Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

#### VICTORIA DAY

On our national and patriotic holidays there is perhaps none as popular as 'Victoria Day,' which as yet we can hardly get out of the way of calling by its old familiar name, 'Queen's Birthday.' As long as many of us remember it has been our great spring festival. Canada is as truly 'Our Lady of the Snows,' and after enjoying our long and glorious winter to the full we are nevertheless glad to escape from the city or town where we have huddled together during the cold to spend a few hours under the blue sky, in the fields among the trees, on mountain side or on lake and river.

Victoria Day is the first opportunity we have of doing this in any general way, and the unanimity with which we avail ourselves of the privilege speaks volumes for the wisdom of our legislators in adopting the oft-repeated suggestion—that the day should be established as a perpetual observance. In the midst of our enjoyment of our picnic or what-not it may not be out of place to call to memory the primary meaning of the celebration. The reign of Victoria the Good has passed into history, but her memory will ever continue a benediction to the great empire over which she ruled. Never was there a sovereign who more truly became a servant of the people or who sought more assiduously their social and political welfare, and never was a sovereign better repaid in love, in reverence, in chivalrous devotion. Again, there was never a sovereign who set a more beautiful example of home life or who believed more thoroughly that rank or riches or long descent were as nothing compared with obedience to the moral law, with the claims of duty to God and man. And it was this simple view of life which more than once was the salvation of England and of the Empire. When Victoria came to the throne Great Britain was seething with Republicanism. Canada, to an appreciable degree, was in revolt, and it seemed as if there were only a few years before the whole Imperial system should disintegrate like a rope of sand, yet, under the guidance of this plain woman, and of the statesmen who were wise enough to associate with her, the Empire became as solid as a granite cliff against which the storms of war and revolution could not back in scattered and drifting foam.

King Edward, with rare modesty,

desired that his birthday celebration should be merged in the Victoria Day observance. Very worthily he has reigned, and with wonderful success has he sought the promotion and preservation of the world's peace.

THERE IS NO RAINY SEASON

General Ashton, of Toronto, who accompanied Morton Freeman to Prince Rupert, is a firm believer in the future of the town. The present is his best ally here, and he predicts that with the sale of lots, there will be an influx of people who mean business, and who will stay by the proposition. ### NO CLUE TO THE EXPRESS ROBBERY

Nova Scotia Police at a Loss to Account For Disappearance of Robbers.

#### CLERK SUSPECTED.

TRURO, May 23.—So far, no clue has been obtained of the robbery in the Canadian Express Office, and no arrests have been made. The detectives have not made all the enquiries about the train, as they have pretty well satisfied themselves that the men who were seen going toward the Park had nothing whatever to do with the robbery. In fact the officers knew some of the men upon whom suspicion rested, and they are sure that they had no hand in the affair.

They interviewed the man who was sitting in the step next to the Express Office, and he is positive that no person came out of the office. This man had not been drinking and he was not asleep. He was perfectly able to tell what occurred in the vicinity at the time. It is stated that the Express Clerk Burgess has consulted a solicitor and that the latter-mentioned Detective Hannahan not to question him or connect with him about the robbery, of course the Detective paid little attention to the neighborhood. Burgess declined to say anything on the advice of counsel.
