

they were to receive compensation for it, he would not have found out that clause, and would not have known that it was the purpose of the Government to build an argument upon it, but although it was so, it was not in this way, yet, the noble earl would not make the slightest notice of the fact (Hear, hear). There was another class of persons entitled compensation, under the act, to whom there could be no difficulty in identifying. 104 persons were outlawed for treason. They had for it, and their names were placed upon record. Where would have been the difficulty of excepting them from the benefit of the operation of the act? (Hear, hear). — Were their Lordships prepared to sanction such a measure as this? Unless Canada was to be deemed an independent state, their Lordships were bound to interfere to prevent the adoption of a measure which was dangerous to the empire and inconsistent with the respect due to the British Crown. (Cheers.) In the discussion which had taken place, the noble earl had raised a question, and he said that the Government could give instructions to the commissioners. The commissioners could exercise no discretion whatever. They would have to perform the duty prescribed by the act of Parliament, which was to inquire into the claims submitted to them, and when substantiated to allow them. The claims once allowed, there was no appeal against the decision of the commissioners. — It was said in a place to which he would not make more particular allusion, that the Governor General might give instructions to the commissioners for the regulation of their conduct. Never was there so silly a misapprehension. (Cheers and laughter.) A commission issued by the Crown would be under the control of the Crown. In that case, the Crown might issue instructions to guide the conduct of its commissioners, but when a commission was issued, it was not an act of Parliament, which prescribed it, but the enforcement of a particular duty, no one had power to interfere with it. (Cheers.) It had been said, and he had read it in print, that it was not the intention of the promoters of the act that rebels should be included in its beneficial operation, and it was added that Mr. B. Melvin, the Attorney General, had made a declaration to that effect. The intention of an act could only be found in its legal construction. If it were intended that no rebels should participate in the benefit of the act, why was it not so declared in the act itself? (Cheers.) Not intended that rebels should participate in its benefit. It was passed primarily with that view. (Cheers renewed.) Mr. Lafontaine was pressed over and over again to state precisely what was intended; but no satisfactory answer could be obtained from him. What could more conclusive be the intention of the supporters of the act than the reception given to Mr. Wilson's amendment? If it were intended that rebels should not be compensated, why was not that expressly declared by the adoption of the amendment, or if there existed any objection to the particular form of the amendment, why was not its substance introduced into the measure in another shape? (Cheers.) The noble earl asked how it would be possible to ascertain whether persons had been engaged in a rebellion which occurred ten years ago; but he (Lord Lyndhurst) had pointed out whole classes of rebels who could be identified without any difficulty. The commissioners were appointed to inquire into claims. — Why could they not inquire into the character and conduct of individuals? Cries of "Hear, hear," from the Ministerial benches, answered by cheers from the Opposition.) The noble lords and "hear," but there would be no long divisions even in examining parties. The noble earl said that the Government had been granted protection from all the consequences which would otherwise have attached to their conduct. The commissioners could extirpate upon oath, and if not perfectly satisfied that a case of participation in the rebellion was made out with clearness of demonstration, they would decide in favour of the claimants. In all cases where doubt existed the benefit of the doubt would be given to the claimants, in accordance with the recognized principle of law. (Hear, hear.) The preamble of the act contained the words "just losses," and it had been argued that those words necessarily excluded all rebels, because it was impossible that persons engaged in rebellion could sustain just losses. — The bill, as originally introduced, did not contain the proviso which excepted the convicted and confessed rebels, and if the words "just losses" were to be taken in their interpretation which had been placed upon them, why was the proviso introduced at a subsequent stage of the measure? When the proviso was proposed it would have been a sufficient answer to have said that all rebels being excluded by the words "just losses," *ad fortiori* those referred to in the proviso must be excluded. (Hear, hear.) The noble earl had referred to a former act brought in by the Conservative party in Canada; but because one act had passed unnoticed, that a reason why another should not be rejected when it was brought under the notice of the imperial Legislature? The noble earl said that both the acts must receive the same construction. It was necessary to look how the acts were to be applied, for though drawn up in precisely the same words it was possible that they might be diametrically opposed to each other in operation. — In Upper Canada the population was loyal, almost to a man. When the act was framed, it was not probable that any considerable number of rebels would claim compensation under it. It was only at Toronto and another place that any rebels showed themselves, and they could not have sustained any loss, because they ran away. (A laugh.) Loss was notoriously confined to the loyal. What necessity, then, for making any exceptions in the act? No exceptions were introduced because there was nobody to except. The

MORE PARIA-STRIFE AND FLOOD-SHED

To-day there witness to another of the terrible scenes of blood which have cast so fearful a shadow over the recent history of the City in later years. It has been known for some time back, that the Orangemen intended to walk the streets in procession, clothed in their peculiar attire, on this the 12th of July, and accordingly a strong body composed of the various Lodges, as we have learned, belonging to the City and neighborhood assembled at the Hibernian Hotel, and proceeded, headed by a band of music to Indian Town, to meet a body from Frederick and Woodstock, who were passing through York Point, they came into a district with a confluence of people stationed near the junction of Backland Union Streets, when several persons received serious injury, and the Mayor while endeavouring as it is alleged, to prostrate an obstruction that had been placed across the street, was struck a violent blow on the head. The body passed on, however, without any more serious disturbances, upon their return, and while endeavouring the obstruction to be applied to, and which consisted of a number of green boughs a strong rope elevated on poles raised on each side of Dock street, they were assailed with bricks and other missiles when, notwithstanding the presence of a strong military force, commenced a scene of most deadly and large scale carnage, reports that two persons were killed, and a number of others injured. One of the men who held those poles was shot dead on the spot. Several hundreds of shot were fired on both sides, a number of the rioters fell and others were carried away by their friends, some it is said mortally wounded, several of these we saw ourselves in most miserable plight with the blood streaming from gunshot wounds in various parts of their bodies, presenting a frightful and truly melancholy sequel to our alleged exhibition.

Henry Gilbert, Esq. and the Hon. Charles Simmons, attended the sufferers, the latter was shot in several places on the head, while in the act of receiving an Orangeman, who had been struck down and overpowered by some of the opposite party.

Nearly all the ships have been closed in the Market Square, Prince Wm. Street, and King Street. Business is for the greater part suspended, and at the time we write thousands of persons are to be seen standing in front of closed shutters, and listening to the reports of fire-arms.

3 o'clock.—The procession has just broken up, but we fear that we have only witnessed the beginning of the end, but we sincerely hope that this will be the last of such processions, pregnant as the matter ever be, with human misery, and degradation.
