UNIONIST MOVE AGAINST GAELIC

Want English Declared the Official Language of Ireland.

VOTED MOTION

Contention Made That Use of Native Tongue Would Tend To Cause Separation.

London, Oct. 22 .- The House of Commons tonight continued the discussions in the committee stage of the Government's proposals in regard to the arrangements for the debate on the home rule bill. The Unionists proposed legislation that should prevent Gaelic from becoming the universal language of Ireland. The debate was on the proposal of Ian Malcolm, Unionist member for Croydon, to insert in the bill a stipulation that English should be the sole official language of the Irish Parliament, the law courts and the public services.

Ronald McNelll, Unionist member for East Kent, contended that the recent insistence of the Gaelic League that officials ought to be acquainted with Gaelic was an attempt to revive a dying language with a view to converting Ireland into a separate nationality. Otherwise it could only be regarded as an

Augustine Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, said if Gaelic was to become the language of the people and the predominant tongue in Ireland it would be useless to insert a provision in the home rule bill to exclude it from public life.

A. Bonar Law, the Unionist leader, supported the contention of his followers. The movement in favor of the use of Gaelic, he declared, aimed at separation He feared there would be discrimination in public appointments against those who were not acquainted with the Gaelic
