HOPE GREAT STRIKE WILL BE AVERTED

Coal Miners and Employers Of Britain Do Not Want Trouble

SEEKING A SOLUTION

Men's Delegates in Conference Give Formal Notice of Strike, But it Cannot Be Effective Be-fore March

(Canadian Press) Birmingham, Eng., Jan. 19—The confeence of delegates of the miners' federation has decided to give forthwith notice of has decided to give forthwith notice of a national stoppage of work at the coal mines in Great Britain. The end of February, however, is the first date on which the notices can become affective.

The conference decided to accompany the notice that the men were going to quit work with an intimation to the employers that the men are ready to continue negotiations for a settlement. The conference has adjourned until February 1.






