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

Halifax, Sept. 24.—J. Christmas of Cape Breton, Joseph Devlin, of Dalhousie, N. B., and John Joe, the three members of the crew of nineteen of the waterlogged full rigged ship Harvest Queen, which was abandoned at sea on August 31st, and set on fire were brought in port yesterday on the Alian liner Siberian from Liverpool. The ship Harvest Queen was owned and captained by E. A. Forsyth of Windsor, N. S.

The Harvest Queen was twenty years old and was considered perfectly seaworthy. She left Dalhousie, N. B., laden with lumber August 12th, bound to Buenos Ayres, On Monday 24th the ship began to leak badly and the crew were at once set to work the pumps, but so fast did the water pour in that the pumps were of little avail. Besides having her hold packed with lumber she had a quaintity on her decks which made the work of keeping the ship afloat all the more difficult.

Finally, Captain Forsyth decided to have the heavy deck load thrown overboard, which was done. From August 24 until 11 inst, the ship floated helplessly on the Atlantic During the last few days that she floated about the water began to force the hatches of the decks open. The pumps were also out of commission, and the only hopes the Captain and crew had of saving their lives was to attract some steamer.

THE PRINTING BUREAU INVESTIGATION.

Some months have elapsed since the first rumors of irregularities in the government Printing Bureau at Ottawa reached the ear of the public and, as yet, there has been no authoritative statement as to the amount of the defaications or the names of those implicated. The extent of the public knowledge is limited to the fact that some more officials have been asked to retire from the public service. Under these circumstances it is not unnatural that the printers and publishers of Canada are raising a protest at the delay. Indefinite charges of graft have been made which reflect upon the business integrity of firms engaged in the printing and publishing trades, and the matter has been allowed to rest there. In its last issue, the Printer and Publisher says editorially:—"The printers and publishers of Canada have a peculiar and vital interest in the investigation at the government Printing Bureau at Ottawa, and are anxiously awaiting an announcement from the government of the names of the manufacturers or supply houses who are implicated in the scandal, together with full particulars in connection therewith. Dr. Chotzer read a paper suggesting that it was possible for the school, in many indirect ways, to be of material assistance in this matter; and among older children he advocated the giving of direct instruction—with the consent of the parent. He also urged that these subjects should be made part of the course for teachers in the training colleges and universities.

Some novel suggestions emanated from Dr. Chaillou, of Paris, who dwelt upon the need for a stimulating dietary for the child, in view of the exhausting character of latter-day curricula. Dr. Chaillou contended that "children of 16 to 18 years should get up between five and seven and go to bed at half-past eight." Meat, he said, should be given at early breakfast and midday, but not at dinner in the evening. At breakfast black coffee might be taken, but not cafe au lait or chocolate. He regarded milk as poison! For dinner he advocated light Bordeaux, which he considered "an excellent beverage for school children, who required something stimulating." The criticism of Dr. Chaillou's arguments, according to the report, must have been somewhat brisk. His contention that Bordeaux must be good for French children drew a suggestion from one of the delegates that Dr. Leslie Mackenzie should stand up for providing the Scotch children with whisky on the like grounds—"an invitation which," we read, "Dr. Mackenzie refused."

Gaiety in the schoolroom found an earnest advocate in Prof. Schuyten, of Antwerp. The child must laugh, he says:—"He has a natural instinct for laughing. If he cannot laugh he is ill or morally wrong; in either case a prompt cure must be found. Hence it follows that gaiety must be promoted under all circumstances; when absent it must be stimulated. Judictously cared for laughter is never a source of inattention or of worry; we have rather to fear the inverse. Childish galety may be regarded as the natural and indispensable stimu-

ing of infant rearing to mistresses and children." Mr. Broadbent, who is entitled to speak with some authority on infant life, dwelt on the appalling ignorance of many present-day mothers, the necessity for giving instruction on infant management to every elder school girl, and the fallacy of the opinion that such instruction robbed girls "of the bloom and freshness of innocence." The first principle of education is to build up intelligence upon instinct. To a large extent we do so with boys, but with girls the very strongest of natural instincts is ignored and as far as possible suppressed. The girl's unconscious love of babyhood was described by Mr. Broadbent as educationally "a mine of ungotten gold which should be made the utmost use of ungotten gold which should be made the utmost use of." There is, he said, splendid material in this motherly instinct of girls, "and whatever has been the

The individual printer of the United States is interested with his Canadian confrere in the identity of the firms who are willing to stoop to fraud, and possibly to bribery, in the sale of their product.

"Commenting editorially upon a statement in our July issue that United States concerns were implicated in the disclosures, the Inland Printer, one of the leading United States trade journals, says, in part:—

"If this be true, humiliation should burn into the soul of every honest American citizen. It were enough to shoulder the rottenness unearthed within our own borders, but to be accused of extending the graft market into the dominions of our neighbor is, or should be, the last straw.

"It is to be hoped that our Canadian colleague is mistaken, and that a further investigation will clear our skirts of any connection with the corruption of the Printing Bureau at Ottawa. But, be that as it may, printers should be the first in the fight to purge the nation of its corrupting influences! Every vestige of party prejudice should be swept aside in the interest of honest men and honest measures, and a supreme effort put forth, not only in the defence of the printing industry, but of every other business, and of our country."

We are entitled, as Canadian printers and publishers, to the knowledge that will enable us to show through our individual purchasing departments our opinion of the manufacturer or dealer who becomes an active party in the contemptible practices that have been the source of this humiliation."

The Printer and Publisher gives a fair and impartial statement of the case. The government is doing a gross injustice to firms engaged in these trades by allowing a cloud of suspicion to rest upon them indefinitely. The existence of irregularities in the Printing Bureau was first reported as long ago as last June. If the investigation has been thorough there is no excuse now why those immediately concerned and the public in general should not be made acquainted with the results.

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


