HYMAN THE UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF LIBERALS FOR BY-ELECTION

Charles S. Hyman is again the Liberal candidate in London.

At one of the largest and most enthusiastic nominating conventions ever assembled in London, he was last night unanimously chosen as the party:

Mr. Hyman has already accepted, because, before the meeting, he wired to Mr. George C. Gibbons, K. C., president of the London Liberal Association, as follows:

"I place myself in the hands of my London and Ottawa friends."

Hyman Hall was packed to the doors. Representative Liberals from all parts of the city were present. Some of them could look back upon half a century of political history in London Others were young men who have not as yet cast their first vote. But all of them were Hyman men, full of enthusiasm and vigor, and ready for fight. There was no mistaking the tone of the meeting. The turnout showed that the Liberals of London are behind Hyman to a man, and that they intend to place him at the head of the polls against any candidate whom the Conservatives may name to oppose him.



Next Brockville was tried, but Gourlay was again not convicted, and finally Toronto was tried (Laughter) and Gourlay was found guilty.

"Some of you have not had the chance to read all the evidence," continued Mr. McEvoy, reverting to the London election case, "but how much do you think is shown to have beer spent by this six months of hauling people down to Toronto? The large deposits of iron so far discovered were not suitable for steel rails, but such deposits doubtless existed, and the offering of a bonus of, say, \$50,000, to the prospector who discovered such iron, would be money well spent. The bonus on copper was entirely insufficient. A straight bonus of \$100,000 should be given to a company to aid in building a smelter. The same argument would apply in the case of nickel. Canada produced 75 per cent of the world's nickel, yet it all went to the United States to be refined. The Province would be repaid the outlay within five years, even if the cost was \$1,000,000, as the establishment of a smelter would double the number engaged in the mining industry in North-

ern Ontario. Hon. Mr. Cochrane pointed out that the Dominion Government already bonused the iron industry. He disapproved of the payment of this bonus on from foreign ores. A smelter built with Government aid might never do any smelting after it was erected.



Cost and value of parks from a business point of view do not mean any wild expenditure of money. But money wisely and well expended will invariably prove a good and profitable investment. Boards of assessors prove that money well expended in parks and their improvement is money well invested. The taxable value of lands in the neighborhood of parks increases immensely thereby, adding to the municipality's income. W. E. Edgerton, superintendent of parks of Albany, New York, says of the Albany parks: "The history of Albany is that the ground contiguous to the parks has not only doubled, but quadrupled and septupled. One piece of property was worth \$8,500, and by the simple expenditure of \$4,800 on it the value of that property was raised more than

20 times in eight years." In 1856 the assessed value of the three wards adjoining Central Park, New York, was \$20,429,000. In 1873, seventeen years later, it had increased to \$236,081,000, a gain of \$215,652,000. Central Park has cost New York in round numbers \$60,000,000 since 1856, and the city financiers say that this has all been returned to the coffers of the city with interest, through the enormously enhanced value of the adjacent property, thereby increasing the revenue from the same. I could go on and give statistics by the dozen

confirming these facts. Parks have a healthy and wonderfully uplifting influence, and go a long way towards raising the standing of the city in the eyes of not only the citizens themselves, but to the observing and progressive stranger. Wellkept parks, streets and boulevards give a city an air of respectability and have the same general effect that a clean, respectably dressed lady or gentleman has upon her or himself and on the whole community.

Parks cannot be well kept and improved without money. It may surprise many to know what is spent per annum by some of the larger cities, both in the United States and Canada.
