"The General Education Board has just appropriated \$50,000 to continue and complete the investigation of classical education in American secondary schools. This is in addition to the \$60,000 previously appropriated, making a total of \$110,000. The investigation is being conducted by the American Classical League and will be completed by Jan. 1, 1924.

"About 125,000 pupils in about 750 schools, distributed through every state in the United States, are being tested for a period of two years. Many special studies and controlled experiments are under way. The United States Bureau of Education, the College Entrance Examination Board, the Department of Education for the State of New York, together with other educational bodies

together with other educational bodies and seventeen leading professors of education or psychology, are also cooperating in the work. About 7,000 teachers of the classiss, English, French and history have given their services without compensation to help in conducting the investigation. 



THE ELECTRIC LIGHTING SYSTEM AS AN ANTENNA. Amateurs who have no available space in which to erect an outdoor antenna of the usual size and height have long made use of bell circuits, gas pipes, metal roofs, water pipes and other devices as substatutes for outside aerials for receiving purposes. A difference in potential exists between any two of these adjuncts to every house in which a wireless wave induces a certain voltage and with one serving as an aerial and the other as the ground it is possible to pick up radio signals for nearby stations on a crystal detector and from more distant stations by employing vacuum tubes as ampli-

ernment



Direct current lighting circuits which are run in the standard iron conduit.

Direct current lighting circuits generally work better for receiving purposes than alternating current circuits due to the absence of the low frequency hum always found in A. C. circuits. Even on D. C. circuits, electric motors of elevators on the same line in the near vicinity of the receiving set cause a certain amount of interference. Static disturbances, however, are generally not so troublesome when using the lighting circuits as an antenna, although in some cases the disturbances caused by other electric devices on the line are more objectionable than static and may render the radio signals unreadable.

Great care should be exercised in making the connection to the lighting circuit to avoid short circuiting the series condenser. A direct short on the line will result which in addition to blowing the fuses in the light circuit may burn out the primary winding on the receiving set. Condensers constructed of paper and tinfoil should never be employed since the voltage required to break down the insulation is not much greater than the voltage of the line and a fire may result if the condensers should break down. Good condensers in the form of a plug attachment to screw into any light socket may be purchased, but only approved devices should be used.

LANDLORDS FACE JAIL AND FINE

Health Dept. Will Prosecute if 68 Degrees is Not Furnished-Coal No Excuse

New York, Oct. 21—Landlords who fail to provide sixty-eight degrees of heat in apartments when the outside temperature falls below fifty degrees will be held strictly to account by the Health Department, according to statement last night by Acting Healt Commissioner Frank J. Monaghan. Violation of this provision in the Sanitary Code is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine or imprisonment or both.

"The Health Department will only be lenient if it is convinced that efforthave been made in good faith to get supply of coal and that it has been impossible for the landlord to obtain the coal," said Dr. Monaghan. "But we do not think that efforts of landlord to get coal will be fruitless. We are co-operating with the Fuel Administration and we shall expect the landlord to do their duty."

Dr. Monaghan said that complaint from tenants against landlords failing to supply sufficient heat would be acted upon promptly by the Health Deparment.



IN ORDINARY HOUSE FURNACES

1. No change is necessary in furnace. Build the fire in the usual way.

3. To get the best results in applying coal to the fire use a little less than the case of Anthracite and apply coal oftener.

5. When refiring, first take a bar or poker and break up the crust of coal that forms on the top of a Bituminous coal fire, then apply fresh coal, following the rule already given for leaving drafts open. A handful or two of coarse salt scattered evenly over top of Bituminous coal freshly applied to fire will prevent formation of tar and other substances adhering to sides of furnace, it will form a gas thereby intensifying the heat and eliminating smoke.

When making the last fire at night shake out the fine ash that will be clogging the openings in the grate. Your grates will last far longer if kept clean.

8. In the morning, before opening the furnace door, the chimney and bottom drafts should be first opened. 9. With Bituminous Coal more soot is formed in stovepipes, flues and chimneys than in case of Anthracite; and furnaces, furnace pipes and chimneys should be cleaned frequently. Hot water furnaces should be cleaned every day or so, and the furnace pipes every two or three weeks. Soot will not accumulate as quickly if a small quantity of sinc elippings are occasionally thrown into the fire.

10. A mixture of big lumps of Bituminous coal with about an equal quantity of Anthracite pea coal, or with coke, will simplify the problem. 11. Welsh Anthracite and Welsh Dry Coal and "Briquettes" should be fired in practically the same manner as Pennsylvania Anthracite. 4. After the coal has been burning for about ten minutes or long enough for the smoke and gases to have been expelled, close up all the drafts except the chimney draft, which should be left partially open.

6. Bituminous coal will probably be in varying sizes and contain some slack. The lumps should be burned in the day time and the fire banked with smaller coal and slack at night, leaving a small opening at the top to let the air through.


ALLEGED VICTIM OF A \$300,000 ROBBERY HELD

Sees at Big Schenectady Plant Electrical Marvels That Grew from His Inventions - First Visit in 25 Years.

Schenectady, N. Y., Oct. 21—Thomas
A. Edison, who has dealt in marvels
all his life, was amazed at some of the
things he saw in the General Electric
Company laboratorles on his first visit
here in twenty-five years.

He saw a mercury boiler so much
more efficient than steam that when it
is perfected it will mean a saving of
one-third in coal used to produce power. He saw a machine for registering
the voice by light on a moving picture
film that has unlimited possibilities of
development—including talking-movies.
And he saw vacuum tubes that have
in them the germ of greater things
than the world has yet known in electrical science.

The day was in all ways a tribute to
Edison, for although the application of
electron energy, as demonstrated to
him, is the beginning of a new science,
the future of which is so vast that
phycists dare not predict what may
be found in it, they traced it all to his
invention forty-three years ago of the
incadescent bulb, the study of which
has produced the vacuum tubes which
has E. W. Rice, Jr., an officer of the

electricity." So they called him "Master" and showed him things of which

Steinmetz juggled his lightning bolts for him, splintered wood and dissipated metal in a flash of fire until Edison's eyes sparkled; Langmuir showed him tubes that Edison thought might mean much in long-distance transmission of power until "yon can't tell where it will end," and he held a 100,000 candle power incandescent lamp which made his own first bulb seem like the glow of a firefly, a bulb which he did not believe could have been built. It was a great day for Edison and a great day for the physicists of the company, for it marked the achievements of forty years.

Hamburg, Oct. 2—(A. P. by Mail)—
Two húndred and eighty million marks
are required to help the poor of Hamburg city and state through the winter,
according to an estimate of the public

This sum would include the following provisions:—100,000,000 for general
welfare activities, 20,000,000 for war

needy, 10,000,000 for clothing and shoes,

of fordstuffs, 30,000,000 for the establishment and conduct of school-children's feeding, and 5,000 000 for aiding

The likely sources of these funds





Washington, Oct. 21—The average level of wholesale prices in September, the Department of Labor reported today, was about 11-3 per cent. lower than in August. The index number, representing comparative price levels of 404 different commodities, dropped from 155, as determined in August, to 153 in September.
