St. Petersburg, Friday, Sept. 23, 3;20 Mukden continues slowly according to information received here. Marquis Oyama's advance guard is 30 miles south of Mukden. Stories printed in the foreign press that a great battle there has already begun are disproved by the actual developments at the scene of operations. From the importance of Mukden as a winter base, it is believed the Japanese will exert every effort to push out the Russians, but it is thought a serious struggle is still some days distant. The Japanese probably will have to reckon first with a stubborn defense of the Fushun mines, where the next important fight is expected.






