[Special to The Advertiser.] Washington, March 24 .- With characteristic American business instinct, the administration today was building up its "war corporation" to turn out a finished product designed to match the best in the world.

The council of national defence met here today to discuss practical handling of the measures of war discussed yesterday in the cabinet meeting. Its experts will constitute the Government's advisory body just as soon as war is announced by Congress.

In the meantime the administration is sounding a warning to the people of the nation that preparations must be made for the possibility of a long and bitter war. FRENCH WIN HIGH GROUND ABOVE LA FERE BIG GUNS WILL FORCE AN EVACUATION; NO CESSATION TO DRIVE OF THE ALLIES

INCREASE THE STRANGLE HOLD

London, March 24.—The promulgation of a new Allied doctrine against Germany is demanded by Carlyon Wilfroy Bellairs, Unionist member for Maidstone, in a resolution laid on the table of the House of Commons for debate next week. The resolution provides that "in view of the murders and the shocking violations of international law on the high seas by the German Government, this House, recognizing that Germany has placed herself in the position of an outlaw, declares that the time has come to enforce the new European doctrine that no supplies may come out of or go into Germany or her allies, that prize court procedure was devised to meet conditions of civilized warfare, which do not exist; that consequently supplies for neutral European countries must now be rationed on the basis of an entire cessation of their trade with Germany.

KAISER LAUDS HIS GENERALS FOR THAT

Amsterdam, via London, March 24.—
The German Emperor has written a letter of congratulations to King Ludwig of Bavaria on the part his son, Prince Rupprecht, has played in the German retirement on the western front. The text of the keiser's letter as officially published in Berlin and received here by telegraph, is as follows:

"We owe the brilliant carrying out of the great army movement on the western front to the successful action of your son in the first place. He has therein performed a piece of work which deserves the highest appreciation, and will be inscribed on a page of glory in the story of the war. It is an extraordinary foy for me to inform you of this."

The emperor concludes with an expression of thanks to both generals, their assistants and troops.

Germans in Desperation Flood La Fere, Which Points to Early Abandonment---French Gain Additional Ground Towards St. Quentin---Pressure of Allies on Centre and Right Is Very Heavy and German Left Is in Grave Peril.

THE WAR IN THE WEST

Increased peril to the so-called Hindenburg line of the Germans in Northern France, running through Cambrai, St. Quentin, La Fere and Laon, is indicated by today's Paris official statement.

The French are continuing their strong pressure from St. Quentin to the Aisne, and have driven through to the Oise River, directly north of La Fere, at some points. Apparently they have gained control of the high ground in this region, and are able to command the city with their guns.

OPENED SLUICE GATES.

That the Germans were despairing of holding La Fere, a key point in the new line, was indicated by last night's announcement that they had opened the

new line, was indicated by last night's announcement that they had opened the sluice gates and flooded the city. The new French advance to the Oise can hardly fall to make the place still more difficult to hold.

Further progress also has been made by the French further to the southeast, on the east bank of the Ailette River, west of Laon, where the Germans, while still falling back towards their new line, are apparently offering a stiff resistance. Paris military critics also point to a German peril here, where the left end of the German line at St. Gobain is threatened with outflanking.

HAIG STILL ADVANCING.

Last reports from the British end of the line also indicated strong German resistance, but recorded also further advances for General Haig's forces, notably in the region southeast of Arras.

Paris, March 24 .- Von Hindenburg has already abandoned La Fere, or will evacuate it within the next few hours. This is the opinion here today as dispatches come from the front line. With the keystone position of the famous Hindenburg line under water, it is hard to see how the Germans can make a deter mined stand there. In addition to this, Gen Nivelle's forces are in possession of the high ground in the vicinity, and is fast bringing up his heavy guns. With these in position, La Fere would be untenable.

La Fere sits in the Oise Valley, skirted by the river and a canal, and consequently lends itself to the flooding methods adopted by the Germans.

FORGING AHEAD.

Paris, March 24 .- The Allies continue to forge ahead on the centre and extreme right, and made substantial progress yesterday in the direction of St Quentin and La Fere in the teeth of determined German resistance. Notwithstanding the efforts of the Germans to destroy the roads as they retired, the Allies have managed to bring up uns are again busy after a heaviest artillery, and the ga good force of all but their

long rest. FRENCH PRESSURE STRONG. The pressure of the French from St. Quentin to the Aisne is so powerful that it begins to seem doubtful, in the opinion of the French military critics; as to whether the Gern.ans will be able to hold onto the so-called Hindenburg The Teutons have opened the sluices at La Fere, apparently feeling that chances of holding the town are not good now that the French have got t footing on the high ground in the Jussy region, northeast of Tergnier. If General Nivelle is able to establish himself in this position his guns will command La Fere.

GERMAN LEFT EXPOSED.

Further south the French are making solid progress against the five-mile salient covering St. Gobain, and formed by the lower Coucy forest. The columns here are working hand in hand with columns operating northeast of Soissons. In the direction of Laon. The latter made continuous progress today, and their advance exposes the left extremity of the German line at St. Gobain to the risk of being outflanked and driven back on Laon. It is evident that the German staff is alive to the growing danger, for they are making desperate efforts to check the French advance, and the fighting is fiercer here than in any other





Information as to Preparation, Planting and Care of Plants That May Be Grown in Backyards.

PREPARATION OF THE SOIL.

If the weather conditions remain favorable, the ground in city gardens may be dug in a week or ten days. An easy method of telling whether it is ready to dig, is to take a lump of upturned soil in the hand. If it crumbles, the soil is ready for digging, but if it remains in a compact, sodden mass, it is advisable to wait a while before digging.

The soil should be dug to a deepth of from eight to twelve inches, using preferably a digging fork, which will help to thoroughly mix the soil. Turn the soil over so that what was underneath is placed on top. Manure should be applied annually in the fall. However, if a spring application is being made, the following is a good method of incorporating it into the soil. What One of Montreal's Leading Engineers Has To Say of Na-

SHOWS FOOD CRISIS.
COPENHAGEN, via London, March
3.—The announcement of a reduction in the bread ration of Germany and an increase in the meat ration, as rederived here, is indicative of Germany's present food difficulties, to which the Prussian food commissioner, Dr. George Michaelis, referred in a recent speech the Prussian Diet.

The grain stocks, which, even with the supplies received from Rumania, ere barely sufficient to carry through ration, had to be drawn upon to ppensate for the potato crisis in the ter, when for weeks the supplies to the cities were interrupted owing the intensely cold weather.

Reduction in Potatoes.
The "restoration" of the potatoration to five pounds is really a reduction, when it is considered that the ration in the autumn was seven pounds. Then for weeks the actual ration of three pounds was unobtainable by a large part of the population, Hamburg, fer instance, serving it only at occasional intervals.

The meat ration, on the other hand, can be increased, owing to the comparatively large stocks of cattle which have accumulated, and which must be slaughtered owing to the shortage of fodder.
