New Inquiry Will Provide for Formal Presentation of P. A. T. A. Case

Canadian Press ZENORA, Ont., Nov. 9.—A commissioner will be appointed by the government for the completion of the inquiry into the alleged combine in the drug trade. Appointment of a commissioner under the Combines Investigation Act is being made by Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Labor, in order to provide the Proprietary Article Trade Association with the fullest opportunity for the formal presentation of their case, as requested by the association.

In a statement issued last night,

Hon. Peter Heenan states: "The statement I have received from the Proprietary Articles Trade Association, the alleged combine in the drug trade, is substantially an assertion of their claim that, prior to the issuance of the registrar's interim report, they did not have the full opportunity which is contemplated by the Combines Investigation Act to present their side of the case. Accordingly, they appeal for further insioners to be appointed under the

Combines Investigation Act. SATISFIED WITH REPORT

"I am satisfied that the report of the registrar was made only after full consideration of both sides of the case. The druggists' organization expresses doubt on this point. I hesitate to incur further delay, but rather than take in any way unfair to the trade, I would give them the benefit of the would give them the benefit of the doubt. Accordingly, in order to provide the P. A. T. A. with the fullest opportunity for the formal presentation of their case, I have decided to arrange for the appointment of a commissioner for this purpose and for the completion of the inquiry."

SOME DISTURBING SUGGESTIONS

THE new Welland Canal when completed will time Provinces will have paid their share of the cost, but a Buffalo man, who is described by the Financial Post as "one of the first three or four shipping men concerned with the Great Lakes trade," is quoted as saying that he could not see that the Welland Canal had benefited the Maritimes at all. Nor did he see in the new canal "any particular advantage in the possibilities of a coalcarrying trade from the Maritimes."

Still another Buffalo man is quoted by the Financial Post as saying "he could see that the life. Walland Canal and St. Lawrence system is a positive detriment to the Maritimes, since this canal system built up Montreal as a grain port, whereas Halifax and Saint John should have displaced Portland, Me., as soon as Canadian railroads obtained their eastern terminais in Canada."

So much for the Maritimes and their share of that \$116,000,000 cost of the new canal. But if the canal will not benefit them, to whom will the adventage accrue?? Sir Wilfrid Laurier justified the Arst canal by saying grain would go to Montreal without fear of competition from Buffalo or Oswego. We know now that it failed to prevent Buffalo competition, and the new canal will enable the large lake boats to get down to Oswego, and make it a rival of the Canadian port of Kingston. The large lake boats cannot go on to Montreal, and the grain will have to be trans-shipped at Prescott or Kingston-the latter being most ! favored. But will the American port of Oswego be entirely out of the running? A writer in the Financial Post puts the question thus: "Will Canada be proud of this (canal) or will our investment of money and energy turn out to be a bitter disappointment?"

That is an extraordinary question to ask at this stage of the proceedings. The Buffalo shipping man told the Financial Post that he did not see how the new canal could cut grain rates very much. Although there would be a saving in time, he did not expect to see any material reduction in rates, because of the poor prospect for return cargo from

Here is another amazing statement which a Buffalo man interviewed by the Financial Post credits to a former Canadian cabinet minister. He "declared privately that the interest on the money being spent on the Welland Canal, or what would be spent by the time it is finished on the usual government scale, would pay the rail freight rates on every bushel of grain from the originating point in the northwest to Montreal."

Why does the Financial Post give publicity such views as are indicated in this summary of two long articles in its columns? Is there a possibility that the huge expenditure on the Welland Canal will not be justified by results? BOYS' CLUBS

THE Boys' Clubs in Saint John will soon be open for the winter. It is interesting to note to what an extent the movement of providing clubs for boys is growing. The October News Bulletin of the Boys' Club Federation tells of a new club to be opened in Detroit this week, in a district in which, within a radius of a mile, live 12,000 boys. The district is one of the worst sections in the city in its juvenile court record, and the new club had Its inception in an appeal made by the judge of the Juvenile Court. Over fifty prominent leaders in the business and civic life of Detroit are behind the new club. The Governor of Michigan, the Mayor of Detroit, bank presidents, business and professional men are on the directorate. A fourstory warehouse and factory building in the district was secured, and \$15,000 spent to convert it into suitable club quarters. There have been provided a gymnasium, an auditorium, bexing ring, physical examination department, junior and senior game rooms, class rooms for vocational training and a reading room. The News Bulletin, in the following very striking paragraph, tells why so many prominent citizens of Detroit have interested themselves

"A study of the records of the Juvenile Court showed that one out of every eight boys between the ages of 17 and 19 was arrested last year, that juvenile arrests had been increasing at the rate of 20 per cent. each year, that the seriousness of the offenses among the older boys had increased, grand larceny having tripled in two years, carrying concealed weapons and robbery had doubled, assault and battery almost trebled and that in eight years AUSTRALIAN fresh or chilled beef in Canada the number of cases coming before the court was equal to the entire boy population of the city." COMPROMISE

Committee Working Hard on Claims Made gy Hertzog



We continue to look for higher prices in the Northwestern rails and the best oils.



Thomas Robb, Shipping Chief, Passes Away at Montreal

MONTREAL, Nov. 8—Thomas Robb, general manager and sec-retary of the Shipping Federation of Canada for the past 23 years, died here tonight at the age of 63

years.

Internal trouble from which he had been suffering for the past few months closed his colorful career. Two weeks ago he was removed to the Royal Victoria Hospital, where he rallied, and a week ago returned to his home. On Saturday he suffered a relapse and was again taken to the hospital. An operation was performed, after which he slowly lost strength and succumbed.

LIFE ROMANTIC Mr. Robb's life was romantic in the extreme. He had adventured all over the seven seas and had withstood many hardships.

He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1863, the son of Thomas R. Robb, superintendent of police. He was educated at the Glasgow Academy and went to sea as a boy of 14. He shipped as a deck boy on a three-masted windjammer, bound for Africa, and this was the beginning of a career that brought bound for Africa, and this was the beginning of a career that brought him through "sail to steam." Thoroughly adventurous, how-ever, he did not confine his active

soul to the monotony of sailing ships, but spent many years on land in the far corners of the earth. The South African veldt, the bush of Australia and New Zealand and the ports of the Orient were all familiar to him. AIDS TO NAVIGATION

Twenty-three years ago he became general manager of the Shipping Federation of Canada and was virtual organizer of that association. Since then he has been head and the heart of that body. During his long term of office, Major Robb was instrumental in securing many improvements in aids to Canadian particular.

improvements in aids to Canadian navigation.

During the war Mr. Robb proved of invaluable service to the Canadian government, his work being recognized in his apartment as hon major in the militia. Last August the King of Jugo-Slavia paid a tribute to his services rendered that country by granting him a knighthood.

Major Robb was chosen as representative of Canadian ship owners to the joint Maritime Commission of the League of Nations at Geneva and he recently attended the sessions of the International Labor Bureau.
