The church was filled with soldiers and civilians, who heard the brief but pow-

erful address of the bishop. The regiment arrived at 8 o'clock, under command of Lieut.-Col. Mc-Ewen. On reaching the cathedral doors the color party advanced. The doors were closed and the band and drums took up a position to the right and left of the doors. The color party halted at the church steps, and the officers were brought to the front. The adjutant, Capt. Becher, approaching the door, according to custom, rapped three times with the hilt of his sword, and the door was opened by the wardens, to whom the adjutant stated that he had a message from the commanding officer of his regiment, which he wished to deliver to the rector of the church.

The doors were again closed, and the wardens retired with the message. The rector, coming to the front, the adjutant was presented to him, and the latter said to the rector: "Very reverend sir, I have been directed by Lieut.-Col. McEwen, commanding the Twenty-sixth Regiment, to inform you, as rector of this cathedral, that he desires admission for the purpose of requesting that the old colors of his regiment be deposited in this church. This permission having been obtained, the adjutant and the rector proceeded to the main entrance, the main doors of which were thrown open. The rector. Very Rev. Dean Innes, accompanied by the clergy and choir, formed a procession. The clergy consisted of the bishop, the dean, Canons Young and Hill, Canon Dann (honorary chaplain of the Twenty-sixth Regiment), Rev. Mr. Robinson (of the Thirty-second Thirty-third Regiment).
