says, as to the developments. At Guantanamo. THE AMERICAN FORCES CHANGE

POSITION. United States Camp, entrance of Guantanamo Bay, Sunday, June 12, via Kingston, Jamaica, June 14.—The Spanish troops who attacked the camp of the first battalion of marines under Lieut. R. W. Huntington were repulsed with heavy loss. Four Americans were killed, namely:

Surgeon J. B. Gibbs, of New York Pte. Smith, of Company D.

Pte. McCallgan, of Company D. Pte. Dunrishy, of Company D. The wounded were: Pte. McGowan, of Com any D, hand shattered, and the pilot of the United States cruiser Marblehead, shot through the leg. The firing began after midnight and lasted until daybreak. Lieuts. Neville and Shaw, of Com-

pany D, with 30 men, were on picket duty all night, and were attacked by a heavy force of Spaniards. All the men killed were in this detachment, except Dr. Gibbs, who was shot while in camp. The pickets held the Spaniards off until released in the morning. Reinforcements were landed from the Texas and Mablehead, consisting of 60 men and two rapid-fire guns.

After McCallgan and Dunrishy were killed their heads were shockingly opened fire from two guns placed on the west side of the harbor. The shots would be in the case of the initiative short time silenced the Spanish guns. There were no casualties on the American side.

It was decided by Col. Huntington to abandon the position first occupied as a camp, as there were no signs of reinforcements, and it was known that a force of Spaniards six times thereof upon the property abutting thereon and to be benefited thereby, 110 men were killed. The train made the crest of the hill was given up to batteries and rifle pits, and the tents were pitched on the side of the hill near the harbor, which is protected by the warships.

THE ATTACK ON THE MARINES. Off United States Camp, Guantanamo Bay, Sunday, June 12, noon, via Kingston, Jamaica, June 14.—When the Associated Press dispatch boat Dauntless left Guantanamo Bay early yesterday morning, after the thirteen hours' skirmish between the United States marines under Lieut.-Col. R. W. Huntington, and the Spanish guerillas and regulars, it was expected that the fighting would be renewed. The Marblehead was landing reinforcements.

At 9 o'clock firing was again renewed by the Spaniards, who appeared off the camp on the edge of a small island about a mile to the northeast. It was promptly returned by thirteen rifles and a 3-inch field gun, and in a short time all signs of the enemy had disappeared. Col. Huntington then sent to the landing for a second 3-inch gun. which was dragged up the hill and placed in position at the summit. The skirmish line thrown around the camp kept up a popping all the morning, but with not much result to show for it. Meanwhile the Marblehead left the

harbor and threw a few shells into the To the great delight of the marines' camp, Lieuts. Neville and Shaw, with 30 men of Company D, returned in good shape, but much exhausted by eighteen hours of picket duty. man, Sergt. Smith, of Company K, had been shot through the abdomen and instantly killed. For most of the day and night Lieuts. Neville and Shaw had been surrounded by a much su-perior force, but men and officers behaved splendidly.

At least five Spaniards are known to have been killed, and as Lieut. Neville's men kept up a steady fire throughout the night, and the enemy was not at a great distance, it is believed that the Spanish casualties were heavy.

POSITION OF THE INSURGENTS. London, June 14.-A dispatch to the Standard from a special correspondent, dated off Cayo Romano, along the north coast of Puerto Principe, reports a conversation with a representative of the insurgent government in Cuba. The latter declared that the insurgents would accept nothing short of absolute independence. He represented that Gen. Maximo Gomez and gone personally to assist the Americans against Santiago de Cuba, and that the remainder were massed around Havana, which was being stoutly defended. The rainy season, he said, he did not regard as very dangerous for the American troops, provided they fortified themselves with quinine.

Furthermore, on the left bank of the Niger, the French get a triangular piece of territory, whose base extends from Say to Ho. Chicago, June 14.-Joseph Leiter, speaking of the collapse of his wheat deal, says: It is a case where the tail has begun to wag the dog. This statement has its illustration in the fact that futures began breaking faster than cash wheat declined. Logically, the condition should have been exactly the reverse. For several days, in fact, say for some weeks, cash wheat has been slow sale, particularly in the Northwest and around milling centers generally. To a certain ex-tent this has been offset by a fair degree of activity at the seaboard, in response to an inquiry from the other side, but the local markets have been decidedly inclined to drag. There has been a steady marketing of cash wheat, but I cannot say as to the quantities in which it has gone into home consumption or abroad for for-

A Remarkable Coincidence.

It is a singular coincidence that the wo men who were the mainstays of the Government of Sir John Macdonald in Ontario and Quebec respectively, while that Conservative statesman was at the zenith of his power, should pass away from the scene in the prime of mature manhood, within a few weeks of each other. Sir Adolphe Chapleau, whose death in Montreal has just been chronicled, was in the Province of Quebec the chief prop of the Conservative party, and under the direction of the Chieftain his wonderful oratory was all-powerful in the average constituency of that Province. It is no secret that Sir John Macdonald re-D'Alton McCarthy as the strongest Conservative force in Ontario. Sir John, indeed, more than once dubbed Mr. McCarthy, while president of the Ontario Conservative Union, "the brains of the party." These two leaders of men were wide apart in many regards. It took the genius of managing others possessed by Sir John Macdonald to keep them in harness together. After the old leader died, unity seemed next to impossible. Nevertheless, their death at this time leaves a big gap.

Public Expenditures and a

Cooked Bakance Sheet. In the closing hours of the Parliamentary session, the ex-Finance Minister gave another exhibition of how much time he can waste in unnecessary talk. Again and again, during the last four months, Mr. Foster has reviewed the finances of the country, and been effectively replied to, but he was not satisfied with his efforts, which have cost the country tens of thousands of dollars worth of valuable time. He told Hon, Mr. Fielding in advance that he would speak for a few minutes before the supply bill was passed-a most unusual proceeding on the closing day. Then he got up and spoke over an hour, repeating previous speeches almost word for word, and leaving less than half an hour for the Finance Minister. to reply. This Mr. Fielding did most thoroughly.

A particularly strong point was the hollowness of the pretension of Mr. Foster that the late Government had reduced the expenditure in the year it left office. The fact is, as Sir Richard Cartwright had already put beyond cavil, and Mr. Fielding emphasized by anassailable proof, the apparent decrease was accounted for by the omission of \$3,621,689, supplementary estimates, which were printed and circulated throughout the country by the Tupper Government as campaign aids. The usion of these would have brought the expenditures up to the highest ever made in the Dominion. Then in that year no provision was made for the drilling of the militia, the Government rallway was starved, and in many ways a fictitiously incomplete ditures was made up, intended to do duty in after years, as Mr. Foster craftily tried to make it do duty

Fortunately, Mr. Fielding was at hand with an effective disproof of the allegations made.

Whatever expenditures are now peing made, Mr. Fielding showed, are required by the altered conditions and progress of the country, and are defensible on their merits—a defense which can never be put up, for the cooked balance sheet of the Dominion presented to Parliament in the last year under the management of the late Government, and upon which quicksand Mr. Foster has so foolishly attempted to keep erect his party house.

The Council and the Normal School.

London city council, at its meeting last night, declined to implement the offer of a previous board of aldermen to supply a site for the new Normal School in this city. While The Advertiser believed that this would be the result of an appeal to the present council, themselves whether or not they shall it has nevertheless held that it was the duty of the Minister of Education to give the civic representatives the opportunity to select the site, on the terms offered, before he took final action in the matter. How different it would have been if the Senate majority had left alone the bargain to have the connecting link sources of the territory which was to be benefited. Instead of pursuing that patriotic course, the Senate majority listened to Mr. Livernash, of San paper and did not pretend to comply Francisco, and played into the hands those who were anxious to prevent the establishment of an all-Canadian route, and retain the advantages of the traffic which would undoubtedly but lately they had not. A tremendous slump in prices was kenerally attributed to immense sales for him. According to one authority Mr. Leiter ordered all his trades closed at the opening of the day's transactions in the wheat pit, and that at least 8,000,000 bushels of wheat were liuidated for him in the Chicago market alone. The severest breaks in stock at from 3c to 3½c per lb; a carprices were in the Northwest, where, load of oxen and large steers, averaging it was said, Leiter had his big lines. Cash wheat in Duluth went off 19c, and at Minneapolis 17c. Half an hour before the close Leiter's sales in Chicago were placed as high as 10,000,000 bushels. His brokers, Allen & Greer, transferred June wheat to Armour and September wheat to Lamson Bros. It was reported that a movement was on foot among strong interests to take care of cash wheat, and that a meeting was in session at which this matter was under consideration. Fifteen min-utes before the closing began on the tickers had a report 'Change" that Leiter's cash wheat would be trusted. It was noted that the bankers who had made advances on it had agreed to take care of it. During the final moments of trading Joseph Leiter was at the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank, in consultation with his father and others. Joseph Leiter said, in reoly to inquiries, that he would not make an assignment that his options had been liquidated, and that his cash wheat would be trusted. July wheat in Chicago closed at 79c, against 80c the finish on Saturday. At one me July went down to 75c, and Septembe. closed at 71c-a loss of 3c as compared with Saturday. During the day September went as low as 691/4C. Joseph Leiter admin do friends that Joseph Leiter admiced to friends that he had lost money. Excitement on the board ran high. Stories of financial trouble for the young man who engineered one of the greatest wheat deals in the history of the country gained circulation. However, little credence was given this feverish gossig at first. Mr. Letter was closeted with his father, L. Z. Letter, and when pressed to tell whether the slump in the cereal had affected his interests, frankly admitted that he had lost money How much he would not say. He had not the time to go into details. Conferences were the order of the day. Leiter's wheat interests have been turned over to a board of trustees, who will settle up the deal. This course was necessary on account of Mr. Leiter's inability to put up margins which

were called for. He admitted that his teather had withdrawn his support. An intimate friend of Mr. Leiter, and one who is believed to know considerable about his board of trade business, said this afternoon: "Mr. Leiter has not failed, nor has he made an assignment, and I do not think he will do so. I understand he is arranging to put all his wheat in trust with the banks here, and so prevent stuff from being forced on the market. I am not aware of any cutstanding contracts on the board."

Toronto, June 14 .- At the meeting of the Congregational Union yesterday a resolution was passed acknowledging the great value of the services of the late Mr. Gladstone in the cause of religion and philanthropy, and also on cehalf of Non-conformists.

The business committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution: "That we behold with reverent wonder the crumbling of ancient empires and the extension of the power and influence of that race in which the gospel has most fully developed liberty and manhood. That while we sympathize deeply with our brethren of the same race but of another allegiance through the agonies of war, and while we pray earnestly that these may soon be brought to an end, we rejoice exceedingly that a spirit of mutual loving kindness has re-united the long severed branches of the Anglo-Saxon people. We have reason to hope as we devoutly pray that as the world-wide interests of these two kindred powers assimilate and that as their responsibilities to the human race are more and more found to be alike, the unity of spirit which now prevails between them will become habitual, as united they are able to impose peace and liberty upon the world, and as their disunion would obstruct these, so great bleasings, we pray that co-operation between them. to prepare the way of the Lord and make his paths straight, may become a matter of established agreement and compact.'

Rev. F. B. Hyde, chairman of the committee which considered Mr. Madill's case, challenged the statement appearing in a morning paper as a portion of a statement made to his congregation Sunday by Rev. Mr. Madill, in which Mr. Hyde was represented as saying that if he would give up his membership in the Royal Templars and Masons, the union would drop the charges against him. Mr. Hyde denied that he had ever made such a statement to Madill.

The safe, which stood outside the office, in the middle of the store, was greatly damaged. A drill had been applied in several places. All round the outer edge of the safe there were marks of the hammer, as though applied for sounding purposes. One hole was drilled nearly through the door The safe contained little cash, as Mr. Tackaberry has of late been taking the cash home with him. The only articles missed from the store were a black leather medical bag and a handsome leather wallet, both of which were taken from the show windows. Twice during the last two weeks has a young man come in and looked at the bag, admired it and went out without buying. There is no clue to the robbers.

MANITOBA'S WHEAT.

The Area Largely Increased-Now Covers 1,500,000 Acres.

Winnipeg, June 14.-The June crop bulletin of the Provincial Government shows the wheat area to be 1,488,238 acres, an increase of almost 200,000 acres over last year. The total acreage under crops of all kinds is 2,212,-300. The increase over last year is over a quarter of a million acres. It may be safely stated that the wheat area of Manitoba has reached 1.500,000 acres. Warm showers fallen frequently of late, and crops are in excellent promising condition.



The City Council Appoint a Unique Deputation

To Inspect the Sewerage Systems of Hamilton and Berlin.

The Members Go at Their Own Expense-Council Now Have No Site for the Normal School-Pleased to Know the Government Has One.

Another jaunt was decided upon by members of the city council at a special meeting last night. The places to be visited are Berlin and Hamilton. The object of the trip, to gather further information about the methods of disposing of sewage. There are no limitations concerning the delegation either as to number-as many as choose may go-or as to expense-the members stand that themselves. In other words, they pay as they go. How many scents it will cost the aldermen is not likely

to be computed. The deputation question was the first one on the order paper. The mayor urged that the two places mentioned cil should decide as quickly as possithe present method was continued. At

Ald. Jolly moved that Ald. Cooper and Ald. Winnett seconded.

Ald. Dreaney thought there was no need to hurry in the matter. There was plenty of work to do on the new sewer system before this step should be ta-Ald. Hunt agreed. Ald. Douglass said it was not the in-

past deputations for not reporting to the council, and wanted to know if this would be any better. Ald. Belton said the only reason for sending the deputation was to help the council to decide.

couple of aldermen quickly, and almost eagerly.

Ald. O"Meara thought there was no need for any more information about the Hamilton system than had been given by the press. He blamed the council for trying to rush the matter too quickly. They should not do at a jump work they should take a couple of vears to do. The provincial board of health would not take advantage of the city. A deputation that he would vote would be one to wait upon the provincial board of health, and ask for an extension of time. The council should lay aside \$2,000 and tell the people who lived near the river and were kicking about the nuisance to go on and sue. Ald. Cooper particularly emphasized the necessity of going to Berlin. Fil-tration beds were used there, he said, and were not satisfactory, while at Hamilton the system of chemical treatment was working thoroughly and well. He favored a large deputation, but would not pay his own expenses. Onethird of his time was mough to devote to the city. If chemical treatment were adopted, the plant could be placed at the first or second cove without being

considered a nuisance. Reverting to the filtration method, he said the people at Berlin were disgusted with it. Ald. Carrothers was in favor of a delegation, but thought there was no hurry. Whatever system was adopted, they call for tenders for section B, carrying the sewage to the second cove. It had to go there, anyway, and the engineers have all the plans ready. As for the complainants along the river, they had been invited time and again to take action against the city. No question about it, London would have the privilege of emptying into the river until possible to complete the system. Another reason for going slow was that they wanted the best. If Mr. McDougall's scheme, being later, was an improvement, next year a still greater improvement might be forthcoming. The mayor said the engineer had asked that a deputation be named. was a wise move, he thought, as many of the council seemed to be just as clear on sewerage matters as at the

first of the year. Ald. Carrothers and Cooper had said they were not satisfied and more information should be ob ing and stinging, mostly at night; worse by scratching.
