SOLD LIKE SLAVES. Put in Stripes, Worked Under Guard and Are Then Sold Again as a Chat-

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Jan. 15.—Samuel W. Tyson, a prominent lumber mill owner, of Coffee county, who pleaded guilty to three cases of peonage in the United States court, is charged with taking negroes and selling them when-ever he wished. Tyson was fined \$1,000, but paid \$150, and the judge suspended the unpaid balance.
