Grass in Man's Face

Gloucester (Eng.), July 17—An amazing case has been treated at Gloucestershire Royal Infirmary. A farm laborer got something in his eye and was unable to remove it. He visited the hospital.

The ephthalmic surgeon, on making an incision above the eye, discovered a green blade of grass an inch and a half long, lying between the tissues. It had sprung from a hayseed, which apparently had become lodged in the corner of the eye socket. The discharge from the tear duct had watered it, and the blade of grass growing from it had received sufficient light through the eyeball to make it green.

The operation was quite successful and the man's eye saved.

## GREAT ROBBERY BAFFLES SLEUTHS

Gem Theft in London Mansion Presents Study in Crime.

London, July 17—The audacious robbery of part of Lady Ludlow's \$5,000,000 art treasure collection from Bath House, Piccadilly, still battles the best brains of Scotland Yard. The crime presents problems on every side; it bristles with difficulties for the police, for the thief or thieves went about their task with an astonishing degree of apparent negligence, but have, nevertheless, contrived to leave very few and scanty clues upon which Divisional-Detective-Inspector Vanner and his men can work.

Lady Ludlow was formerly the wife of the late Sir Julius Werner, multimillionaire and diamond king, and it was his famous collection of historic jewels, consisting of glittering ornaments worn by queens and princesses of the 16th century, that was rifled.

Every article in this wonderful collection, which was without an equal in the world, was priceless from its historic value alone.

In estimating the hard cash value of the stolen jewels at \$1,250,000, the experts are merely considering the face value of hundreds of objects of art and rare gems which are irreplaceable.

The case, from the detectives' point of view, is full of difficulties. The usual "trade mark" with which notable cracksmen seal their handiwork is absent. There is no characteristic jimmy work on the cabinets of the Red Room, which housed the collection, no characteristic forcible entry—all windows and doors of the great Georgian mansion are intact—and there are no finger-prints sufficiently clear to make identiheation by that means possible.

The two theories upon which the police have to work are that, either this is the work of an amateur in trime, or that it is the carefully planned scheme of international crooks. But each theory seems to totter when examined. There are amazing contradictions, baffling in their complexity. No great robbery of recent years has prevented so many difficulties.
