What may be called the frontal attacks of the Germans upon the ridge system back of Messines, Wytschaete and Hollebeke furnish the spectacular feature of the operations as reflected in today's news,

One brief paragraph in Field Marshal Haig's report, however, has an im-rance attached to it that should not be overlooked. It records the repulse heavy German attacks southwest of Vieux Berquin.

The German line here runs along the easterly border of Nieppe Wood, and it is by a push to the northwest in this region that the enemy hopes to reach Hazebrouck, some thirty-five miles distant, and take this highly important rail-way station. 
Secretary's Resignation.

Toronto, April 15—A bombshell has been thrown into the ranks of the Great War Veterans Association, throughout the dominion, by the resignation of N. F. R. Knight, who has been secretary of the dominion organization since the first convention last year. In a letter written to the various branches, Mr. Knight states that in taking this step he has done so with much pain and re-gret.
