London, Oct. 6.—To-day lively scenes were witnessed at Folkestone. The church congress in that city opened this morning with great ecclesiastical pemp. The Archibishop of Canterbury, half a dozen bishops and scores of clergymen of the Established Church came out in their robes and marched in solemn procession through the streets to the various churches. A motley crowd of ultra-evangelical people attached themselves to the end of the procession. They carried a banner bearing a picture of Latimer and Ridley burning at the stake, and above it, in broad, black letters a foot long, the words: "No popery. Withstand idolatry, priesteraft and ritualism." The banner created considerable disorder along the route, and several times was greeted by the crowd with derlave cries. The police ordered the banner-bearers to lower it, but they refused to obey. Four policemen stopped the people behind the banner and tried to selze it. A struggle followed; a several men were thrown down, and the banner was torn in streds and trampled in the street. Two men picked it up, and, despite the police, marched on with it. A crowd followed, hooting and whistling. At the parish church an extra force of police dispersed the crowd.



The Board of Health Consider Press Comments

And Make Inquiries of the Medical Health Officer,

Who Says That Everything Is Looked After Properly—He Denies That Fever Is Contracted in the Schools and Says the General Health Is Good - No Favoritism in Placarding - A Ward Full of Typhoid Fever Patients -Threatened Suit Against the City.

"I called this meeting in consequence of an article in Tuesday's Adventiser," said A'd, John Hemman, chairman of the Board of Health, to the members of that body who had assembled in the City Hall yesterday afternoon in compliance with his request.

Ald. Parnell was asked to read a portion of the newspaper statement in question. In substance it urged the board to adopt some stringent means to compel the proper reporting and plearafting of infectious and contagious diseases in the city, as complaints had been made that some medical men and householders were lax in this respect. It was alleged, continued the article, that children living in houses where the disease existed were permitted to attend both Sanday and public schools. Scarlet fever prevailed more extensively in London than was generally supposed.

"When the papers of this city give forth an expression of public opinion we ought to take cognizance of it," said Ald. Parnell. "Those statements criminate this board, and I do not intend to sit on it unless it does its duty."

Dr. Hutchinson, the medical health officer, was called upon to explain. He said he had seen the accusations in both the ADVERTISER and the Free Press. He had visited the sshools and found that there was not a single case in which children in fever stricken houses were allowed to attend. He had written a letter to each paper in reference to the matter.

Permit me, through the columns of your paper, to contradict a statement made in the rapers a day or two ago that typhoid fever and scarlet fever were prevalent in the city, that the General Hospital had now a large number of these cases, and that the attendance at some of the schools had perceptibly diminished in consequence. As a matter of fact, the city was never more free from infectious diseases than at the present time. There is not a case of scarlet fever in the City Hospital, and only three were admitted since the 1st of April, although this is the season of the year when typhoid fever is generally most prevalent. There were only seven cases taken into the hospital during the month of September. In the city there are now seven cases of scarlet fever and seven of typhoid, both diseases being of comparatively mild types. Careful investigation has shown that none of these cases were contracted in the public schools. The danger of scarlet fover spreading can be reduced to a minimum by isolation—disintection and cleanliness. But so long as well water is used—and the medieval privy pit tolerated in the city—just so long will we have typhoid fever, and kindred filth diseases. The city is now in as healthy a condition as it has been for three years. At the same time I will take this opportunity to urge upon all good citizens who have the welfare of the city at heart, and who desire that London shall maintain its record of the last three years, as the healthiest city in the Dominion, to cheerfully cooperate with the sanitary officers and thoroughly clean up their dwellings, yards, pits, lanes and shops before the winter sets in, leaving as little to do in the spring as possible, and should cholera then visit us the city will be well prepared to meet it.

Ald. Parnell said he had been led to believe there were many cases not placarded. A couple of residents in his ward told him their children had caught scarlet fever at school—from others in whose houses the fever existed. Dr. Gardiner had said that typioid was not contagious. If that disease was in some cases placarded, why was it not necessary in other cases? He had been told that where it was requested by interested parties placarding had not been done at all.

Dr. Hutchinson denied the latter statement. He defied anybody to say he had ever discriminated. He had placarded the bishop of Huron's house three times and other houses of preminent people. When a doctor telephoned him he placarded the place at once and notified the school teachers that the children must be kept from school. There was no law to compel the placarding of typhoid fever cases. In malarial types and under certain circumstances it was unnecessary and would be unjust to poor men.

They should thank the papers for putting people on their guard. They wanted the papers to make every citizen put his house in as clean condition as possible. He said the discrimination used in allowing certain people to drain into Carling's Creek, while others were not, was wrong.

1. Take the Permanently Colonial Ida. Jan one perceive a stream of tendency along that line? The Sir John Macdonalds, the George Browns, the Alexander Mackenzies, who came from the Old Countries. try, have all or nearly all passed away, and the Permanently Colonial Idea has died with them. Their places are being taken by native-born Canadians.

2. The Imperial Federation Idea. A few

can be found to talk of Canada entering an Imperial Legislature in which she would be outvoted 50 to 1. A few can be found who believe that it would be reasonable for Canada to embroil herself in the wars, just or unjust, of Europe, but who can say that any substantial stream of tendency heads

3. Is there, then, it may be asked, any stream of tendency in favor of either of the two remaining alternatives?—i. e., Canadian Independence and Continental Union.
Undoubtedly there is.
And probably both streams of tendency

have their natural source in the American Republic. Canadians are there by the nundred thousand, and indeed are working up into the millions column. It is true that typhoid fever is much less infec-tious than diphtheria or scarlet fever, but so long as its prevalence is dangero the community, and precaution is deemed necessary, it is just as well that the placard ing should be continued. It need entail n unnecessary hardship to those affected. But there will always be allegations of undue discrimination so long as any office law with regard to another.



Of Alfred Tennyson, England's Poet Laureate.

His Rise, His Progress and His Pronounced Success.

Characteristic Productions of His Mature Years and His Declining Days.

Lord Alfred Tennyson was the third son in a family of twelve, and was born Aug. 6, 1809. His early education was imparted by his father, Rev. G. C. Tennyson, at the parsonage at Somerby, Lincolnshire. Afterwards he distinguished himself at Trinity College Cambridge. In 1829 he gained the chancellor's medal by a poem in blank verse entitled "Timbustco." With the exception of a volume of poems published in conjunction with his brother Charles when they were boys, and a prize poem composed whilst an undergraduate at Cambridge, Mr. Tennyson did not publish anything until 1830, when "Poems Chiefly Lyrical" appeared. From 1842 the steady and rapid growth of his fame may be traced. It was
