Grandson. An Early Morning Ride in Rotten Row,

And a Stately Drive Through the British Metropolis,

Populace. The Emperor Greeted With a Mighty

imperial visitor to the effect that the lord mayor and corporation desired to offer him a sincere welcome and declaring his visit to the Queen to be a happy augury of the continuance of the friendly and affectionate relations so long existing between the two nations, also welcoming the Empress. The address was presented in a gold casket, richly enameled and decorated with precious atones. The Emperor replied:

"My lord,—Please receive my heartielt thanks for the warm welcome extended to us by the citizens of this ancient and noble metropolis. I beg your lordship to kindly transmit the expression of my feelings to those in whose name you have spoken. I have always felt at home in this lovely country, being the grandson of your Queen, whose name will ever be remembered of a noble character and of a lady great in the wisdom of her councils, and whose reign has conferred lasting blessings upon England. Moreover, the same blood runs in English as in German veins, and following the example of my grandiather and my ever-lamented father, I shall always, so far as in my power, maintain the historical friendship existing between these, our two nations, which, as your lordship has so often mentioned, have so often been side by side in defense of liberty and justice. I feel encouraged in my task when I see these capital men, such as are gathered here to-day, do justice to the earnestness and honesty of my intentions. My aim is above all the maintenance of peace, for peace alone can give the confidence necessary to a healthy development of science, art and trade. Only so long as peace reigns are we at liberty to bestow earnest thoughts upon the great problems the solution of which in fairness and equity I consider the most prominent duty of our time. You may therefore rest assured that I shall continue to do my best to maintain and constantly increase the good relations existing between Germany and other nations. I shall always be found ready to unite with you and them in the common labor for peaceful progress, friendly int







The Versatile German Emperor.

[The Forum.]

William II. is undoubtedly the most remarkable sovereign of the present time. He is a modern man, notwithstanding certain proclivities which still adher to him, like pleces of the shell of an egg from which the bird has issued. With restiess activity he seizes upon all questions which agitate our time, be they large or small. To-day he speaks on great European affairs, opens new issues to German commerce, and proclaims social reform; to-morrow he opens an art exhibition and takes a personal part in the performance of Wildenbruch's patrictic drama, "The New Lord." He presides over his council and shows himself a ready debater, opens a scholastic conference, laying down his educational plans, and indefatigably travels over his country in order to see everything with his own eyes. Much in all this may be attributed to his active temper, but the moving principle is undoubtedly the high conception of his duty as "the first servant of the State." This conception is bound up with a strong consciousness of his eminent position; he feels himself to be the pillar of the State, called to carry out a great mission. As before the dismissal of Bismarck he said that he would crush any one trying to obstruct his path, so he declared in his late speech at Dusseldorf: "Only one is master in this country; I shall suffer no other." It would be unjust to see in such utterances, caused by a high consciousness of his power, absolutist tendencies on the part of the Emperor. He is a constitutional prince and has rigidly respected Parliamentary rights. But in a time when the principle of authority and order is undermined in many ways, the youthful sovereign feels that he is the venter of monarchical discipline, without which the State can neither exist nor progress, and he is resolved to maintain his authority against Social Democrats as well as against interested coalitions of privileged classes and persons.
