



CANADIAN PENSIONS.

An important amendment to the pension legislation becomes effective in Canada on September first. The various orders in-council under which persions have been paid in the past are now consolidated in the Pensions Act, which was put through at the last perliamentary session and becomes applicable on Monday next. This legislation, in addition to providing for the present payments to disabled soldiers and their dependents and for the families of those who have been killed, contains a most important provision for a bonus, covering one year only, to all ranks from company sergeant-majors down, and to dependents for swho have given their lives. Under this clause a twenty per cent. increase intended to offset the present high cost of living, is allowed for privates, and approximately a thirteen per cent. increase for those who held the rank of sergeant. Thus to the total disability pension of six hundred dollars per year for a private there will be added one hundred and kwenty dollars payable for one year only. 

STOCKS RECOVER UNDER FAVORABLE LABOR REPORTS

Moderate Reactions Set in Towards the End of Trading Hour, But Tone of Market Continued Strong.

New York, Aug. 28.—Speculative interests seemed to derive much satisfaction today from the more pacific attitude of organized labor in connection with the railroads and steel industries, and stocks were bid up briskly at the outset. Moderate reactions set in towards the end, the reversals being coincident with the reply of labor men to Judge Gary's letter, but the tone of the market confinued strong.

Trading was not very large, judged by standards of the midsummer, but the session was marked by a series of spectacular movements in which the aggressive short interest found it expedient to cover extensively.

Crucible Steel was the spectacular for jumping almost twelve points in the first hour, soon losing much of its advance, and coming forward again later at a net gain of seven points.

American woollen, Baldwin Locomotive, General Motor, Hide and Leather preferred, American Car and several of the representative Oil issues, were included among the distinctive features at gross gains of four to almost seven points.

Other speculative shares were two to four points higher at their best. Rails and shippings gave a better accompanied by what seemed to be substantial accumulations. United States Steel was more steady than at any period since the labor outlook assumed its serious aspects but forfeited a large fraction of its gain in the final dealings. Total sales amounted to 750,000 shares.




