## SPECIAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Held on Monday Afternoon to Consider Purchase of Fire Horse

A special meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday afternoon, for the purpose of discussing the purchase of a horse for the Fire Department. His Worship Mayor Andrew presided and there was also present Councillors Alexander, Patterson, Goss, Quinn, Ellsworth and Miller.

An informal discussion took place on the matter of purchasing a new horse for the fire team, one horse of the matched pair purchased some time ago having gone lame. An opportunity had been given the Council to purchase a grey mare from J. C. Wallace, a horse dealer from Ontario, the price being \$265. A committee was appointed to confer with the dealer and the price was arranged at \$255, which figure was paid for the animal.

Several offers had been received for the discarded grey, but Councillor Patterson put in a strong plea to keep him as he would be required very soon for street work and thought by working him easy in the town carts, the horse would come round all right.

It was arranged however to advertise for tenders for the horse, the highest or any tender not necessarily to be accepted. This being all the business, Council adjourned.

## FIRE IN LUMBER YARD ON MONDAY EVENING

Campbellton Fire Brigade Called to Outbreak at Salmon Lake, P. Q.

On Monday evening fire broke out in the lumber yard of Messrs. Price Brothers, Salmon Lake, P. Q., and a big conflagration was threatened. As the authorities there are putting in a water system, a call was sent to Campbellton about 10:30 for help, and an order to the brigade to turn out was made by Chief O'Donnell. The engine and about 1800 feet of hose was loaded on a flat car and in little over an hour 22 men with the chief were hurrying to the fire.

On arriving at the destination the firemen found that the outbreak was well under control and after getting the engine in position directed two streams on the burning area and in about a couple of hours had the fire dead and all out.

No reason can be assigned for the outbreak which started at the extreme south end of the yard far removed from the mill, and it is thought was caused by some one smoking in the yard, and a lighted match or pipe spark dropped among the dry lumber. The yard is situated to the south of the track, the lumber being closely piled over a large area, and is mostly dry spruce and pine, the fire starting in the dry lumber of the 1913 cut. Over 1400 feet of hose was laid out from the engine, which was pumping from the lake on the north side of the track close to the mill.

Before the arrival of the Campbellton brigade the mill hands had kept the blaze in its original place by tearing down the piles surrounding the fire, leaving a twenty five foot space, having a small two inch hose as well as a bucket brigade fighting the flames. The night was calm with no wind, but for their own safety the company desired help, for had there been any wind from the south the whole yard in which there is piled about ten million feet would have been swept away and the lumber endangered. As it was, there was only between 120,000 and 150,000 feet of lumber destroyed, representing a probable loss of \$2000, which is covered by insurance.

The firemen returned on the Limited on Tuesday morning and the report is later in the day.

## REPORTED APPOINTMENT HAS BEEN MADE

W. R. Fitzmaurice New Superintendent at Campbellton.—S. B. Wass Next Assistant

It is reported that the late Evan Price of Campbellton, will be succeeded as superintendent of the Moncton-Campbellton Division of the Intercolonial Railway by Mr. W. R. Fitzmaurice of Newcastle, who had been assistant to the deceased superintendent for some years. Mr. S. B. Wass of this city, assistant superintendent in charge of the St. John & Quebec Railway under I.R.C. operation, is mentioned as successor to Mr. Fitzmaurice.

Since the beginning of the illness of the former superintendent, Mr. Fitzmaurice has performed the superintendent's duties, assisted by Mr. Wass. The latter, when asked by a reporter of The Mail if any appointments had yet been made, stated there had not, although there were numerous rumors.

Mr. Wass has been a resident of Fredericton since the construction of the St. John & Quebec Railway began in 1912. He was assistant engineer in charge of construction and later chief engineer. When the Intercolonial began operation of the line he was appointed assistant superintendent.

## PAST WEEK GOOD IN RECRUITING WORK

Eighteen Recruits Signed on for 64th Battalion and Also for the Heavy Battery

When the tale comes to be written of the great war, one town will stand out prominently as having done its share well and that will be the little town of Campbellton. We do not strive to stand on the same plane as other larger towns in New Brunswick, yet by virtue of what we have done and all doing we are away ahead of towns which claim a population far above what we have.

During the past week Recruiting Officer McDonald enlisted eighteen young men for both the 64th Battalion and for the Heavy Overseas Battery, which makes his total since the 15th of August 99 recruits. At that time over 400 had been sent from this district, so that we have now the large total of over 500 men enlisted from here for overseas service. This is a record indeed of which any town may be proud, and we have not yet finished.

## START MADE ON NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Solid Brick Structure to be Erected on Property Next the Court House. Modern Plan

The Presbyterian congregation has made a start on their new church building on St. Patrick St., and the foundation will likely be completed some time this week. The new building is to be of solid brick construction on a concrete foundation, and when completed will be one of the finest church homes in the Province. Its dimensions are 80 by 57 feet, and the main auditorium will have a seating capacity of about 450. Besides the auditorium, the main floor will contain rooms for the pastor and the choir, while the basement will have a large school room, parlor, library, kitchen and class rooms. Everything is to be finished in the most approved style, and the new building will be a great addition to the architectural beauty of the town.

It is not expected that any more than the foundation will be completed this year, as the season is now too far advanced to start the brick work. All material will be placed on the ground, however, ready for an early start in the spring.

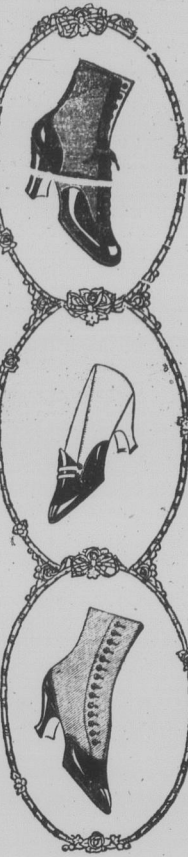

Miss Jennie McLean has gone to Newcastle where she will remain for some time.

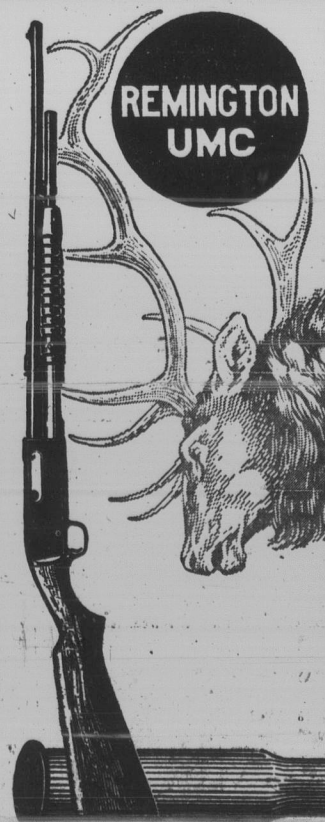
