DEATH LIST MOUNTS. So terrific was the force of the storm that bodies were reported carried a mile, while timbers from the wrecked town of Desoto, Ills., were found in Duquione, 15 miles away.

The greatest loss of life, according to available reports, occurred in Southern Illinois, where more than 500 were reported killed as the tornado tore northeastward through Murphysboro, West Frankfort, Desoto and other large towns of the area.

SCHOOL RAZED. At Desoto, a school house was razed, only three of the 250 occupants reported escaping without injuries, while 88 bodies had been taken from the

ruins last night.

Starting from Annapolis, the storm moved northeast and after striking two other towns on the Missouri side of the Mississippi River, jumped into Illinois, traversed that state, divided near the Indiana state line, and spent its force in Southern Indiana and Northern Westwell.

"The other is myself, who as leader of this government supported Mr. McKenna and made an offer to the Saint in the past of the expense of any commission which might be appointed to travel through Canada and bring about a better exchange of commodities between the provinces.
