British Troops on Somme Pozieres

Haig Reports Further Progress Made Along a Line Half-Mile Long—Germans Resisting Desperately at Guillemont Despite Heavy Losses.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Aug. 22 .- 3:29 p.m. - British troops on the Somme front have advanced along a line a halfmile long in the region of Pozieres, and have also made an advance near the Leipsic salient, it was officially announced today.

The Germans are stubbornly clinging to their hold on Guillemont, although sustaining heavy casualties as the result of British artillery fire on the place, says the official statement, which follows:

Desperate Resistance. "In Guillemant, the enemy's garrison is still maintaining an obstinate resistance in spite of very heavy losses from our artillery hombardments.

"In the vicinity of Pozieres we have again made considerable pro gress. We have advanced on a front of a half-mile and are established at a road junction just out-side of Movquet Farm, and have pushed forward along the right of the Pozieres-Miraumont road.



Served For Year in France. For more than a year large share of the exhausting work that followed the tremendous battles that occurred on that part of the front to which her hospital was assigned. Many times she worked over major operations with only the light of a tallow candle to guide her hands and

After constant service with the

hospital she secured her release in order to go to London, Eng., and attach herself to a Canadian hospital, because she wished to be among her own people. Although she was born in England she came to London when a child, and she anticipated no trouble in securing a place because of her experience and the fact that experienced nurses, capable of assisting at operations, were everywhere in de-mand. She made application to the Canadian hospital authorities and wrote to Sir Sam Hughes. Some months have passed since then, and her reward has been a curt turndown from the Canadian hospital authorities, and no reply om the distinguished head of the Canadian militia forces.

Chagrined Over Treatment.
Relatives in this city have received word of her treatment. She her own fellow-countrymen to give her an opportunity of serving with those who are nearest and dearest to her. (Canadian Press.) Athens, Aug. 22.—Via London, 1:35 p.m.—After a conference of the French, British, Serbian and Russian commanders at Saloniki today, it was decided that the newly-arrived Russian forces should take up positions with the Serbian troops on the southern frontier of Serbia.

The Serbo-Russian force was placed under a combined staff, of which Crown Prince Alexander of Serbia is the nominal commander. The Russian General Friederictsz is in actual command.

One soldier lost a watch from the raft, while others lost parts of their clothing and equipment.

At this late day in the summer oil is still being placed on the streets of London, after residents of those localities have had to put up with the dust of the dry period and go without the relief of street watering at the same time. Just when they were consoling themselves with the somewhat doubtful "saving," the oil tank comes along and smears its load all over the street, at least three months late. These taxpayers will have to pay the shot, although they got practically no service, and were subject to discomfor during almost the entire summer. The cause is said to be a failure to secure delivery of oil, although the city is understood to have paid a high price for the year's supply.

Proper purchasing methods would have secured oil at the proper season and had it in ample quantities ready for the spring oiling. It is to be hoped that the summer's supply will be secured in time for next year, and that there will be no red tape in the way. If the present system is followed it will be necessary to wait until next year's estimates are prepared and the appropriation made be-
