Greeks and Italians in Conflict. TARANTO, June 7.—A serious riot oc-curred here to-day between the inhabitants of the city and the sailors of the Greek of the city and the sailors of the Greek men-of-war Spara and Sepzai lying at anchor in the harbor. The cause of the conflict was the allegation that some of the sailors had abused a Taranto woman. Several persons on both sides were seriously injured and 46 arrests were made. The Greeks indignantly deny the story of the outrage, but the people of Taranto have threatened to take vengeance on the many Greek residents of the city.

Devastation Caused by Floods.

Devastation Caused by Floods. VIENNA, June 7 .- Floods continue to cause great destruction in the Province of Buckowini. The River Czeremosz yester Buckowini. The River Czeremosz yesterday evening burst through the temporary dams which had been erected to stay its course and submerged the town of Wischnitza. The town has a population of about 4,000 and 21 persons were derowned, while whole rows of houses were demolished. A Radutz the streets are inundated and eight houses have been destroyed. The inhabitants have fied to the mountains.

Home Rule Amendments. LONDON, June 7.—In the House of Com-mons to-day the Irish members of both factions took ground against any further

factions took ground against any further yielding to the enemies of Home Rule.

Sir John Broderick, financial secretary to the War Office in Lord Salisbury's Cabinet, offered an amendment to prevent the Irish Legislature from dealing with the question of immigration and the rights of aliens, and from exercising the right to expel aliens from the country. The Government finally accepted the amendment, Irish Chief Secretary Merley suggesting that it could be met by inserting the word "aliena" after "alien age" in sub-section 6 of clause 3.

Mr. Broderick assented to Mr. Morley's Mr. Broderick assented to Mr. Morley's suggestion, whereupon Timothy Healy (Nationalist) earnestly protested. Mr. Healy said the proposed amendment might cause great embarrassment to the Irish Government. Per instance, the workhouse at Cork was constantly charged with pauper aliens from America. With the amendment about aliens adopted the Irish Government could take no steps to abate the evil.

The words "as such" were also inserted after some further discussion, so that the sub-section now provides that the Iriah Legislature is debarred from legislation in respect to "treasen, felony, alienage, aliena as such, or naturalization."

Mr. L. H. Courthey (Unionist) moved to expunge the trade and quarantine restrictions in sub-section 7 of clause 3.

Mr. Gladstone opposed the amendment. He admitted that there was a large demand in Ireland for the control of external trade, but the Irish members of Parliament accepted the clause. Mr. Parnell had once mentioned the prospect of Ireland adopting the protective policy, but he withdrew that suggestion in accepting the Home Rule Bill of 1886. Public opinion in Ireland indorsed his course. (Nationalist cheers.)

The Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain said that whether desirable or otherwise it would be the ineviable consequence of home rule that Ireland would centrol external trade.

FARCO IN FLAMES!

Half the Town Reduced to Ashes.

Prebably 2,000 People Homeless-Busi-ness Part of the Place Gutted -Loss [\$2,000,000.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 7.—A special from Moorehead, Minn., says half of Fargo is in ashes. The fire started at 3 o'clock in a restaurant on Second street. A strong wind was blowing. At 4 o'clock the fire reached the Great Northern track, ten blocks north, gutting the entire district for three blocks east to Broadway. A strong fight was made to prevent the flames crossing to the west side of Broadway, but by 4 o'clock they had crossed in several places. Probably 2,000 people are homeless. The fire has just crossed the river to the Moorehead side at the Fargo relier mills, which will burn. Among the principal firms already burned are: Herzan, drygoods; Crane's restaurant, Magill, farm machinery; Northern Pacific elevator buildings, Western Union office; Morton, real estate; Red River Valley National Bank, Deily Forum, Merchanta' State Bank, opera house; E. S. Tyler, real estate; Plano McConnick, Walter A. Woods, Minnesota Chief, the Deering and John Deer implement ware-houses, Cole's livery, Grand Hotel, Fleming's drug store, Veder & Lewis' grocery, Christian's drug store, Sheridan's Hotel, Applel Bros., Minneapolis Drygoods Company, Logan's studio, American Iron Works, Continental House, Van Brunt implement warehouse. A strong wind made the fire travel so quickly that hardly anything was saved. The flames went through brick buildings as easily as wooden ones. Loss will be over \$2,000,000, as practically the entire business district of the place is gutted already. At 11 p.m. Fargo is still in flames and the fire is completely beyond control. The loss already ranches at least \$2,000,000. The bridges between Mooreheed and Fargo have been burned, and all telegraphic communication is cut off. Many firemen have been injured, some of them seriously.

He is a brilliant talker, with an easy flowing style, and a pleasing way of introducing a smile-producing aneodote into a discourse that abounded in facts and figures that caused spontaneous applause at frequent intervals.

There was a peculiar interest, he said, attached to the present gathering, a pleasing contrast between the present meeting in London, Ont. in 1893, and with the present church life, compared with the incidents in metropolitan London, when in 1593 under the shadow of Tyburn gallows three Congregationalists were put to death because of their dectrine. The spread of Congregationalism was then touched upon, but owing to some failures to comply to his requests for statistics he could not give exact figures for this year. When this was the case he used the figures of last year. Ten years ago they had 6,000 church members in Canada; to-day they boasted of 9,000. Then they owned \$600,000 worth of proporty; now they owned \$900,000. They have a fine college building to-day paid for, and an endowment fund of \$20,000. There are also \$50,000 invested funds of the Home Missionary Society. We may be moving up grade, and a steep one at that, but we are gradually reaching the top, 'said the speaker as he passed on. 

# LONDON, CANADA.

London and suburbs have a population o 35,000 persons.

London is situated in the garden of Canada, midway between the Niagara and the Detroit Rivers. London is the center of nine different lines of railway, giving easy access to the whole continent, and to the lakes and seaboard.



A NEEDED SHELTER.

any other of considerable size until you reach Rat Portage, a town of something more than 2,000 inhabitants. Here very extensive lumber operations are carried on. The water power is wellnigh unlimited, and the lumber cut here is sold all over the Province of Manitoba and in the prairies to the west. Four miles further west, and on the very border of this Province, there is the village of Keewatin, with a population of about 1,500, and containing a flouring mill capable of making 2,000 barrels of flour per day. I noticed in many of the towns and villages of Manitoba, elevators for the storage of grain belonging to the milling company.

"The prairic country begins 30 or 40 miles east of the Red River, and is fairly well settled further westward to Winnipeg. I had the pleasure of going over the roads of Southern Manitoba, two of which run nearly parallel to the main line. We ran out of Winnipeg in a southwesterly direction over the more northern of these two lines to Barnsley, and thence westerly beyond the border of the Province to a new village called Reston, which seems to have been wholly built within the last few months. A conservative estimate of the loss is \$5,000,000, not one-quarter insured. James Flynn, the son of a city alderman, is reported burned, also three other children.
