at Strasburg, near Doon, be permitted to sell the property, and remit the proceeds to the Missionary Society.

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GODERICH DISTRICT.

BLYTH CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Bodmin parsonage have permission to sell the same and dispose of the proceeds as follows:—One-third of the proceeds to be handed over to the Trustees of Belgrave parsonage, and the balance, or two-thirds, to the Trustees of the parsonage at Blyth.

Whereas many of our churches are struggling with heavy burdens of debt, incurred by injudicious expense in building, or enlarging and adorning our places of worship; and whereas these burdens not only cripple the financial resources of the circuits for ministerial support, and sustenance of the Connexional funds, but also seriously interfere with spiritual labours and results; and whereas not those who incur the debts, but those who come after them, are the greatest sufferers in these cases; therefore, this Committee recommend the Conference again to call the attention of Superintendents of Circuits to the requirements of the Discipline of the Church, that at least three-fourths of the cost must be secured before such enterprises can properly be undertaken; and also to insist that the Chairmen, in the supervision of their districts, exercise a special care in preventing, according to Discipline, a repetition of these grave mistakes and their accompanying evils.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Report of the Sabbath School Committee was presented to the Conference by the Rev. G. A. Mitchell, as follows, and unanimously adopted:—

The Annual Reports from the various Sabbath Schools of the London Conference for the past year furnish us with evidences of gratifying progress in almost every department of the work, and your Committee would strongly impress upon the minds of the ministers and members of the Church the growing importance and far-reaching influences of this most promising sphere of Christian activity.

Having an attendance at our Sabbath Schools of 45,060 children, whose minds are so susceptible to the influences of truth, and 6,000 teachers labouring to instil into their minds the principles of the gospel, we not only ask, "What shall the harvest be?" but believe that if the Church were faithful to her trust, she would from this field reap her richest fruits, and gather within her ranks thousands who, in a very short time, will stand among the most heroic standard bearers of the cross.

Your Committee notes with pleasure the greatly improved quality and character of our Sabbath School literature, also the marked advance in its circulation over preceding years; yet they still urge a wider and more patriotic adoption of "Pleasant Hours," the "Sunbeam," and our excellent "Banner," all of which we know to be Canadian in their spirit and Methodistic in their teaching.

The sad consequences which intemperance is still causing in our land urges your Committee to emphasize more strongly than ever the importance and necessity of holding Temperance meetings, or establishing Band of Hope Associations in connection with all our schools, believing that a very large number of our children may thereby be prevented from falling into the snares of the destroyer in after years.

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tusing congly empeations large in fallThey would also suggest that a card be prepared for such Societies, embodying a pledge to abstain from the use of profane language, tobacco, and intoxicating drinks, and that all Superintendents be recommended to use these pledge cards in their schools.

Although the amount secured for "Sabbath School purposes" is considerably in advance of previous years, yet we regret to find that in a large number of schools the amount raised is insufficient to provide for their efficient working.

They also regret that the percentage of children learning our Catechism is still very small, and would reiterate the recommendation previously made, that a most energetic effort be put forth to teach the fundamental doctrines of the Bible as set forth in the Catechism of our Church.

A memorial having been received from the Chatham District, relating to the celebration of the Sabbath School Centennial, it was deemed inadvisable to take action in the case.

Your Committee continue to recognize the importance of District Sabbath School Conventions, where the various subjects relating to the successful working of our Sabbath Schools may be carefully considered, and are gratified to learn that such Conventions have been held in all the districts during the year, with three exceptions.

In conclusion, your Committee recommends the continuance of the Rev. George Brown as Treasurer of the General Sunday School Fund, and that the Secretary be elected corresponding member of the Sunday School Board.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Report of the Temperance Committee was read by the Rev. A. M. PHILLIPS, B.D., and after a few suggestions of amendment adopted.

The Report, as amended, read as follows:-

Methodism stands before the world as a Temperance Church. In keeping with the record sustained during the century and a half of the Church's existence, your Committee feels that in the present state of the Temperance reform, it is very important that the Methodist Church should stand true to her avowed principles, and take a foremost place in the final settlement of this great question. With a view of rendering practically effective the Church's oft-enunciated platform, we submit the following resolutions and recommendations:—

- 1. "The buying or selling spirituous liquor, or drinking them, unless in case of extreme necessity," is as much a violation of the letter of the Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada, as would be "the buying and selling of men, women, and children, with the intention to enslave them."
- 2. In view of the giant proportions and insidious influence of the evils of intemperance, and the direct opposition the liquor traffic offers to the salvation of souls and the extension of the kingdom of Christ, this Conference should regard the Temperance reform, both in its moral and legal aspects, as one of the most important departments of Church work.
- 3. That the Ministers of this Conference be recommended to encourage, as far as possible, the formation of Church Temperance Societies, as a recognized part of local Church work.

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- 4. That the officials of our Sabbath School be requested to have in the Sabbath School a Total Abstinence Pledge Roll, for both teachers and pupils. This pledge might include tobacco, and should be always open for signature, and be specially circulated in connection with the temperance lesson of each quarter. Those so enrolled to be regarded as the Sabbath School Temperance Society, which shall each year hold its anniversary and other public meetings if possible. A card of membership might be adopted for presentation to each one signing the pledge.
- 5. The Temperance question should continue to occupy a prominent place in our Church periodicals, and we would call the attention of the editor of the Sabbath School papers to the importance of opening a temperance department in those publications.
- 6. That the whole Church should be called upon to make special supplication to Almighty God in behalf of the Temperance cause, and that prayer-leaders be requested to make it the subject of special prayer at the meeting preceding the Sabbath of the temperance lesson in the Sabbath Schools.
- 7. That the power of our pulpits should continue to be exerted directly against this great evil, with even greater energy than ever, and we recommend that each Minister and Preacher be requested to preach a sermon in each of their congregations upon some practical aspect of the Temperance reform during the month of December.
- 8. That, whereas, the prohibition of the Liquor Traffic has been placed in the hands of the electors of the Dominion, it therefore becomes our duty, as a Conference and a Church, to inaugurate or encourage by every possible means the submission, carrying, and enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, in every municipality, at the earliest possible day.
- 9. That, whereas, in the opinion of this Conference, the use of alcoholic wine at the sacrament of the Lord's Supper is an offence and stone of stumbling to many who are

striving to live Christian lives; and, whereas, we believe the unfermented juice of the grape to be wine in the sense in which that word is used in the Bible, and was used at the Passover and at the Lord's Supper, both in its institution and observance by the primitive Christian church,

Therefore, be it resolved, that we strongly recommend all our Ministers and churches to use an unfermented wine at the Lord's Supper.

Your Committee, to which has been remitted the Memorial of the St. Thomas District, in order to amend its findings, as directed by the Conference, recommend,—That in all financial matters Superintendents of Circuits be required to carry out the disciplinary arrangements of the Church; that the financial year close on the 31st of May in each year; and that no Circuit shall take any of the regular funds of the year succeeding, to make up any deficiency that may have remained after that date.

In relation to the Memorial from the Sarnia District, requesting the Conference to order the preparation of a Schedule to be furnished to the Financial Secretary of each District, into which Schedule the various funds of each Circuit shall be entered in account with such Secretary,—your Committee cannot see it necessary to recommend to the Conference an increase in the number of Connexional Schedules.

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The report was adopted.

In regard to a Memorial from the Chatham District, respectfully requesting the Conference, as a body, to petition the Legislature in behalf of the enactment of a law legalizing marriage with a deceased wife's sister,—your Committee recommend that the prayer of the Chatham District be granted.

The recommendation was adopted.

In the matter of the Memorial from the Wellington District in reference to the hardship of Districts being required, as such, to raise an amount up to at least twenty-five dollars, as a District Scholarship Fund, and asking that it be left optional with Superintendents of Circuits whether such fund should be raised on each Circuit, or not,—your Committee recommend that Superintendents of Circuits be requested to earnestly commend the District Scholarship Scheme on each Circuit in our work, and that the spirit of the resolution on the Minutes of 1879 be carried out on each Circuit in the London Conference. Adopted.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

The Rev. J. C. Slater presented the Report of the Children's Fund Committee, as follows, which was adopted by the Conference:—

The number of children provided for by the Fund this year is 507.

During the year there have been 8 deaths; 20 have passed off, having no further claim; 2 have been transferred—making 30 in all whose claims cease. On the other hand, there is an accession of 44 new claimants, besides 5 trans-

ferred from another Conference, and 4 who come from the Indian into the regular work—in all 53. The number of claimants for 1881 is 530.

Notwithstanding the decrease in the membership, it is found practicable to provide for this increased number of children by a rate of 41 cents per member, including those on trial, which is hereby recommended as the rate to be adopted for the current year.

The Committee are satisfied that the regulation requiring the Financial Secretaries to prepare a list of all the names and ages of the children of ministers on their respective districts, and forward the same to the Treasurer immediately after the Financial District Meeting, greatly facilitates the work at Conference, and tends to secure accuracy in each District account.

It is again placed, therefore, among the standing resolutions in the Minutes, in order that it may not pass into disuse. Rev. D. L. Brethour and Rev. B. Clement were appointed Auditors. The Conference is requested to appoint Rev. J. C. Slater as Treasurer for the coming year.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISTIC AGENCY.

The Rev. John Philp, M.A., presented the following Report of the Committee on Evangelistic Agency, which was adopted by the Conference:—

Your Committee desire to express their conviction that it would be greatly to the advantage of the Church if a suitable agent—such as would command the confidence of this Conference—could be secured and set apart for special evangelistic work; and they are of opinion that no difficulty would be found in providing the support requisite. They do not, however, think that any definite arrangements can be made for the year upon which we are entering, and therefore regard it as unnecessary now to present any basis of action, but confidently hope that soon the way may open for the employment of such evangelistic agency.

Whereas the Committee have experienced difficulty in recommending any definite plan of action for the present year, and in nominating suitable persons for the work,—

Therefore, Resolved,—That the Report of the Committee, as adopted, be referred to the ensuing May District Meetings, with instructions to consider the same and prepare a special report on the subject, to be submitted to a Committee on Evangelistic Work at the ensuing Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TOBACCO.

The Rev. H. McLean presented the Report of the Committee on Tobacco, as follows, which was adopted by the Conference:—

The Committee can have no hesitation in expressing their strong disapprobation of the use of tobacco in the common modes in which it is used. They will not go so far as to affirm that there may not be cases in which the use of the weed may rot be serviceable medicinally, but it is undeniable that in the great majority of cases its use is a mere indulgence, unwarranted by any necessity whatever, and is therefore a wasteful expenditure of money, injurious to health in many cases, offensive in social life, and specially to be deplored in the case of young men.

The Committee do not wish to deal with this subject in the language of dictation, sarcasm, or denunciation, but would appeal to the right feeling of those among our people who may practise this habit, whether they will not be setting a better example to their families and to the community at large by discontinuing it, than by persisting in it. No man is justified in weakening his influence for good among society; and it is a serious question whether it can be pleasing in the sight of God to persist in a habit, costly in itself, offensive to others, and in many sad cases injurious to those who indulge in it.

As to any legislative action which may be desired on this question, it should be borne in mind that this Conference has no legislative functions, and if it had your Committee are of opinion that the existing provisions of our Discipline, if faithfully carried out, would meet the necessities, certainly the possibilities, of the case, as far as the members of the Conference are concerned.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :-

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows :-

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS' REPORT.

The Rev. Dr. WILLIAMS presented the Report of the Board of Examiners, as follows:—

At the Annual Meeting of the Board, held in Dundas, in April last, forty-three persons presented themselves for examination in the various studies required by the Conference. Certificates were given to eight Candidates and thirty-two Probationers, of whom six were of the first-class; twenty-seven of the second class; and seven of the third class. 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STANDING REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

Candidates for our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The classes shall be graded as follows:—Third-class, thirty to fifty marks; second-class, fifty to seventy-five marks; first-class, seventy five to one hundred marks; ninety and upwards marks, first-class with honours.

That no paper under thirty marks shall be received; but the Probationer failing in that study shall have the opportunity of pursuing the subject the next year; and that the number be registered, but not counted in the aggregate of marks. The st to be rec not be lo liminary

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The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers, shall not be lower than *fifty per cent*. of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a Public School Teacher's Certificate of the second-class, or a Certificate of having passed a Matriculation Examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to stand an Examination on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an Examination in the subjects of Biblical History and in Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or of the College where he may be pursuing his studies.

I. That the Senate of Victoria University desire to convey to the several Conferences, and the Districts within their bounds, their sincere thanks for the establishing of the District Scholarships.

II. That the Senate would respectfully suggest that each Scholarship hereafter be of the value of \$25, and that this be the uniform value throughout all the Districts.

III. That where any District desires to contribute a larger sum, such District be invited to establish a second, third, and fourth Scholarship, as may be wished by the District concerned, each Scholarship, however, to be of the value of \$25, and in every case the name of the District be announced in connection with the Scholarships awarded by the Senate.

The above recommendations were adopted.

WESLEYAN FEMALE COLLEGE.

The Rev. Dr. Burns, President of the Wesleyan Female College, addressed the Conference respecting the present position and future prospects of the Institution over which he presides, showing the strong claims of the Institution upon the sympathy and support of the Conference.

Joseph Lister, Esq., of the City of Hamilton, and one of the Board of Trustees of the College, also briefly addressed the Conference on the same subject. The fi the Boa held on

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The following extract from the Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Wesleyan Female College, held on the 11th of May, 1880, was read:—

Moved by Joseph Lister, Esq., seconded by Dennis Moore, Esq., and Resolved,—"That the London Conference be requested to appoint the Rev. Dr. Burns, Moral Governor for the ensuing year."—A. Burns, Secretary.

Also, "That the Principal, Dr. Burns, and Joseph Lister, Esq., be appointed to present the request of the Trustee Board to the London Conference."—A. Burns, Secretary.

Moved by Dr. Rice, seconded by Rev. Joseph H. Robinson, "That the above request be granted." Carried.

It was moved by Rev. Dr. Sanderson, seconded by Rev. Dr. Rice, and unanimously Resolved,—"That this Conference rejoices in the prosperity of the Hamilton Ladies' College, under the Governorship of Dr. Burns, during the past year, and that we heartily and unitedly pledge ourselves to do our utmost to promote all the interests of the Institution, and especially to use our influence in our several Circuits to secure pupils thereto."

Church Property Legislation.

Moved by Rev. E. B. Ryckman, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. C. Henderson, M.A., and Resolved,—"That each Superintendent provide himself with a copy of the Act affecting our Church Property, and that each Chairman of a District inquire at the approaching Financial District Meeting whether the provisions of the Act have been complied with; and that this resolution be published in the printed Minutes of the Conference."

General Conference Fund Annual Collection.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Williams, seconded by Rev. C. Lavell, M.A., and Resolved,—"That while we, as a Conference, are gratified to learn that the General Conference Collection has been promptly taken up within our bounds; yet in view of the embarrassed condition of the General Conference Fund, by reason of which several members of

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this Conference have been compelled to wait for years for expenses incurred in attending to Church work, and in order to prevent serious jealousies and to promote confidence and harmony among the several Annual Conferences, it is exceedingly desirable that the Superintendents of Circuits and Missions should not only take up the above collection in proper time, but also promptly forward the same to the General Treasurer of the Fund, and thus prevent the payment of interest on borrowed money, and promote the peace and harmony of the Church."

Resolved,—"That as Rev. James Gray has indicated his intention of visiting several of the sister Conferences, he is requested to present this resolution to them as he may think prudent."

Concerning the "Relief and Extension Fund."

The Rev. Dr. Sanderson presented the Report of the Committee appointed by the Conference to examine into the cause of deficient returns in some Circuits in connection with the Relief and Extension Fund. After dismoion the motion for the adoption of the Report was lost.

It was then moved by Rev. A. Langford, seconded by Rev. James Gray, and Resolved,—"That the Chairmen of Districts be requested to ascertain in the approaching Financial District Meetings what Circuits or Missions on their respective Districts have failed to secure subscriptions in behalf of the Relief and Extension Fund, and to make such arrangements as will secure a general canvass wherever this duty has been neglected."

"The Canada Temperance Act" in its Integrity.

It was moved by Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., seconded by Rev. Alexander Langford, and carried unanimously: That whereas the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 declares section 57, as follows:—"In case more than half of the votes polled are for the petition, the same shall be held to have been adopted, and the returning officer shall make his return to the Governor General in Council accordingly;"

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And whereas the following amendment to the above Section received a majority of votes in the recent Session of the House of Commons, viz.: "That Section 57 of the said Canada Temperance Act is hereby repealed, and the following clause substituted therefor: If a majority of all the voters whose names are entered on the voters' list used at said polling, vote, the same polling shall be held to have been adopted, but not otherwise, and the Returning Officer shall make a return to the Governor General;"

And whereas we believe the effect of such amendment would be practically to frustrate the benevolent design of the said Act as originally passed;

Therefore, Resolved,—(1) That we, the London Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, in Conference assembled, do hereby strongly disapprove of the aforesaid amendment.

(2) That we hereby convey our hearty thanks to those members of the House of Commons who spoke and voted against such amendment.

(3) That we cordially approve of the action of the Senate in vetoing the above amendment.

Constitution of the London Conference Missionary Society.

Bro. James Gray brought forward his resolutions, of which he gave notice, touching the Constitution of the Conference Missionary Society, as follows:—

1. That the Constitution of the Missionary Society of the London Conference be amended as follows:—No 3 to be amended thus: The Committee shall meet as soon after the meeting of the Central Board of Missions as possible, the time to be fixed and the Committee notified by the President of Conference. Adopted. No. 5 to be omitted. Adopted. No. 7. The Superintendents of Circuits and Missions shall forward to the Chairmen of their respective Districts all monies received by them as soon as possible after collection, and the Chairmen shall immediately forward all amounts thus received to the General Treasurers,

the final balance to be paid during the Sessions of the Conference. Adopted.

"The Court of Appeal" and the Transfer Committee.

Whereas the last General Conference empowered the Conference Special Committee of that body to receive and try appeals involving questions of law; and whereas a majority of the several Annual Conferences decided at their last Session that the doing away with a representative member of the Transfer Committee (beside the President) was a matter affecting their interests injuriously, and appointed such representatives; and whereas a member of the Montreal Conference appealed against the action of that Conference in appointing such representative; and whereas the General Conference Special Committee, acting on such appeal, decided that the representative of the Montreal Conference was illegally appointed, thus indirectly ignoring the action of the majority of the Annual Conferences; therefore,

Resolved,—"That, in the judgment of this Conference, the Conference Special Committee have interfered with the constitutional rights of the Annual Conferences in assuming to decide, in opposition to the action of the majority of the Conferences, what are the rights of the Annual Conferences; and we do hereby affirm the principle that the majority of the Annual Conferences alone have the right to decide as to those questions which affect their own rights."

It was then moved by Rev. James Graham, seconded by Rev. James Gray, and Resolved,—"That inasmuch as it is the constitutional right and privilege of each Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada to elect one of its members annually to the Transfer Committee, this Conference do now proceed to elect a member of the Transfer Committee, who, with the President of this Conference, shall represent it on the Transfer Committee."

The Conference accordingly proceeded to ballot for the election of a member of the Transfer Committee, resulting in the choice of Rev. A. Langford.

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Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

Resolved,—That the contributions to the Connexional Funds shall be taken at the following dates:—

- 1. GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.—In the month of July.
- 2. CONTINGENT FUND.—In the months of September and March.
- 3. Superannuated Ministers' Fund —In the months of November and December.
- 4. MISSIONARY AND EDUCATIONAL FUNDS.—As arragned by the Financial District Meetings.
- 5. SUNDAY SCHOOL FUND. -At any time during the year.

Treasurers and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock p.m., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Financial and Other Returns.

Whereas the Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference, it is—

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular state-

ments audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairmen to the above resolution.

Sabbath School Reports.

Resolved,—That Superintendents of Circuits shall report in making up their schedules of all Sabbath-schools held by our people in connection with our work, whether they are governed in accordance with the published Constitution or not.

Ordination Sermon.

Resolved,—That it shall be the rule in this Conference in the future that the retiring President shall preach the Ordination Sermon!

District Secretaries.

Resolved,—That each District Secretary be instructed to forward to the Superintendent of the Circuit where the Conference is to be held, the name of the member of the Stationing Committee, and all other ministers who purpose attending Conference, at as early a date as possible, and that only those whose names are forwarded shall be provided with billets.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make inquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits,

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and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Preachers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connection and their ordination are thereby deferred.

Relating to the Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book-Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book-Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who, within the period of ten years after Ordination, may wish to withdraw from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill-health.

Visiting the Public Schools, &c.

Resolved,—That the Conference earnestly recommends the Ministers of this body to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Council of Public Instruction, to visit the Public Schools as frequently as possible at the time prescribed, for the purpose of communicating religious instruction.

The Bible and Public Schools.

Resolved,—Inasmuch as the Bible may be used by public authority in our public schools, and as it is desirable that it should be used in all our schools, we recommend our membership and adherents to use their influence to secure its use in all schools from which it is now excluded.

Removal of Ministers during the Year.

That in the event of a brother removing from any Circuit, District, or Conference to another Circuit, or District, or Conference during the year, he shall be required to obtain a certificate of removal from the Superintendent, Chairman, or President, according as the removal may be to the Conference or District; but in every case the examination of character, belief in our doctrines and the like, shall be held in connection with the name as it stands in the printed Minutes of Conference, due certificates being forwarded the Chairman covering the period of time between removal and District Meeting.

Conference Year.

Resolved,—That all Ministers and Preachers of the London Conference be held responsible for the work on the Circuits they are about to leave during the month of June, and on the Circuits to which they go on the first Sabbath in July.

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THE CONFERENCE ANNIVERSARIES.

1.—TEMPERANCE MEETING.

The Annual Temperance Meeting was held in Wesley Church, Tuesday evening, June 1st, the Rev. W. S. Griffin, President, presiding. Able addresses were delivered by Revs. William McDonagh and Alfred M. Phillips, B.D.

2.—Sunday-School Anniversary.

FIRST DAY-EVENING.

The Sunday-school Anniversary was held in the First Methodist Church, on Wednesday evening, June 2nd, at 8 o'clock. The Rev. John Wakefield, President of Conference, occupied the chair.

Able and instructive addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Ryckman and Revs. George C. Jones and John E. Williams, of the M. E. Church, Rochester, N. Y.

3.—THE EDUCATIONAL MEETING.

The Anniversary meeting of the Educational Society was held in the Centenary Church, Thursday evening, June 3rd, commencing at 8 o'clock. The President, Rev. John Wakefield, occupied the chair, and the Rev. Dr. Burns offered the opening prayer. Very able and stirring addresses were delivered by Revs. Drs. Nelles and Williams. The meeting closed with the doxology and benediction.

4.—RECEPTION OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

The Reception Service was held in Wesley Church, on Friday evening, June 4th. The President occupied the chair, and announced the 433rd hymn, and called upon the Rev. Dr. Rose, of Totonto, who led in prayer.

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The Secretary of Conference called the names of the brethren who had passed through the probation, and introduced them to the President and the Conference to be received into full connection. The following are the names of the candidates for said reception:

The following resolution was moved by the Rev. Dr. Burns, seconded by Rev. A. Langford, and supported by Rev. Dr. Rice:—

"That the eight young men whose names have been called by the Secretary be received into full connection with the Conference, and ordained."

The resolution was unanimously carried by a standing vote. The addresses were most pertinent to the purposes of this the crowning meeting of the Conference, and were eminently calculated to enhance an intelligent estimate of our most precious and practical system of soul-saving gospel truth.

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The 744th hymn was sung, and Rev. Dr. Rice pronounced the benediction.

5.—THE ORDINATION SERVICE.

The Ordination Service began at 11 o'clock a.m., on Sunday, June 6th. After devotional exercises conducted by the President, the official sermon was preached by Rev. W. S. Griffin, ex-President of the Conference, from Zechariah iii. 7. The discourse was elaborate, and eminently adapted to the important occasion of its delivery.

6.—Conference Missionary Meeting.

The Conference Missionary Meeting was held in the Centenary Church on Monday evening, June 7th, at 7.30 o'clock.

Rev. W. W. Ross, in the absence of the President of the Conference, occupied the chair, and announced the 433rd hymn, which was sung, after which Rev. Wm. Willoughby led in prayer. Earnest and appropriate addresses were delivered by Rev. Dr. Sutherland, General Secretary of the Missionary Society; Rev. Wm. Williams and Rev. James Graham, and also by Rev. James H. Messmore, Missionary of the American Methodist Episcopal Church, from India, who gave an interesting account of Missionary toil in that far off field.

The choir of the church was present, and added much to the interest of the meeting by an effective rendering of several choice pieces of music.

At the conclusion, the audience, led by the choir, joined in singing the Missionary hymn, "From Greenland's icy mountains," and Rev. A. E. Russ, M.A., pronounced the benediction.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

COLLEGE PRESIDENT AND PROFESSORS, AND THE EX-BOOK STEWARD.

The Rev. Dr. Nelles gave the Conference a full and inspiring report of the condition and the increasingly successful work of Victoria University.

The Rev. Prof. Shaw, LL.B., explained the reason of the unavoidable absence of the Rev. Dr. Douglas—because of a recent operation by an oculist for the recovery of impaired sight. He also gave an account of the aims and the work of the Theological College of Montreal, which caused much pleasure and satisfaction to the Conference.

The Rev. Dr. Rose addressed the Conference on a diversity of topics, but especially upon the "Ministerial Aid Society," giving an informal report of its condition and expenditure.

The Rev. Dr. Burns conducted the examination of the Candidates for Ordination, assisted by Prof. Shaw. The examination was one of much interest.

THE BOOK STEWARD AND THE EDITORS.

The Rev. William Briggs, Book Steward; the Rev. Dr. Dewart, Editor of the *Christian Guardian*; and the Rev. W. H. Withrow, M.A., Editor of the *Methodist Magazine* and the Sunday-school periodicals, were introduced to the

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President by Dr. RICE, and by him presented to the Conference.

The BOOK STEWARD gave the Conference a satisfactory report of the state of affairs at the Book Room. The marked success is an augury of still better things to come

Dr Dewart and Brother Withrow also addressed the Conference, and expressed their gratitude and encouragement for the success that had crowned their labours, together with those of the Book Steward, in endeavouring to furnish our Connexion with a style of literature specially calculated to conserve and promote "whatsoever things are true and pure," and to neutralize the influence of too widely circulated publications whose tendency is evil, and only evil.

THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

Dr. RICE reported that at the late meeting of the Book Committee, his place on that Committee had been declared vacant by his transference from the London Conference, and that the Rev. W. S. Griffin was appointed to the Central Board, and Dr. Williams to the Executive, for the remainder of the General Conference term.

THE MONTREAL BRANCH BOOK ROOM.

Concerning the Montreal Branch Book Room, it was moved, by Dr. Fowler, seconded by Rev. H. Christopherson "That it is the judgment of this Conference, that in view of the fact that the Montreal Branch of the Book Room has shown a continuous loss from year to year, that steps should be taken calculated to remove such loss; and failing the possibility of this being accomplished, that the Montreal Branch should be closed." Carried.

FINANCIAL CLOSE OF THE CONFERENCE YEAR.

Moved by Rev. M. Benson, seconded by Rev. Thomas Hanna, and Resolved, "That the Schedules for financial returns be printed to correspond with the resolution fixing the close of the financial year on the 31st May."

Moved by Rev. Dr. WILLIAMS, seconded by Rev. Dr. RYCKMAN, and Resolved, "That the preparation of the petition to the House of Commons and the Senate, on the proposed legislation legalizing the marriage with a deceased wife's sister, be referred to the Conference Special Committee.

SISTER.

REMOVAL OF REV. E. A. HEALY.

Moved by Dr. Rice, seconded by Rev.-C. Lavell, M.A., and Resolved, "That Brother E. A. Healy having gone to the United States on account of ill-health, the President be authorized to give him the necessary papers to secure his admission into a Conference where he may reside."

THE CONFERENCE CEASES TO RECOGNIZE REV. C. CURRY.

It was also Resolved, "That as the Rev. Christopher Curry has repeatedly failed to report to the District Meeting in which his name is annually called, that he be no longer recognized as a minister among us."

THE ORDINATION CLASS TO PRESIDENT WAKEFIELD.

The Assistant Secretary of the Conference introduced to the President the Revs. E. B. Setphenson, B.A., and W. Bridgman as a deputation from the Ordination Class, who, on behalf of their Class, presented the President with a beautifully framed group of himself and the young men whom he had ordained on the preceding Sabbath. The President accepted the gift, and made a suitable reply.

ŒCUMENICAL COUNCIL.

Moved by Rev. Dr. RYCKMAN, seconded by Rev. Dr. Burns, and Resolved, "That a Committee of five, chosen by ballot, be appointed to meet with similar Committees of the Toronto and Montreal Conferences, which joint Committee shall be authorized to select the representatives to the Œcumenical Conference of August 1881."

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The following were declared duly elected:—E. B. Ryckman, D.D.; J. A. Williams, D.D.; J. Wakefield, W. S. Griffin, G. R. Sanderson, D.D.

INTRODUCTION TO CONFERENCE.

The Conference appointed Rev. W. S. Griffin, ex-President, to accompany the Rev. Dr. Rice to the Toronto Conference and introduce him to that body.

GEORGETOWN ACADEMY.

The Rev. Nelson Burns, M.A., Principal of the Georgetown Academy, was introduced by the President, and briefly addressed the Conference touching the good work being accomplished by that institution, religiously as well as educationally.

REV. JAMES WATSON (ENGLAND).

It was Resolved, "That the Rev. James Watson be allowed to remain a resident of England; and that the President of Conference be authorized to furnish him with his certificate of standing, should he require it."

This to us is no mere matter of form, but rather a most desirable and fitting medium by which we may convey to you words of affectionate greeting, and offer such pastoral counsel and encouragement as the lessons of the past may suggest and the circumstances of the present demand. "That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us."

The record of another year is before us. It presents much that may well claim our heartiest gratitude and praise, and some features that call for humiliation before God. The decrease of 168 in our membership deeply affects us. It is true, special causes have occasioned this; for while 5,406 have been received on trial, the unusual number of 3,876 have removed—the great majority of these to the North-West—and 495 have "fallen asleep in Jesus." Thus we have suffered possibly more sorely than in any previous year. Yet

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we cannot but acknowledge that if we had, as pastors and people, lived in more intimate communion with the Great Source of power, and given ourselves with more marked fidelity to the one object of a Saviour's life and death, we might have rejoiced in a more abundant harvest of souls.

We would remember, however, as a ground of encouragement, that any mere numerical statement cannot at all express the full measure of spiritual good that may have been effected. Thousands of our Israel doubtless have been led into a high Christian experience, their sympathies have been broadened, their faith enlarged, their grasp of truth strengthened, their lives more richly laden with the "fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ unto the glory and praise of God."

Our Sabbath-schools report an increase of 1,096, making a total of 44,462 Sabbath-school scholars in our Conference. Of this number, 5,920 are enrolled as members of the Church, while many more are enjoying careful spiritual training in Catechism classes, and thus in early years are being "nourished in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." The tumber of scholars of more advanced years is encouragingly large. In this we have an assurance that our young people are not turning aside from the Church of their fathers, but are taking pleasure in its teachings and are willingly remaining within the circle of its influence.

This is to us, as we believe it will be to you, a reason for devout thanksgiving. That Church is doing the noblest work for God and humanity that is seeking to save the youth. That Church will impress most fully its spirit upon this land that is guarding most carefully this element of success and power. Every faithful worker in the Sabbath-school is a national benefactor. If the men of the future are to develop the highest type of manhood, and assume the noblest phase of character—if they are firmly to meet the opposing forces of evil, and help the world forward in the face of abounding error, it can only be as the youth of

to-day are brought under the directive influence of the Gospel of Christ. A careful seedtime will assure a true and abundant harvest. How great the need, therefore, for continued and more earnest effort in this direction! By your prayers, your presence, your liberality, strengthen the hands and cheer the hearts of those who devote their energies to this work. And may the spirit of wisdom and grace rest more fully upon the officers and teachers and scholars of our Sabbath-schools.

The past year will ever be marked in our Connexional history as one of special interest, by reason of the noble effort made, and thus far so happily carried forward, in the "Relief and Extension Fund" movement. Our burdened missionary treasury, and the multiplied calls and ever-widening interests of the Church, laid this upon us as an imperative duty. Again have the congregations of our common Methodism proved their Christian loyalty—their readiness to assist in every measure justly devised for the more successful and vigorous promotion of the cause of God. Already over \$111,000 have been subscribed.

We rejoice, moreover, in this, that notwithstanding the special appeal made, the ordinary income of our Missionary Society is very nearly equal to that of former years.

No question should awaken a deeper interest than that which concerns the comfort of our aged and worn-out ministers. These honoured brethren have a place in our warmest affections. Amid trials and privations peculiar to their time, they laid the foundations upon which we build. The pillars of our greatness were reared by their hands. They tought the battles and won the victories which have brought us renown. The glory of the past rests as a crown of honour on their brow. They are passing from us. We would seek to make the evening of their eventful and useful lives one of undisturbed peace—to lift it above every unnecessary care, and free it from every darkening cloud. To this end we would appeal the more earnestly to you on their behalf, that

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your "abundance may be a supply for their want." "God is able to make all grace to abound toward you, that ye always, having all sufficiency in all things, may abound in this as in every good work."

While the fathers in this ministry are falling, young men of piety and promise are being raised up. It is with you to grant them the preparation which they need, that they may be no unworthy successors of those whose mantles they have assumed. The Church that does not now send forth her ministers, thoroughly trained, to the great work before them, is recreant to her trust. Every messenger of the truth should be prepared to do the best work he can, and in the best manner possible. He whom God calls to this most sacred and honourable office should be thoroughly fitted in mind and heart, in understanding and spirit. Never was the need of a ministry rich in theological and general literary resources more urgent than now. In this age of varying thought, when scepticism, with peculiar subtlety, is plying its busiest art-when infidelity, with the face and footstep of an angel, is exploring science, and nature, and antiquity, for weapons with which to slay the truth, it is needful that the watchman on the walls of Zion be quick to perceive and strong to defend. The "sword of the Spirit" must needs be wielded by a practised and anointed arm.

Our young men are thirsting for knowledge—longing for greater intellectual fitness. Withhold it not from them. They are knocking at the gates of our universities and schools of training. Open them wide, that they may enter in. Sanctified intellect will lead in the march of Christian progress. In our theological schools in Cobourg and Montreal we have all the advantages at present necessary. What is needed is a more ample treasury. We are compelled to report a decrease of \$270 in the contributions for this purpose. We entreat you, therefore, among the many calls forget not this. There is nothing that will more directly or richly repay your liberality than the thorough training of those who,

in the years to come, are to occupy your pulpits and dispense to you the Word of Life.

Our educational institutions, prominent among which are Victoria University and the Female College in the city where we are assembled, have been favoured with a year of encouraging prosperity. They are among the first in the Province, and afford the highest literary culture under the ægis of Christian influence. Their halls should be filled with the sons and daughters of our people. To no better centres of light could these be led—under no safer guardianship could they be placed. Rejoice with us in the opportunities thus afforded, and use them in preference to all others. Remember, it is consistent with the utmost catholicity of spirit and good-will to be pronounced in your convictions and positive in your attachments.

Brethren, we would affectionately call you to the careful observance of all those duties which more particularly affect your personal character and influence among men. " As ye have received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk ye in Him, rooted and built up in Him, and stablished in faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving." The world is watching you with a keen eye and penetrating vision. Its spirit is still antagonistic to Christ. Many there are who would seek occasion against you. misconstrue your motives and misinterpret your deeds. Prophesying failure, they wait to see your faith falter, your hope expire, your zeal languish, your patience yield beneath perplexity and care. Children of the living God, beneath the watching eye of the world, remember you are the followers of the Lord. "Walk worthy of the high calling wherewith ye are called." Let your steps be kingly in whatever path you tread. Live consistently with your sonship; act in keeping with your high relation. Study goodness. Look to your Divine ensample, and ever copy after Him. Be not content with aims that are low or attainments that are small. Be ambitious in the Christian life. Here ambi188

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tion is sanctified. Its loftiest yearnings may be fully met. "Put on as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering. Let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and whatever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him."

In the circles of business life there have of late been periods of most severe trial—seasons of embarrassment which may have tested many of you most sorely. They may still be upon you. Rejoice in the possibility and privilege, even in these crucial moments, of keeping your hands unsoiled and your hearts unsullied. Let your glory be the "answer of a good conscience toward God." Be open as the day and fearless as the sun. Let everything go down rather than character. Let your hopes and aims, your plans and prospects, all lie at your feet a wreck, rather than have your principles shaken or your integrity called in question. Let fortune go if circumstances demand it, but hold on to truth. Wrap yourself in the garment of virtue, and be determined to walk the pathway of life with unblemished honour.

It has been truly said, "There is nothing that tries character so much as trade." Under the pressure that is at times felt, you will find the morality of business in many instances at variance with the law of God. Expedients are adopted which are unbecoming the Christian character, and which merit the censure of every true man. Hard bargains are struck with overreaching shrewdness. Plans are pursued by men who claim to be honest, and which public opinion may not condemn, but which are inconsistent with highminded integrity. Obligations that are just and binding are sought to be set aside. Advantage is taken of laws of exemption, forgetting apparently that there is a divine law underlying all human legislation, and that he who refuses to act justly when he has the power (however shielded) is not an honest man.

Brethren, God places no man in circumstances to justify a departure from moral rectitude. In the most severe ordeal you may "walk uprightly," and thereby "walk surely." You may have such a sensibility of right and wrong as will keep you from deviating a hair's breadth from what you know to be duty. Your heart may be as far from fraud as heaven from earth. "To do justice and judgment is more acceptable to the Lord than sacrifice."

Guard carefully, amid the anxieties which may surround you, your personal piety. Keep the way of holiness, and thus save your soul. Dwell near the cross. It is dangerous to wander far from Calvary. The place of safety is close by the Mount.

Piety is not an unconscious exercise. Like the body, it must be fed; like the lamp, it must be trimmed. Abound therefore "in faith and knowledge and all diligence." Be ever reaching out after, and rising up to, the full measure of godliness. "Speaking the truth in love, grow up into Him in all things which is the head, even Christ."

Some of you may be appointed to special sorrow. You may dwell in obscure homes. You may walk in uneven paths. It may be yours to endure much. Let it be yours to trust much. Nothing will wither the spirit sooner than impatience. Have faith in God. Imitate the example of the sainted Rutherford. "Put Christ between you and the storm." It is His delight to shelter. If He stills not the tempest, He will guard you through it. Walk on the sunny side. Your joy need be no transient guest. Look not upon the clouds that come and go, but upon the light that shines steady and undimmed above them all.

If the life to which we have thus exhorted you is to be maintained, it can only be by walking "in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord." We would not, therefore, in this our Annual Address, overlook those duties which

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are directly conducive to this. Their importance would justify the most urgent and frequent appeals.

Neglect not closet devotion. Cultivate communion with your own heart. The more you have to do with the world, the more you need to do with God and your own soul. Have your stated seasons of retirement and prayer. Draw from the fountain; if the source be not exhaustless, the heat will soon dry the stream. Like Fijah, linger on the mount until there come to you that anointing that will rouse you to duty, and make you valiant in the face of the world's guilt. Meditate. Thinking will bring feeling; musing will make the fire burn. It needs but the thoughtful recognition of personal responsibility to rouse to an intensity of zeal any true and noble heart.

Be lovers of the word of God. Make it your chosen companion, your constant friend. The Bible is the best educator in every sense that the world has. It is your only safe guide. Be more desirous, therefore, to increase in its knowledge than in any other.

A recent writer has said, "We live in stormy times, and upon the shores of a tempestuous ocean. Every returning wave seems to sweep away the old landmarks, and to make fresh innovations; and what is worse, there is no time-table applicable to the shifting shore." We accept the first statement. We do live in stormy times. We are tossing on a wild sea. Waves of doubt are dashing all about us. All this is true. But we cannot accept the final statement. There is a time-table that is applicable to all shores. There is no emergency that it cannot meet—no condition that it cannot answer—no change that it cannot rectify. Such is the Word of Truth. Commit yourselves to its keeping. It will guard you amid peril; it will lift you above doubt; it will infuse into your spirit its own divine heroism; it will save you both now and forever.

Diligently observe the public and social means of grace. Regularity of attendance upon the services of the sanctuary

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should be your rule. Let not the weariness consequent upon the week of toil cause absence from the house of God on the holy day. Rest you need; rest in the highest sense will be given you as you "wait upon the Lord." Whatever will best calm the fitful fever of the world, will best bring vigour to both body and mind. True Sabbath rest is found in Sabbath worship.

Among the social services, we would seek to give special prominence to the Class-Meeting. It is not yet effete, and we trust it never will be. The venerable Wesley was accustomed to say that "He could never sufficiently praise God for the formation of the Class as a provision for mutual edification and encouragement in his Societies." He looked upon it as a thought from God—a divine inspiration. The experience of many years made the value of this provision more and more apparent to him.

There is no means in the Christian Church that so fully accords with the Apostolic ideal of fellowship—no means that promotes more directly the work of self-examination, and therefore has a stronger influence on the growth and maturity of our spiritual life.

We entreat you, prize the Class-Meeting. Honour it, and it will honour you. Especially would we urge upon young disciples devotion to this duty. This is the service that you need to make you strong. Live in the enjoyment of such communion, and your growth will be assured.

Dear Brethren, take into your homes thorough Christian principles. Shield your family circles with the panoply of prayer. Live to bless. Let your influence in the home be a constant welcome to the cross. Guard carefully as to the company which your children keep, the amusements in which they indulge, and the literature which they read. Let no book lie upon the table, or rest upon the shelf, that is not pure and healthful and instructive. Sensationalism will

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inflame, but will not feed. What is needed is not that which will unbridle the passion, but will govern the heart.

We commend to you our own periodicals—The Christian Guardian and Canadian Methodist Magazine—also our Sabbath School literature. The excellence of these periodicals is acknowledged. If you knew their value and their influence for good in leading to thoughtfulness, intelligence, and a fondness for substantial reading, and, above all, in impressing lessons of morality and religion, you would not suffer your home to be without them. No mere secular organ can supply the place of these. The family that has no such weekly or monthly visitor is lacking one of the strongest helps to good.

Go forth into the world to live for Christ. As Christians you have the highest claim, because you have the surest guarantee to the enterprises and successes and honours of life. In these magnify the grace of God. Be large-hearted, ready-handed, high-souled. Be Christ-like everywhere. Let every effort for the well-being of men meet with your heartiest support.

Especially on the great question of Temperance be increasingly aggressive. This is not the time for half-hearted effort, but for vigorous action. Don't fear to be outspoken and positive in so grave an issue. The well-being of many may be depending upon you. Make it a principle to countenance no measure that would deal leniently with the evil of strong drink. Unceasingly labour for its suppression in every form; thus shall "the blessing of him that was ready to perish" come upon you.

In conclusion, we pray for ourselves a richer baptism, and we pray the same for you. "That ye may with one mind and one mouth glorify God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." As ministers, we feel how closely we are knit to you, and how greatly we are dependent upon you. Our

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success is largely in your hands. We enter with you upon another year cheered by the recollection of the past, and full of hope. May it be the best in our history! Labour as never before to win souls. It is the highest calling. It bespeaks the truest wisdom. To this work consecrate time, talent, opportunity, influence—all.

Life is hastening to its evening. With many, the day is far spent—the night is at hand. With all, the time at best is short. The Master is calling. Each hour some toiler in the vineyard of the Lord is summoned from his labour to his rest. "Be diligent, that ye may be found of Him in peace, without spot, and blameless." Strive for the "abundant entrance," the "full reward."

"Now, our Lord Jesus Christ Himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts, and stablish you in every good word and work."

"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen."
