

CHARTERS What London Times Thinks

London, Aug. 27.—The London Times says that it prefers to take, on the whole, an optimistic view of the German-American peacetreaty, but it does not believe "the Allies will be contented to continue to do the drudgery of execution of peace while the United States stands at a convenient distance to reap the share of benefits that may emerge."

The newspaper welcomes the treaty, however, as the first definite indication for renewal of active U. S. interest in European affairs, and assumes from the U. S. acceptance of the provisions on guarantees that she will continue to participate in the occupation of the Rhine. Failure of the U. S. to ratify the defensive convention of the U. S. Great Britain and France is considered by the newspaper to have been one of the chief causes of friction which, it says, impeded developments of the Entente and the maintenance of peace in Europe ever since the war.

REMARKABLE WORK DONE BY SURGEON

Extremely Delicate Operation Restored to Health a Man distress: Given Up for Dead.

New York, Aug. 27.—By a seeming miracle of surgery John H. Reid, who was virtually given up for dead after he had been riddled by bullets fired by Don Collins, wire-tapper, last May, has been restored to health. This, it was learned, has been accomplished through a series of extremely delicate operations performed by Dr. Alexander Nicoll, chief of the surgical staff of Fordham Hospital.

Those limitations are as necessary as the very principle itself to the structure of every free nation; to deny them would involve the dissolution of all democratic states. It was on these elementary grounds that we called attention to the governing force of the geographical propinquity of these to suggest that the principle of govern-

the geographical propinquity of these two islands and their long and historic association, despite the great difference of character of the races.

Historic Interdependence. "We do not believe a permanent re-conciliation between Great Britain and Ireland can ever be attained without recognition of their physical and his-torical interdependence which

"I cannot better express British standpoint in this respect than in the words used of the northern and southern states by Abraham Lincoln in his first inaugural address. They were spoken by him on the brink of the American Civil War, which he was striving to avert.

"Physically speaking," he said, "we cannot separate. We cannot remove our respective sections from each other now and build an impassable wall between them. It is impossible then to make that intercourse more advantageous or more satisfactory after separation than before. Suppose you go to war, you cannot fight always; and when after much loss on both sides and no gain for either you cease fighting, the identical old questions as to terms of intercourse again are upon you."



Announcement of Toronto

Street Car Fares Leads to Protest.

Toronto, Aug. 27.—Official announcement is made by the Toronto Transportation Commission of the fares which they intend to charge in the combined Toronto street railway and the existing fix a fare adequate to cover all costs.

# Production figures of pig iron in Great Britain for July are now available. # MORE MILLIONS IN MUNICIPAL

Toronto About to Take Over Entire Street Car Service-Some Results.

Toronto, Aug. 27. — (By Canadian Press.)—Undeterred by the report of a special commission declaring the general Ontario provincial hydro-radial programme economically unsound, the city of Toronto on September 1 will dip into public ownership to the extent of another ten million dollars or so. The entire street car service, now in the hands of the Toronto Railway Company, will on that date pass over to civic ownership.

When the city has taken possession of the local Mackenzie light and power plant and the York radials under the so-called clean-up deal and purchased the street railway, which is expects to take over on September 1, it will have well on to eighty millions of dollars invested in public utilities.
